

A native and champion of Port

ONE of Port Macquarie's oldest natives, Neville Anderson, died on Thursday at the age of 90.

His funeral service was held yesterday morning in the Presbyterian Church.

In recent years he and wife, Pearl, have lived at St Agnes Village.

He was born in Hay Street on March 18, 1908, the first child of a family of four boys and two girls.

He started school at the age of six at Port Macquarie Public School.

He left school at the age of 14 to work with his father in his butcher's shop.

In 1938 he went to Wellington and into partnership in a butcher shop, returning to Port Macquarie in 1946 to continue his butchery interests.

He was part of a 98-year family association with the butchery business.

As a teenager he was a keen sportsman and a fisherman and shooter.

He joined the surf club on Town Beach when he was 16.

His community involvement has included being a member of Rotary and president in early 1970s, member of Probus, member of RSL club since it was formed, member of the golf club and member of Port Macquarie City Bowling Club.

Through groups such as Rotary Mr Anderson was involved in clearing the site for the Port Macquarie Airport.

He was one of the foundation members when the historical society was formed in Port Macquarie in 1956, and he retained this interest until his death.

He was one of five people who were guarantors when the council lent the money for the society to buy the Clarence Street property for a museum.

Mr Anderson became the first president when the society was formed. He was again president from 1966 until 1983.

Through his love of history he was involved with every aspect of the society, and he helped build portions of the museum.

This interest was shared by Pearl, and the couple are renowned for their close working relationship.

The couple have been married for more than 60 years and they were regarded as a "very special couple" by their legion of friends.

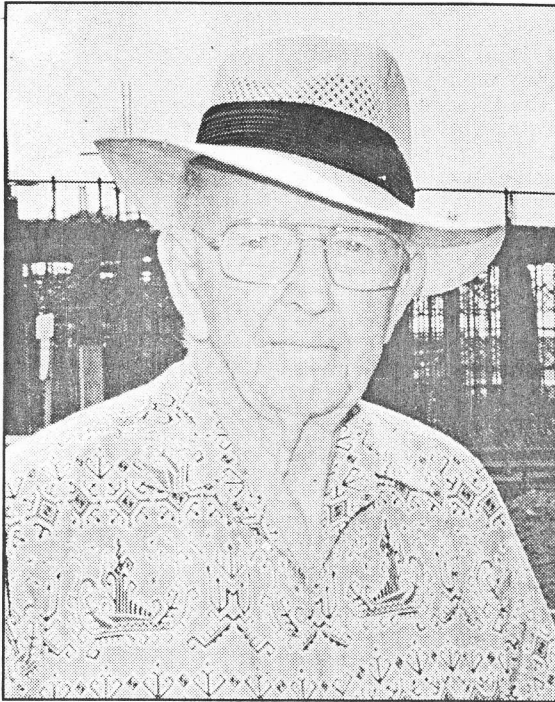
His knowledge of the town's history was highly regarded.

Guests included the couple's youngest daughter Judith Grant and her son Lachlan who travelled from Sydney.

