Preface

This publication has been created as a research aid for anyone who has an interest in the people behind the names inscribed on the Port Macquarie War Memorial who served in World War One. It is not intended to be a definitive personal history of each person, nor a biographical profile. For each person listed there are eleven fields of information giving place of birth, occupation at time of enlistment, next of kin, as well as service number, embarkation details and whether returned to Australia or killed in action. Any significant or interesting facts are included in a general notes field.

The names on the original memorial were inscribed after a public appeal for people to request the inclusion of family or friends names who saw service. For personal reasons some people preferred not to be listed. Not all names are exclusive to the Hastings region either as residents could nominate relatives or friends from nearby, or in some cases, more distant locations.

In the year 2000 names of service personnel who enlisted in World War One, but whose names were not on the original memorial, were inscribed on plaques beside the main memorial. These names have not been included in this publication as their identity, in some cases, has been difficult to prove and some are believed to be variant names of names already on the main memorial. A list of these year 2000 names is included as an appendix to the main work.

Researchers seeking further information on any individual can use the information provided here to access service details at the Australian War Memorial or view full service dossiers at the National Archives of Australia.

Introduction

On a wet Canberra morning, the 11th November 1993, the Prime Minister of Australia The Hon. P.J. Keating MP, delivered a eulogy at the funeral service of the Unknown Australian Soldier. In part he said:

"He may have been one of those who believed that the Great War would be an adventure too grand to miss. He may have felt that he would never live down the shame of not going. But the chances are he went for no other reason than that he believed it was his duty the duty he owed his country and his King."

Prior to August 1914 no conflict or war had involved so many nations, involved so many men and women, cost so many lives or maimed so many bodies. What we now call World War One came to be known then as the Great War by the generations who suffered or died over more than four years of unprecedented horror from 1914 to 1918. Those who enlisted saw it as an adventure, as the Prime Minister said, or felt that they were defending the Empire against German led aggressors.

The Commonwealth of Australia had only been proclaimed some thirteen years earlier and many Australians still considered themselves British. A considerable number had in fact been born in Britain or were first generation. As Trooper Les Pountney of Port Macquarie wrote to his parents on the 1st May 1915 from Egypt:

"...one can't help but feel proud to be a Britisher, under the proud old Union jack"

This from someone born and raised in New South Wales. Les Pountney was badly wounded at the Dardanelles and died on 08 July 1915 aged 26.

Conflict was no longer limited to standing armies on set battlefields. The civilian population became caught up in the war, either through direct assault or through the heavy propaganda of the recruitment processes and conscription campaigns. The war that was to be over in three months was becoming bogged down in the mud of France and the toll of dead and wounded exhausted the ranks of the regular armies.

The numbers of early volunteers soon proved insufficient to replace the thinning ranks of the armies and so recruitment campaigns were stepped up. Propaganda became a powerful tool in recruitment and the pressure on men to enlist became more intense as the war dragged on. The new recruits came from all walks of life - lawyers, teachers, printers, clerks, railway men, farmers, labourers, students - even veterans of earlier

conflicts such as Arthur Douglas Woodlands of Wauchope who had previously served in the Boer war with the Royal Engineers. They were single or married, young or old, from the cities, towns and country areas all across Australia.

Women too became involved, usually in nursing capacities, like Jean Davidson of Port Macquarie who enlisted in the Australian Army Nursing Service and served in the Middle east from 1917 to 1919. Jean also had three brothers who enlisted. Her father Robert, a prominent Presbyterian minister in Port Macquarie and later State member for the electorate of Hastings-Macleay from 1901 to 1910, was one of the original organisers of the North Coasters recruitment march. He led off the march from Grafton and spoke at most of the stops on the way down the coast.

In February 1916 the North Coasters recruitment march entered the Hastings. It was one of a number of marches that originated in country areas and recruited men from towns and villages before terminating at a military barracks for official enlistment and training.

Arriving at Cooperabung by car from Kempsey, the North Coasters received an enthusiastic welcome from the residents of Telegraph Point, Rollands Plains and The Hatch. Two welcome arches had been erected, one proclaiming "Welcome from the Railway". The Taree to Wauchope and Wauchope to Kempsey sections of the North Coast railway line were being constructed at this time and many of the workers enlisted locally. This explains why men from other districts have Telegraph Point as their place of enlistment with no other local connection.

Arriving the next afternoon in Port Macquarie the marchers proceeded to the Town Hall where they were addressed by the Mayor, Mr. D. Stewart and the local member Mr. H.D. Morton M.L.A.. Looking dusty and tired in their blue dungarees the men received a warm welcome from the townspeople.

After speeches the men marched off to the Agricultural Grounds where they were billeted for the night. Saturday evening was devoted to speeches and a musical programme and during the evening many appeals were made for local young men to come forward. Many of the North Coasters fastened on to the men watching and urged them to enlist .The pressure would have been enormous.