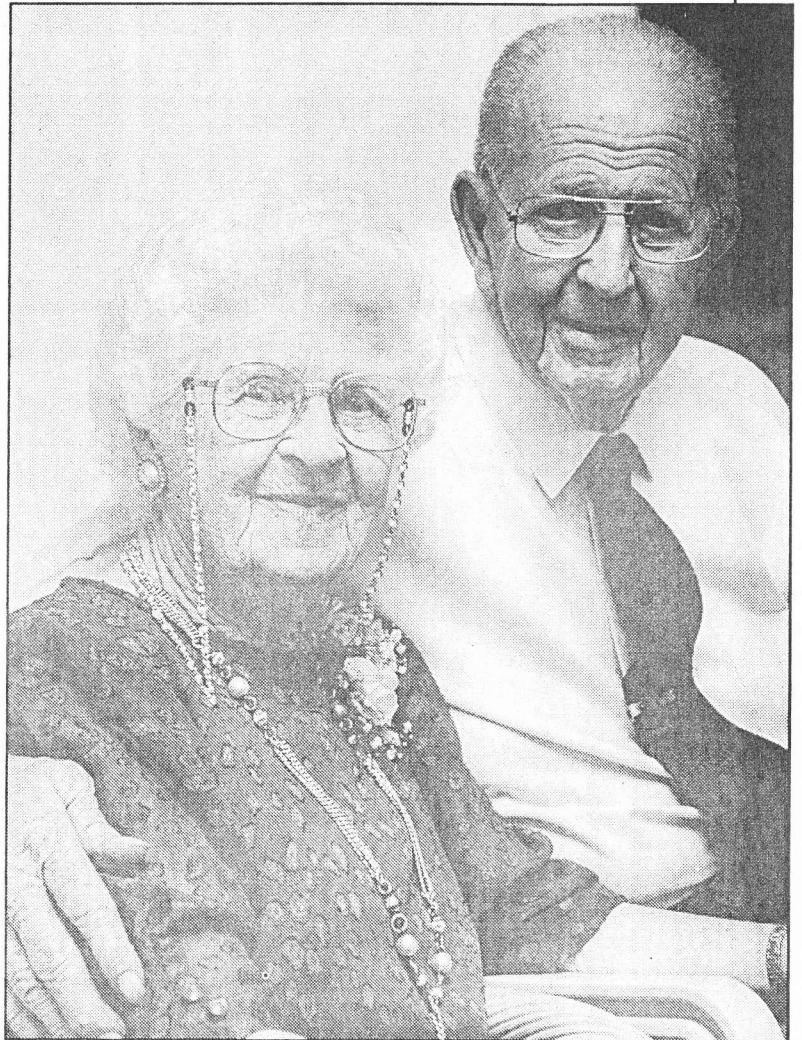
The couple's only son, Ian, and his wife Pam, of Port Macquarie, were the party organisers.

MR. DAVID ANDERSON.

AN old resident of the district passed away, after a very short illness, on Saturday morning last in the person of Mr. David Anderson. Deceased entered the hospital only a couple of days previously, suffering from heart trouble. The old gentleman, who had attained the ripe age of 77 years, died on the Hastings soon after his marriage. He immediately engaged in his trade of ship and boat building. He did not confine himself to this alone, however, as he was a very skilled mechanic, and manifested his ability in house-building, coachbuilding, &c., his work always being very highly spoken of. Deceased leaves a widow and grown-up family of four sons, and seven daughters, all of whom, with the exception of Mr. William Anderson and Mrs. P. Kerr, have left the district. One son (Leslie) is engaged in journalistic work in Queensland. The funeral took place on Sunday afternoon, a very large concourse of people following the cortege to the cemetery. In the unavoidable absence of the Rev. G. M. Torbett, the service at the grave was conducted by Mr. R. Davidson. This seemed pathetically fitting, as deceased was an enthusiastic political supporter and ardent admirer of the ex-member for the Hastings and Macleay. A profusion of beautiful wreaths covered the coffin. Mr. H. T. Wilkins had charge of the funeral arrangements.

MR. P. J. KERR.

WE regret to chronicle the death of Mr. P. J. Kerr, a well-known native of Port Macquarie, who has resided for some years in Sydney. Deceased, who was 45 years of age, suffered from Bright's disease, and his health was further impaired recently by an attack of congestion of the lungs. He was a patient in hospital for 10 weeks, and had been back in his home at Edgcliffe-road, Woollahra, for three weeks when he succumbed. The sudden death of his son, Pat on the football ground 12 months ago was a heavy blow to him, and his health steadily declined thereafter. He died on Wednesday last at 1 o'clock, on the 43rd anniversary of his father's death. The late Mr. Kerr was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. Kerr, well-known residents here in the early days. When old enough to work he took service at the sawmills, and during his life here he was engaged chiefly in the timber industry and on the river droghers. About six years ago he lost three fingers of his right hand in a mill accident. He married Miss Malvina Anderson, third daughter of the late Mr. D. Anderson and Mrs. Anderson (now of Sydney). In his young days he was a good footballer, and took part in many a hard-fought contest. Some four years ago the family removed to Sydney, where they have since resided. He was a member of the G.U.O.O.F. His mother died about 13 years ago. Deceased leaves a widow and one son. He also has a brother, Mr. W. Kerr, who resides in South Africa; and Mrs. W. McGrath, of Port Macquarie, is his sister. Mrs. McGrath went to Sydney last week to see her brother, and Mr. McGrath was there at the time of his death. We extend our sympathy to the bereaved relatives.

The body will be brought to Port Macquarie and interred in the Catholic section of the West Port Macquarie cemetery on Sunday. The cortege will move from Mr. W. McGrath's residence, Clarence-street, at 2.30 p.m.

MR. W. ANDERSON.

A well-known and respected native of Port Macquarie, in the person of Mr. William Anderson, passed away in the Hastings District Hospital on Saturday night, 14th April, aged 72 years.

The late Mr. Anderson was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. David Anderson, and was born at Port Macquarie, where he had resided practically all his life. After completing his education he entered the butchering business as an employee of the Messrs. McInherney Bros., the killing yards then being at Settlement Point and the shop in town, the site being that now occupied by Mr. C. Woodlands, in Horton Street. He continued in this line with Messrs. E. McInherney and J. Lockton, and some 20 years ago became a master butcher on his own behalf, after being in partnership with Mr. F. Ross, later admitting his sons to the business under the name of Anderson & Sons. To this he gave strict attention, and it may truly be said of deceased that he practically died in harness, taking sick and being admitted to the district hospital only on Wednesday previous to his death.

The deceased married Miss Ada Batten, of Lue, near Mudgee, who survives, as do four sons and two daughters, viz., Messrs. Neville A. (Crow's Nest), Vernon (Port Macquarie), Leonard (A.I.F.), Lance (Port Macquarie), Mrs. A. Martin (Port Macquarie), and Miss Noel Anderson (A.A.M.W.S.).

The late Mr. Anderson was a hale fellow, well met, a man who made no enemies, and held the respect and esteem of all. In his younger days it was often his lot to go far afield for stock to kill, to the Upper Hastings and New England. He was an old member of the local branch of the G.U.O.O.F. Lodge, at which he was a regular attender up to the time of his death. In days gone by he was a member of the H. R. Jockey Club, Port Macquarie Regatta Club, and took a keen interest in both football and cricket, and also foot-running, which was fairly prominent here in what was then known as the gas-light days, being himself fairly speedy. In later years his time was devoted almost wholly to the butchering business.

The funeral, under the direction of Mr. F. V. Hayward, undertaker, took place on Monday afternoon, and was largely attended. Following a service in St. Thomas' Church, the cortege moved for the Church of England section of the Port Macquarie Cemetery, where Canon T. M. Gerry concluded the funeral service. The deceased was also accorded an Odd-fellows' Lodge service, the burial ritual being read by Bro. E. A. Kennedy, P.N.G., in the presence of several other members of the lodge.