On the Monday morning the North Coasters marched out from the Agricultural Grounds on their way to Wauchope where they camped at the recreational ground and enjoyed a swim in the river. As well as the usual speeches and entreaties to the local men to join-up an evening open air picture show screening was held featuring a film called "Heroes of the Dardanelles". After parading at 6:30 am on Tuesday and breakfasting at 8:00 am the North Coasters marched off towards Kew and ultimately Maitland camp. After that the reality of war would soon become evident.

While only a relatively small number of men enlisted during the recruitment marches many more enlisted at the outbreak of war and during the ensuing four years. The enlistment requirements in August 1914 were 18–35 years, height of 5ft 6in (167cm) and chest measurement of 34 in (86cm). In June 1915 the age range and minimum height requirements were changed to 18–45 years and 5ft 2in [157cm), with the minimum height being lowered again to 5ft (152cm) in April 1917.

The Poll will open at eight o'clock in the morning, and will not close until all Electors present in the Polling Booth at eight o'clock in the evening, and desiring to vote, have voted.

During the first year of the war approximately 33 percent of all volunteers were rejected. However, with relaxation of physical standards of age and height, as well as dental and ophthalmic fitness, previously ineligible men were now eligible for enlistment.

The failure of the conscription referendums in 1916 and 1917 caused recruiting officers to be less cautious in applying the official standards. At the outbreak of war Aboriginal people were excluded from military service as all recruits had to of "substantially European origin". By 1917 these standards were altered to allow "halfcastes" to enlist.

A number of local men enlisted early on in the war such as Francis Gannon who at one time drove the mail coach between Port Macquarie and Wauchope. Born in Bathurst, Gannon had only lived in Port Macquarie for a few years prior to the war and, being an excellent horseman, he joined the 7th Light Horse in December 1914. He served in the Dardanelles where he was critically wounded and died aboard a hospital ship. He was buried at sea in July 1915.

Donald Miller Dennis from Kempsey enlisted on the 11th August 1914 and embarked with the Naval and Military Expeditionary Force to

German New Guinea. He was discharged on the 4th March 1915 and subsequently re-enlisted


on the 18th March 1915 serving with the 7th Light Horse. He returned to Australia in November 1918.

Other men who enlisted never got to see active service. Private Firman Gale Judd, a nephew of Mr. A. Judd of Pappinbarra Creek, enlisted on the 11th March 1915. He died in the Liverpool Military Camp hospital of pneumonia on the 13th April, 1915. His body was brought to Wauchope by train and he was buried at Beechwood. He was aged 22.

Percival Ernest Lyon enlisted on the 3rd July 1916 into the 7th Light Horse but died on the 29th August 1916 of measles at the "Coast Hospital" Little Bay in Sydney aged 24.

Alberto Dias Mc Iver (Mc Ivor) enlisted on the 19th June 1917 aged 30. He was returning home by train on final leave before embarkation when he was taken seriously ill. Dr. Begg of Wauchope diagnosed the illness as meningitis. He died in Kempsey Hospital on 24th August 1917.

Another to die of meningitis before seeing overseas service was Reuben Redman. He enlisted on the 19th June 1915 but tragically died at Royal Prince Alfred Hospital Sydney, while based at Liverpool Army Camp, on the 11th July 1915. He was buried in the Presbyterian Cemetery at Rookwood.

Reuben Redman's brother Donald was one of the few known local men who served in the Navy. Donald received his initial training at TS "Tingira" in Sydney before being posted to HMAS Sydney and was on board when the German High Seas Fleet surrendered in the North Sea. He was welcomed home at a Peace Celebration on 16th August, 1919.

Other young men did not make it overseas for far better reasons. Clive Kingsford, a 20 year old Bank Clerk from Port Macquarie, enlisted on the 7th November 1918 but his troopship

was recalled mid Pacific Ocean as the Armistice had been signed. He disembarked around the 28th November 1918 and was officially discharged on the 12th December 1918.

A similar thing happened to Private Leslie Hastings Staples. Whether they were disappointed or not we do not know. However, it is likely their families were not disappointed that the troopships were turned back to home.

With the minimum enlistment age being eighteen, there were numerous instances of underage boys trying to enlist. Some were discovered immediately and sent home, while others managed to escape detection and went off to serve at the front. Underage boys could enlist if permission was granted in writing by one of their parents.

This was the case for Valentine Aloysius Scott Cain of Maria River. Originally enlisting under the assumed name of James Morgan, Cain was rejected as being under age but was allowed to re-enlist under his proper name with parental permission. Having an older brother in the services was often an encouragement for younger brothers to try to join. The pressure to allow underage boys to join would have been an incredibly emotional burden for a parent. In Cain's case his mother gave permission.

One can only imagine the pain and grief of a loving mother who gave this permission only to receive word that your son was killed less than twelve months later.