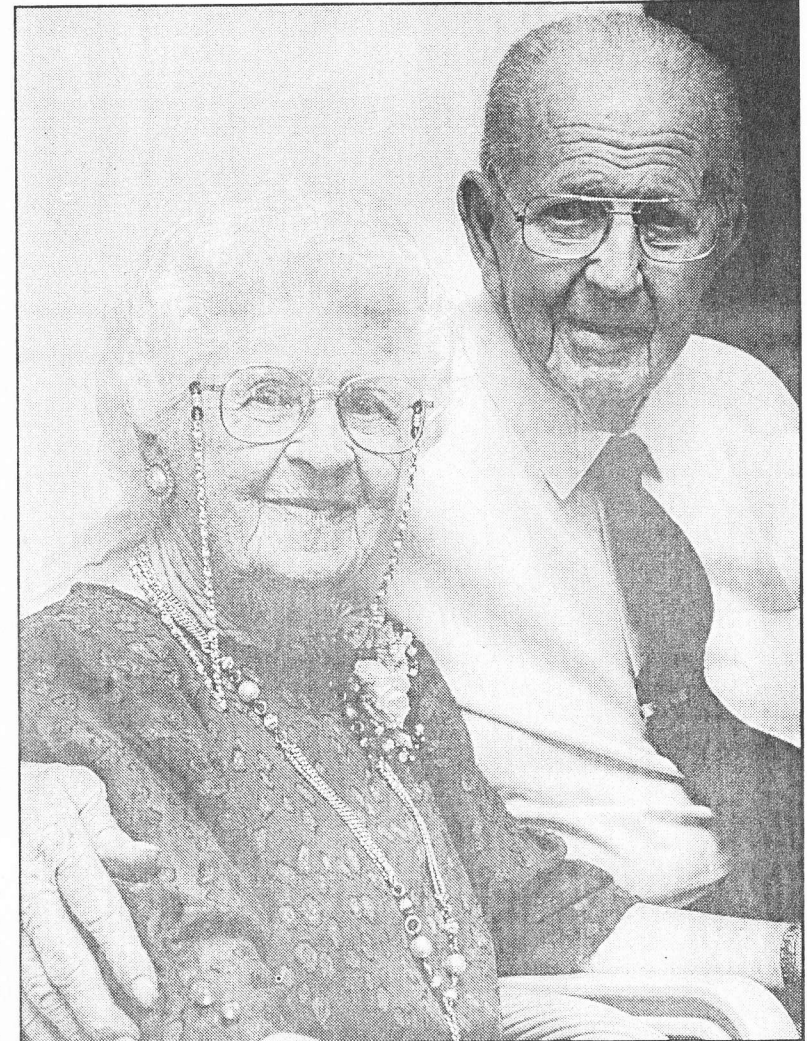

Many mourn loss of pioneer of historical society

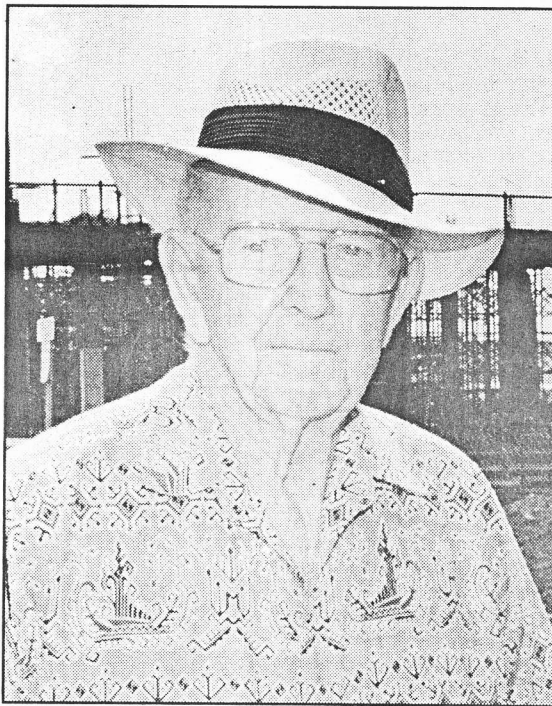

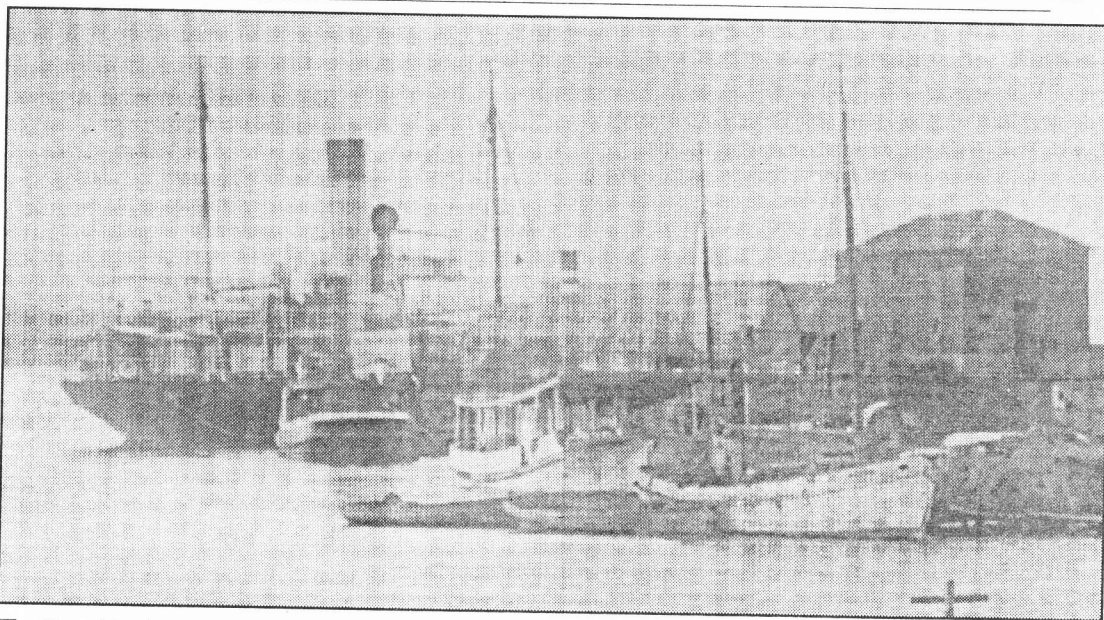
THE SS Macquarie was a prominent part of the shipping trade in Port Macquarie. She was built in Glasgow, Scotland, in 1907, a twin screw, and during its operation to Port Macquarie was under the command of Capt Merrett. It was owned by Nicholas Cain Coastal Co-op Steam Shipping Co Ltd and they were called the blue funnel line, hence the blue funnels. The local agents were William Spence and Geo Smith.

Nicholas Cain had several boats and droghers in his time. His pride and joy was the SS Macquarie. She was a passenger and general cargo carrier between Port Macquarie and Sydney — mostly weekly or less, depending on the loading.

She had a very good passenger accommodation with a stewardess, chef or cook and bar for drinks and plenty of deck space.

She carried general

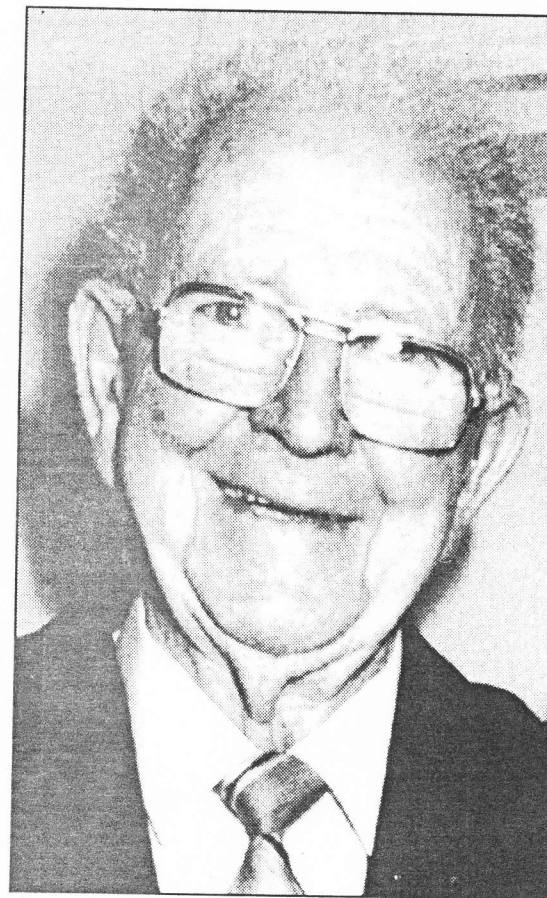

passenger accommodation with a stewardess, chef or cook and bar for drinks and plenty of deck space.