The great majority of the men that went to France and the Middle East had never travelled overseas before. Many would never have even travelled far from their places of birth. The excitement of seeing England and Europe for the first time would have been an added incentive to enlist. Most would have had no other opportunity in their lifetimes to travel

that far. Some of the letters sent home read like travelogues. Les Pountney described a three day trip down the Nile River as "a very nice holiday". He gave his parents a detailed view of the agriculture and irrigation systems in use in Egypt.

Private W. Fage, writing to his brother at Telegraph Point in May 1918, describes his eight days leave in Paris as anyone else would describe a holiday event:

"...I saw some of the principal sights of the city. The trip only cost me 600 francs, about £20 in our money, but I didn't mind how much it cost me, for it is heaven - on earth to get away from this for a while, and be free to go and come, as you please .I would like you to see the city and some of the country in summer time, as part of it is very pretty.."

Private Robert Colin Graham, son of Mr. Duncan Graham, of Koree Island, Beechwood wrote a detailed letter to his father on July 17th 1916 to relate his Paris experiences:

'Since last writing, some things have happened unexpectedly. I have had a visit to Paris, and was very lucky indeed. Five out of each battalion were chosen to represent the Australians at a review in Paris. The 5th Division — that is our division — is supposed to be the best behaved and trained that has yet arrived in France, so five out of each of our battalions were chosen to go on this tour. Well, I was one of the lucky ones, and consider it an honour to be one of the chosen ones out of about 20,000 men. On our arrival in Paris we were accorded a grand welcome. The streets were lined with crowds of people from the time we left the station till we reached the Pepiniere Barracks. Every nation fighting in France was represented — British, Canadians, Anzacs, Indians, Belgians, French, Russians, New Foundlanders, and South Africans. I think the Anzacs and Canadians were more cheered and got the best reception of any. On the Friday we were marched from the barracks to Napoleon's Square, where all the troops were formed up, and medals were handed out by the President to the widows whose husbands had fallen in the present war. After this a procession was held through all the main streets of Paris, and it ended up by us all being taken back to the barracks again in motor cars. The procession proved a great success, and the French were very pleased indeed with their Allied soldiers. Probably Paris had never seen such a day as this before, being represented by all the Allied nations on her great day of July 14th— the day France was declared a republic. On Saturday we were granted general leave, and were taken about to many of Paris' beauty spots by kind friends. It is indeed a very pretty place, and one could spend a nice little holiday there. We visited the Eiffel Tower, which is now used as a big wireless station. Messages can be sent to all parts of the world from here. Also saw Joan d'Arc's statue, Napoleon's tomb, and a great number of other important places; but, really, we couldn't have the whole history explained to us, as our time was so limited. We were treated exceptionally well in the French barracks, and didn't like having to leave again. We gave our Allied friends three hearty cheers, to which they as heartily responded. We were cheered from the time we left the barracks until we reached the station, and could scarcely march along for the crowds who wanted to kiss us and shake hands as a token of their esteem.'...

Writing to his Aunt Bess on July 22nd, he says:

'Last letter I gave an account of my Paris trip, but in this one there is very little to tell. We have been in action now for a while, and have had a pretty rough time, but we have given our friends the Germans a much rougher one. We were up against some of the enemy's best soldiers — the Prussian Guards, but they seemed very pleased when they were taken prisoners by our men. Some of the German machine gunners were tied to their guns, and could not get away from us. I saw a few chaps I knew wounded on the field. One was Colin Bain, and the other Gus Lawrence, from Port Macquarie. Lawrence was wounded rather badly. I myself never even got a scratch. You could scarcely believe a chap could come out so lucky. Once I got hit with a great big lump of mud in the neck, which resulted from a shell which landed a few yards away."

Private Graham was killed in action 16 days later, on the 7th August 1916, and was buried at Croix-du-bac British Cemetery, Steenwerck, France.

Robert Graham's brother William was also killed in action on the 4th August, 1916 at the Battle of Romani, Suez, Egypt. He was buried at Kantara War Memorial Cemetery, Egypt.

Repatriation of bodies to Australia was impossible. So, Duncan Graham, a dairyman and father of Robert Colin Graham, aged 21, and William James Graham, aged 24, would probably have never seen his sons' graves. This was the same for most parents and relatives of men killed overseas.

Often grieving parents requested the Army to send them a photograph of their son's grave. These makeshift graves, with their simple wooden crosses, were later to be replaced by the haunting military cemeteries we now see dotted across the countryside of France and Belgium with their rows and rows of stark white headstones. In far too many instances however, there was no body found to bury. The clawing mud and the torrents of high explosive shells that rained down upon both sides in this conflict resulted in men literally disappearing. Their names would be later inscribed on one of the various memorials to the fallen but parents and relatives would have no grave to mourn over.

This was the case after the Battle of Fromelles on the night of July 19, 1916 where Australia suffered 5,533 casualties in just 24 hours; among them brothers Eric Robert Wilson and Samuel Charles Wilson of Hibbard, Port Macquarie. A third brother James was wounded and returned home. There were so many casualties on both sides that the German soldiers interred the bodies in mass graves. Ashley Elkins of the Australian War Memorial continues the story of Fromelles and the later discovery of the "missing Diggers":

Over two years after the battle, on the day of the Armistice of 11 November 1918 when the guns of the Western Front finally ceased firing, Australian official war correspondent, Charles Bean, wandered over the battlefield of Fromelles and observed the grisly aftermath of the battle: "We found the old No-Man's-Land simply full of our dead", he recorded, "the skulls and bones and torn uniforms were lying about everywhere". Soon after the war these remains were gathered to construct VC Corner Cemetery, the only solely Australian war cemetery in France. It is also the only cemetery without headstones. There are no epitaphs to individual soldiers, simply a stone wall inscribed with the names of 1,299 Australians who died in battle nearby and who have no known graves. The unidentified remains of 410 are buried in mass graves under two grass plots in the cemetery.

For nearly 80 years this sombre monument remained the only conspicuous reminder of the tragic events of Fromelles until, in July 1998, a new Australian Memorial Park was dedicated there. Situated close to VC Corner Cemetery on a part of the old German front line which was briefly captured and held overnight by the 14th Australian Brigade on 19/20 July, the park includes the stark remains of four German block-houses. A bronze statue, titled 'Cobbers', by Australian sculptor Peter Corlett, depicts Sergeant Simon Fraser of the 57th Battalion in an enduring image of the aftermath of the battle, the rescue of the wounded.

Until recent years, 1,335 Australian soldiers remained 'missing' from the Fromelles battle, having no known grave. Then in 2007, following persistent research by retired Melbourne teacher, Lambis Englezos, archaeological investigations began to uncover the remains of some 200 Australian and 50 British soldiers who were buried in a mass grave at Pheasant Wood by German troops in 1916. Between 30 January and 19 February 2010, the remains of 249 soldiers were reinterred with full military honours in Fromelles (Pheasant Wood) Military Cemetery, newly constructed by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission. Over 90 Australian soldiers were identified by name and more may still be identified.

On 19 July 2010, the 94th Anniversary of the Battle of Fromelles, the last of 203 Australian soldiers recovered from the excavation were buried in a solemn ceremony

with full military honours. Later that day, a private ceremony was held for families of identified soldiers to dedicate the named headstones within the cemetery.

The Wilson brothers were to be amongst those men whose remains were identified in 2010 using DNA techniques. Their remains lay in an unknown mass grave pit for over ninety years with almost 250 other Australian and British soldiers who died at the Battle of Fromelles.

While many of the young men that went away to war did not return, the majority did return but with broken bodies or shattered minds to forever remind them of their inhuman experiences. But for some, like 22 year old Private Stanley Latham of Port Macquarie, the war brought joy as well as suffering.

Stanley left Port Macquarie in 1916 as a 22 year old blacksmith, working in the Bellinger Valley, and returned in December 1919 a battle weary but married young man. Stanley met Doris Bottomley in England and married four months prior to returning to Australia.

Private Oswald Dykes, a horse trainer from the Macleay Valley, whose father lived at Rollands Plains, embarked for Europe in May 1916. He was invalided to England in 1918 and also received the Military medal. The details of his meeting with Alma Aldhons, aged 26 of Swaffam Prior, Cambridgeshire are not known, but her father was a veterinary surgeon and Swaffam Prior is close to the horse breeding centre of Newmarket. An active imagination can see Oswald, with his interest in horses, visiting the area and meeting Frederick Aldhons, Alma's father, and through him, Alma. They married on the 9th April, 1919.

Twenty-two year old policeman Edgar Miller Dennis embarked in March 1916 for the front. His two younger brothers embarked either side of him in February and April 1916. In August 1919 he married 23 year old Daisy Stephens of Newbury, Berkshire. Edgar and Daisy, together with their son, sailed for Australia in 1920 after having to wait for a family ship. Others too married overseas and returned to their families in Australia with new brides.

The experiences of the local men and boys who enlisted and served in Europe or the Middle East, and the impact of their absence and, tragically in some cases, their non-return to Australia, was mirrored in many hundreds of towns and villages across the country. Indeed across large parts of the European Empires. Life in 1914 in the Hastings Valley and surrounding districts was quiet and relatively isolated with major population centres being accessible only by a long road trip or, usually, by sea. The railway was coming but was not yet a mass transport option.

The issues and concerns for most people were similar to today: the fortunes and fluctuations of the agricultural cycles, finding a job, somewhere to live and establishing a family. But the Hastings in 1914 was a world without radio, television, the Internet and

instant news from around the world. News travelled slowly and it was only the imagination that translated cabled reports of European tensions into some sense of reality.