She carried general freight for Port Macquarie, Wauchope and Hibbard and Telegraph Point and even as far up as Bains Bridge. Cargo was off-loaded onto droghers for up river on the Oxley or Wauchope which were single screw boats specially built for river work. They picked up the freight for Sydney calling on farms for freight such as maize, hides, skins, timber, pigs, oysters and fish.

The Macquarie also picked up butter. She had a refrigeration storage for butter from the factory in Bay Street. Freight was

much cheaper by boat than those days than by train from Wauchope and Telegraph Point.

Mr Father generally got sheep from Sydney for his butchery trade through Farmers and Graziers purchased at Sydney's Flemington saleyards at 25 to 30 at a time.

Easter time was always busy in Port Macquarie when the annual regatta was held. Easter Saturday and Monday there were generally 8 to 10 18-foot sailing boats from the Sydney Flying Squadron and six to eight 12-footers all from Sydney by the Macquarie and there were also the crews of each boat.

Good Friday was quite a day when the

Macquarie came in with all the boats and crews. There was always a big crowd down to welcome them as was also the town band.

The regatta was held at Settlement Farm at McInherney's property. This was one great turnout for Port at Easter. Boats were reloaded for Sydney on the Tuesday.

It was very sad to see the SS Macquarie finish up, also most shipping on the coast. She had a crew of about 10 or 12.

Nicholas Cain went into voluntary liquidation in 1929. Their assets and business connections were taken over by North Coast Co in

February 1930. Cain was also a director in the North Coast Co.

Cain owned the Ballengarra at one stage and then the Pappinbarra of 518 tons and the drogher Oxley.

The Macquarie was sold to W.R. Carpenter and Co for the island trade. From then on I don't know what happened. The North Coast Co carried on the trade from Port Macquarie back loading timber and oxide. They finally vacated Port Macquarie in 1939. Most of the coastal boats were taken over by the RAN. Also the state of the river entrance was such that boats were continually being stranded here.

Practically every trip they were in trouble.

I have seen timber and oxide stacked up as far as the post office waiting to be shipped out.

Many a trip I had on the SS Macquarie. The fare was one pound each way which included meals.

When the Macquarie was leaving for Sydney Capt. Merrett would blow the whistle three times — the first whistle half an hour before leaving, the next 15 minutes to leaving and then on the hour of leaving. In that time you had to be on board and settled.

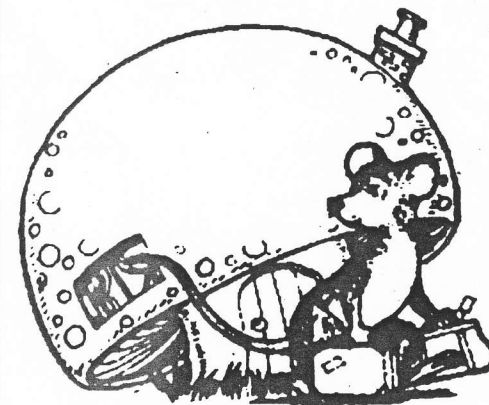
When the Macquarie was returning and was ahead of time and the tide was right they would heave to on certain areas and the crew would cast their lines and fish and would sell the fish when they arrived for extra pocket money.

When the Macquarie was entering Port halfway along the breakwall the captain would blow the whistle to let the population know he was coming in to tie up especially when there was livestock on deck and had to be unloaded immediately.

Sometimes she would be bar bound and couldn't get out the entrance.

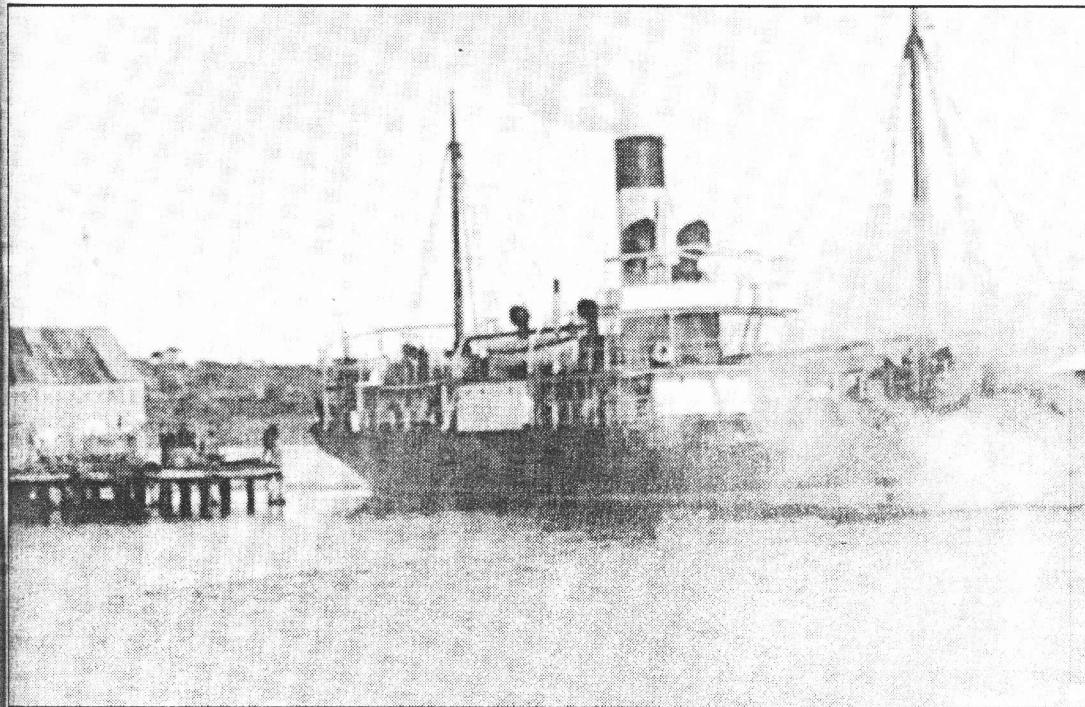

History still reigns supreme

Visitors to the well appointed Hastings District Historical Society in Clarence Street Port Macquarie would be unaware of the huge financial gamble which was taken by the five trustees of the embryonic committee to acquire the convict built 1836 building to house the Society's records and artifacts.

When a public meeting was held at the council chambers on October 15, 1956 to form the Port Macquarie Historical Society, Neville Anderson was elected foundation president; but soon after, this body amalgamated with the Hastings District Historical Society from Wauchope.

In February 1963, the council required the five trustees to be guarantors of a \$7,000 loan to purchase the building: Ron Howell, Raymond Dick, Spencer Alex Bowman, Clarence

Rae Lynne Egging and Neville Andrew Anderson were each prepared to mortgage their homes and businesses to ensure the repayment.

Our story focuses on one of the five men, Neville Anderson, still a member of the society after 35 years, whose service to the community was recently recognised by an Achievement Award from citizens of the community.

William Anderson, a wheel and shipwright, was born at Aberdeen, Scotland, in 1804 and arrived in Sydney aboard the Red Rover in 1832, along with fellow passenger, Bridget Mead of County Cork, Ireland.

The couple were married in Sydney by Reverend John Dunmore Lang on November 16, 1832.

A son, David was born at The Rocks, Sydney on February 5, 1835 and married Elizabeth Philips from Port Sorrell, Tasmania on May 25, 1866 and their children were Caroline, born in Tasmania, Florence, Eva, William (1874), Melvina (1875), Sydney D (1879), Beatrice (1881), Thomas Leslie (1883), Jeanette (1875), Ivy (1887) and Elwyn E (1889).

David and his family were engaged to do restoration work on the Royal Hotel, Port Macquarie and the family lived in a house owned by Lt Wilson in Hay Street, close to the present Garrison Building.

The Royal had been rebuilt with the convict pattern bricks made at Lake Innes by Major Innes and were required to be cement rendered. William Nicolls having been brought from Sydney to do this job.