For many young men the pay offered by the Army was more than they were earning as labourers or farm workers. The chance to travel to Europe, the Middle East or "the old country" was alluring as most would never be able to go otherwise. So many of these young men had never experienced life away from home, or much of life itself for that matter, and to be thrust into exotic Middle-Eastern towns or European cities that were so culturally different to Beechwood, Wauchope, Rollands Plains, Laurieton, Kendall or Port Macquarie was "the experience of a lifetime". After all, the war was expected to be over in a few months and they could return home as heroes.

The Great War was a major turning point in world history. It involved more nations, in a vaster and more deadly conflict, than the world had ever seen before. The map of Europe was radically changed, monarchies tumbled, and social barriers and class systems were challenged. The war also ushered in significant social changes that may have taken many more decades to achieve.

Australia as a nation had never experienced armed warfare on such a scale before. Contingents from the colonial states had been previously despatched to the Maori Wars, the Boer war and the Boxer Rebellion. And, of course, there were the armed clashes between the traditional owners of the land and the European settlers. Never before, however, had the European population of Australia been subjected to such widespread and personal losses as families experienced due to the Great War.

The scars of war, and the loss of a significant number of men of that generation, would profoundly impact upon the national psyche. It's impacts would similarly affect the people of the Hastings Valley.

Bruce Wilkins Campbell



Bruce was the 13th and youngest child of William Campbell (1848-1930), born in his second marriage, to Rebecca Mary Wilkins (1850-1939). Bruce was Rebecca's seventh son. He moved to Tweed Heads with the family circa 1903, and attended Tweed Heads Public School.

Private Bruce Wilkins Campbell #4747 enlisted in Brisbane on 3 November 1915. he was joined by two of his brothers - Henry John Campbell #4748 on 21st October 1915 and Sidney Frederick Campbell #4749 on 3 November. He proceeded to France on 19 November 1916 and was taken on strength of 9th

Battalion on 17 January 1917. He was wounded in action during the second battle at Bullecourt on 6 May 1917. Bruce was admitted to the 6th Field Ambulance, and was transferred to England per the hospital ship "St Andrew".

He was admitted to the National Hospital, Queens Square, London on 18 Mat 1917 and died there a month later. He is buried in Brookwood Military Cemetery, Brookwood (near London), Plot 11, Row C, grave 16. A lectern in his honour was presented to the Church of England in Tweed Heads, which was located next to the home he left at 115 Wharf Street.



A brief account of Ronald and Clifford Oates in the Great War



by Ken Oates (Great nephew)

Ronald enlisted in the 1st AIF at Wauchope, on 8 December 1915, a little over a year after the war began. Ronald was 26 years old, and was described as being of dark complexion, 5'10" tall, with blue eyes and brown hair, and had a tattoo on his right arm. His employment was given as teamster, and he was in many ways the archetypal bushman that is such a part of the ANZAC

After his enlistment, Ronald was sent to Maitland where he became a member of C Coy, 35th Battalion. In May 1916, the Battalion was sent to England on the SS Benalla, and disembarked at Plymouth on 9 July 1916. During the voyage Ronald was promoted to Lance Corporal, and trained with the Battalion in England until November 21 1916.

The 35th Battalion embarked for France at Southampton, and was sent to France through the established base port of Boulogne, in the Pas de Calais region, and Ronald found himself at the front in the early part of 1917.

Ronald was promoted to Corporal in the field on 27 January. The official reports state that on 18 February 1917 Ronald received a neck wound while in action east of Boulogne, and was initially evacuated by the 10th Field Ambulance to a Canadian Casualty Clearing Station. Ronald was soon transferred to the No 10 Ambulance train, bound for Boulogne, and was admitted to the 13th General Hospital the following day. He died from his wounds after a week, on the 25 February 1917. His bodied was interred in the Boulogne East Cemetery.

Clifford William Oates

Clifford joined up in Sydney at Victoria Barracks on 30 March 1917, and his records say that he was 5'5" tall, and had been working as a labourer. Initially Clifford was posted to C Coy, 3rd Battalion, who were training in Cootamundra. He was transferred to the second replacements for the 36th Battalion in June 1916 where he joined his brother Reginald.

The replacements were sent to England on H.M.A.T. A15 on 4th September 1916, and arrived in Plymouth, Devon, on 29 October 1916. The Battalion continued training in England until they were transported to Etaples, a traditional fishing port near Boulogne in northern France. The Oates brothers joined D Company of the 36th Battalion and were marched up to the field in mid-January 1917, and saw their first action.

Over the next six months, the brothers were in and out of action in northern France, and then Belgium, and in June 1917 were located in the Messines area.

This was the site of a major action, when sappers tunnelled under the German

position and laid mines in what was one of the biggest mine-based battles of the war.

The mines were exploded on the 7th June and over the next few days the whole front south of Ypres moved deeper into German territory. The men of D Company 36th battalion were kept in reserve during the main attack on Messines, going in to replace other troops on the front line a few days later. Then on the night of the 20/21st of July, D company went into a very difficult action as part of around 80 men who attacked some German strong points, and took two German posts. However, the Germans counter-attacked, and repelled the Australians who suffered significant losses. Clifford Oates was never seen again after going over the top of the trench just after midnight on the 21st July, and his brother Reginald was wounded.

WITH the scars of battle upon him, but smiling and well-conditioned as of yore, Private Les. Stewart roturned to Port Macquarie on Tuesday. Though his parents reside on the Manning, he has been so long domi-ciled here as to be a "Portito" to all intents and purposes. He reached Wingham on Saturday of last week, and received a very cordial welcome from the people of that town. Prior to enlisting he followed the peaceful occupation of a grocer in the store of his uncle, Mr. D. Stewart, answering the call to arms in January, 1916. He sailed the following May, and was sont to France in November, and then commenced his career of soldiering in earnest. He was wounded at Armentieres in April, 1917, and was sent to England to recover. Returning to France, he fought at Messines, and subsequently at Ypres, where he received a shrapnel wound in the left leg, which incapacitated him for further service. He still finds it necessary to use a stick to get about, but hopes to be able to dispense with this aid to locomotion shortly. Private Stewart was a Lowis machinegunner, and his brother (Lance-Corporal Don. Stewart), was associated with him in the same gun team. The latter has been thrice wounded, and is at present an inmate of Bethnal Green Hospital with a smashed knee. In the course of conversation, the returned soldier said he was much impressed with the way the British people were organised to bring the war to a successful issue. They had no delusions as to the magnitude of the task, and were bending all their energies to the work. The way that the women were replacing men in all the avocations of life, so that the latter might be liberated for fighting service, was wonderful and inspiring. No work seemed too difficult or laborious for them to successfully undertake. In an effort to meet the food shortage, intense cultivation was the order of the day, even the vacant spaces on the railway lines were devoted to the cultivation of vogetables. Though impressed by what he had seen of the land and its fertility in England and France, Private Stowart thinks that none can compare for all-round conditions with good old "Now South." We join in extending a hearty welcome to him, with the hope that he will have speedy re-covery from the wounds and privations of war,



They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old: Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning We will remember them.

They mingle not with their laughing comrades again; They sit no more at familiar tables of home; They have no lot in our labour of the day-time; They sleep beyond England's foam.

But where our desires are and our hopes profound, Felt as a well-spring that is hidden from sight, To the innermost heart of their own land they are known As the stars are known to the Night;

As the stars that shall be bright when we are dust, Moving in marches upon the heavenly plain; As the stars that are starry in the time of our darkness, To the end, to the end, they remain.

This verse, which became the Ode for the Returned and Services League, has been used in association with commemoration services in Australia since 1921.

Unveiling the memorial



From the Port Macquarie News, Saturday, April 2 1921

Unveiling the Memorial

"Owing to heavy showers of rain, it was half-past three o'clock when the ceremony of unveiling the War Memorial took place. Notwithstanding the unpleasant weather conditions there was a great gathering assembled when this tribute to the immortal memory of our district heroes was unveiled. The people felt that any little discomfort experienced was a very trifling sacrifice to make for the men whose name was graven on that stone - men who had suffered sickness and wounds and death that they might live in security and comfort all their lives. This was the unspoken feeling which dominated the crowd, and bo discordant note marred the solemn occasion.

The Mayor said they had assembled to fulfil a promise made, when they had a temporary Honour Board, that on a future date they would erect a permanent memorial to the boys who had fought for them. This Memorial and Honour Roll of trachyte and red granite would perpetuate their memory for hundreds of years. There had been a divergence of opinion as to what form the memorial should take but to him it was something sacred, and moreover should be of a permanent character. A hall could not fulfil these conditions. All contributions had been direct and voluntary, and amongst them was a magnificent donation from the Wauchope branch of the R. S. and S. T. League. Many who had seen the memorial said it was one of the finest on the North Coast, and personally he considered they had done the right thing. He would call on the mayoress, Mrs. J. H. Hill, to unveil the memorial.

Mrs. Hill then unveiled the Memorial, and as the flag which covered it was removed, bandmaster McKee sounded the "Last Post", the crowd standing with bared heads as the notes of the bugle rang out.

Mr. R. Davidson thanked the committee for the opportunity to address the largest gathering he had ever seen in Port Macquarie. They had that day been celebrating the centenary of Port Macquarie, and reference had been made to the town's unfortunate beginning. The monument unveiled that day showed that the founders had builded far better than they knew, and the names on the Honour Roll showed what had been done by descendents of those who came here a hundred years ago, and had left the spirit of the British Empire behind them. Great as that Empire was, it was unprepared for the world-war, and might have gone down, just because of her unpreparedness, but for the help of the allies. They must remember the gallant stand of little Belgium, at Liege, which enabled the British Regular Army to get to the front; of France, with the élan and dash of her soldiers, which enabled them to hold the foe at the Marne in the early days of the war; of Italy, who came in late; of Japan for her naval help; of America, whose army and navy rendered great help; and the smaller nations which helped to stem the rush of the common enemy. As new facts were disclosed, they more fully recognized the help rendered to England when she was almost on her knees. They were now feeling the aftermath of the war and there were still ominous rumblings in Russia, Greece and Turkey. The most of the trouble was due to finance and wisdom was needed to deal with this phase of the war's after effects. They must make good the great loss incurred , and ever increasing production alone would make up for the stupendous losses. When they thought of the work of the pioneers they realised what great difficulties had been met and overcome, and the progress made was patent to all; but the younger generation must realise that the days of pioneering were not yet over. New land was waiting to be opened up, new industries to be begun, and vast areas to be populated.