David Anderson and Bill Nicolls were the successful tenderers for the construction of the Town Hall in 1892 at a cost of \$169/17/6—the bricks came from the demolished asylum.

David also helped in the building of the first St Agnes Church in 1878, the first timber bridge over Fernbank Creek, Jon Hibbard's house, Elsinore (Lindens Travellers Hostel) and the spiral staircase in Hayward House in Horton Street.

His son, William was born in Port Macquarie on January 10 1874, worked as a butcher for the McInherneys of Settlement Farm at their butcher shop in Horton Street (Dymocks Book Store), before starting his own butchery in Clarence Street

Neville Anderson steps down as museum chief

The president of Hastings District Historical Society, Mr Neville Anderson, has stepped down after serving 17 years in the position.

He has been succeeded by secretary for the past 17 years, Mr Ron Howell.

Both are founding members of the society.

Other officers appointed at the annual general meeting were: Vice-presidents, Allen Sargeant and Jack Alexander; secretary, Ron Lushington-Bowles; treasurer, Stuart Peattie; solicitor, Robert Godfrey.

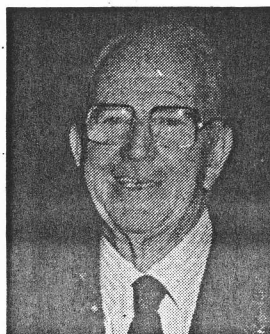
Members of the management committee are: Building, Wal Arnold; display, Ruth Pritchard; house, Evelyn Flarety;

publicity, Ray Fuller; records and research, Frank Rogers; social, Dorothy Sargeant.

In his report for 1982/83 Mr Anderson said that although there had not been the dramatic advances of some previous years, the society had continued to consolidate its activities both in the museum and in other areas, such as research, and this augured well for the future.

Although there had been a small decrease in the overall total of visitors to the museum, group visits of pupils from 47 schools emphasised the contribution the society continued to make in demonstrating the fascinating history of the Hastings area.

A highlight of the year had been the visit of the

Governor of NSW, Sir James Rowland, and Lady Rowland.

Mr Anderson said Sir James had been the third successive governor to be the society's patron.

The visit by the Member for Cowper, Mr Ian Robinson, and Mrs Robinson to present a new national flag and a portrait of the Queen to the society had been an important occasion.

Mr Anderson mentioned the society's participation in obtaining the recognition by the National Trust that the museum, the court house and the "Dunlop" building was a collection of historical significance.

He drew attention to negotiations with the Hastings Municipal Council to regularise future occupation of the museum building on which the society had expended \$61,000 on constructions, apart from the many thousands of dollars represented in stock and fittings.

The society fervently hoped that the matter would soon be resolved and the museum buildings, which had not cost the ratepayer a single cent, would always remain a museum for the enlightenment of residents and visitors.

Mr Anderson said the society continued active membership of appropriate organisations, including the Museum Association of

Australia and the Royal Australian Historical Society, and was now participating in the Hastings Municipal Council's plans for the bi-centennial celebrations.

He complimented the National Parks and Wildlife Service on its restoration of "Roto" and the Port Macquarie Rotary Club on the refurbishing work on the grave surrounds in the Historical Cemetery.

He told members that the setting of historic markers in concrete bases was going well and the placing of the markers at the 21 sites in the area should take place in the next few months.

In the museum itself, a number of display areas had been refurbished, some had been replaced or extended and extensive reticketing had been accomplished.

The major efforts were being made in the setting up of the Pioneer Room on the ground floor front and this had necessitated laborious and careful research to ensure accuracy and wide ranging enquiries for ideas and specimens.

Behind the scenes in the museum, continuous activity was going on to extend and broaden the society's historical research and recording.

Cataloguing and indexing was an ongoing task and purchase has been made of the births, marriages and deaths records on microfilm, the gift of the undertaker's records of the general cemetery were received and recently the municipal council granted permission for access to its burial and deaths records for the municipality.

These facilities enabled the society to provide information on family history in particular to the many enquiries received from residents and visitors to Port Macquarie, Mr Anderson said.