Port Macquarie was destined to become the sanatorium of the North Coast, and was becoming increasingly popular with those who sought rest and recreation. The monument they had just seen unveiled was constructed of Australian trachyte and Aberdeen granite, and would stand for hundreds of years as a record of the heroism of Port Macquarie and district soldiers, who had played their part well. These men had answered the call of duty voluntarily. They had gone away free and unfettered and their record was imperishable one [sic]. The Committee could be congratulated on its choice of a design, as the Memorial was an ornament to the town. They were thankful that so many of their brave boys had returned to take up the battle of peace in the same fine spirit they had displayed in war. The people responded freely towards defraying the cost of the monument, but the sum of £60 was still required, and he appealed for this so that the structure could be handed over free of debt. The sum required was collected in a few minutes, and Mr Davidson then formally handed the care of the monument over to the Mayor as the peoples representative, and expressed the hope that the Council would always see that it was well cared for.

Mr R.A. Price, M.L.A., said the monument was a credit to the town and district, and should be a scared and inspiring object to the generation now growing up. The memory of the lads would had not returned would dear(sic) to them all by reason of the great sacrifice they had made. No more righteous war had ever been waged, and if the German desire had been accomplished, they would not be free today. All would remember the enthusiasm displayed when the boys went away, and the paeans of joy when they returned, and they should not forget what they should not forget what they owed to their valor (sic) and self-sacrifice. He had always fought for preference to returned soldiers; for he believed "That greater love hath no man than this, that he should lay down his life for his friend". The boys had made the name of ANZAC famous, and it was hard to realise fully what these great Australians had done. Their mothers heartstrings had been torn asunder at the parting, and they had left everything to fight for liberty and the Empire. It was a very slight recompense for all they had endured to be granted preference on their return., and it was up to all to see that right and justice were meted out to them. Port Macquarie was worthy of the memorial, and the memorial of Port Macquarie and the boys in whose it was erected. He honoured the women for the great sacrifices they had made. At the speakers request three cheers were given for the women, and heads were bared in honor of Nurse Cavell.

Mr. Theo. Hill, M.L.A., said Mr. Davidson's eloquent address had left him little to say. The speaker then reviewed the last seven years of history. The nations had been lulled into the belief that there would be no more wars, and England gave little heed to Lord Roberts' repeated warnings to the contrary. The consequence was that when the storm broke the Empire was unprepared. he believed then as he did now that it was the most just war that England had ever engaged in. They all knew how well their boys had acquitted themselves. The deeds of their men had been taken as the highest standards of courage. The young men here had done their duty nobly and well. Mr. Davidson had four children at the war (three sons and a daughter), and Mrs Dennis had four sons there and he was glad to know that all had returned. Their memorial was a magnificent one, and go where they would, a more handsome or appropriate one could not be seen. He wished to impress on them all the value of the men's' services, and hoped the memorial would inspire the young boys if the time ever came, with the need for doing their duty as the men whose names were theron had done theirs. He congratulated the people of Port Macquarie on their achievement, and stated that anything he could do to advance the cause of returned soldiers he would gladly perform.

The Mayor said he had received telegraphic apologies for absence from Dr. Earle Page, M.H.R., and the Royal Historical Society. On behalf of the citizens he was pleased to accept the gift of the monument to Municipality of Port Macquarie and trusted that the present and succeeding councils would care for, cherish and look after it which he was sure they would do. It was an ornament to the town, and a magnificent gift, there being few memorials like it.. On behalf of the committee he thanked visitors from Sydney and elsewhere and all present, and hoped they would carry away pleasant recollections of the greatest day in Port Macquarie.

A good number of A.I.F. men were present, some in uniform, and many in civilian attire.

The Town Band, under the conductorship of Bandmaster McKee, played a well selected programme of music appropriate to the occasion in the intervals between the speeches. The bandsman mustered in force, and have rarely been heard to better advantage. The playing of "God Save the King' terminated the proceedings.

The memorial, which occupies a conspicuous position, and is seen to advantage by those entering the town by the main thoroughfare, has inscribed on it the names of 254 district soldiers. A star opposite a man's name denotes he was killed. As the dread sign recurs no less than 51 times, it will be realised what a heavy toll the war extracted from the flower of the district's manhood. On one side of the base of the memorial there is an inscription that reads, "Erected to Commemorate the Great World War, 1914-1919, and the Victory of the Allies". On another side is inscribed, "Unveiled on Port Macquarie Centenary, 30/3/21. J.H. Hill, Mayor". The memorial is an artistic piece of work, well executed. The design of the monument is a modification of an original drawing executed by Mr. good himself, and selected by the Port Macquarie War memorial Committee. On being submitted to the Advisory Board of the Minister for Local Government, alterations to the die and cap mould were suggested, and, on the monument being redrawn, it was approved by the Minister. It consists of a Doric column, mounted on a pedestal and steps, the whole being architecturally correct, both in design and proportion. The total height of the monument is 21 feet, and it is 9 foot square on the bottom step, the material used being a combination of Bowral trachyte and red granite, partly polished and partly fine axed. The column proper is a beautiful piece of stone, made in one piece10 feet 6 inches high bby1 foot 6 inches in diameter, and highly polished. The memorial serves the double purpose of an Honor Roll to those who enlisted and a memorial to the killed. We are of the opinion that the monument, although not as large and as costly as some already erected in New South Wales, is, in proportion and appearance, one of the best, and is certainly a credit to the town; and the contractor for the work (Mr. Alfred Goode, of George Street, West Sydney), who has carried out the work in a very satisfactory manner."

On 23 November 1920, Ernest Ostler wrote to the Director of Soldier Settlements requesting information about obtaining a loan. He stated that he needed the money to purchase an oil engine and circular saw plant for the purpose of cutting out building timber. He stated he had a block at Pappinbarra Creek, near his brother (Alfred) and their cousin. [1] He eventually applied for his loan on 20 January 1921. His block at Pappinbarra Creek was in the Port Macquarie Land District, Parish of Forbes, County of Macquarie – Homestead Farm No. 1920.16.[2]

In April 1921, he wrote stating that his funds had run out and he needed financial help to carry on. He believed that if he received financial assistance to tide him over the unproductive period, 'that he would never look back'.[3] He also stated that he was in good health 'except for the occasional

period of trench fever symptoms which were getting less severe and less frequent'.[4] He subsequently received £100 at this date but also received additional loan money in 1922 and 1924. [5]

By May 1934, he was married with six young children dependent upon him. At this date, he was milking nineteen cows whereas only a short time before, he had twenty nine.[6] As a result of his war injuries, he was unable to do any hard work and was obliged to employ labour.[7] He was receiving 38/- per month for running the Post Office at Upper Pappinbarra and both he and his wife, Nellie Reeson were receiving war pensions.[8] She was an English nurse whom he had met when he was being treating in hospital for his wounds and for being gassed.[9]

Ernest was on his block until 1936 when he share farmed the property.[10] He moved to Port Macquarie for six months before moving to Harrington on the Manning River where he took over the Post Office.[11]

Alfred George Ostler had a Homestead Farm of 222 acres in the Port Macquarie Land District, Parish of Forbes, County of Macquarie. It was a part of Upper Pappinbarra Soldier Settlement.[1] He stated that he required his Advance for a house, clearing, stock, and a dairy.[2]

Albert wrote to the Under Secretary for Lands on 9 June 1923 asking that the terms of repayment be reviewed. He acknowledged that the terms would be manageable for successful settlers and asked that 'the burden be made a little lighter' for himself.[3] It is not known if he was successful in this. By 20 October 1926, he was milking fifteen cows but due to the shortage of feed they were 'strong but low in condition'.[4]It is not known how long Alfred stayed on his block. The last date provided in the loan file is 26 August 1927.

Appendix Four

Recollections of a Soldier Settler's Son

By Tony Ostler Oct.14, 2010

My father, Ernest Ostler, ex 30th Battalion was one of those who took up the option of a block of land gazetted for settlement in an area known as the Cedar Scrub on Pappinbarra Creek some 30 miles in the old scale, from Wauchope on the Hastings River – Pappinbarra Creek being a large tributary to that river.

Firstly I will give you a brief history of my father, Ernest Ostler and the type of man he was. He was a quiet man, some 6 feet tall, dark complexioned, able to put problems into perspective as they arose. All his life he was a person who seemed to me a father figure and people would come to him for advice and guidance. He just went about his business in a quiet orderly way. Dad was born in India, in 1887, at Sitapur, the son of a British Quarter Master Sergeant serving on the North West Frontier. Unfortunately his mother died when he was a very small boy and subsequently his father remarried, I think back in England where most of the 9 children of that marriage were born. In the early 1900's, the family migrated to Australia eventually settling in the Hastings area, where Dad worked at various positions. Following the outbreak of World War I, Dad with 2 of his brothers enlisted in the A.I.F., eventually ending up in France and action on the Western Front. As we all know this was not a picnic in the park, he took quite a battering, wounded in the legs as well as being severely gassed and ending back in a military hospital in Blighty (England). His wounds and especially the gassing were to severely affect his health for the rest of his life. It was while recuperating in hospital that he met my mother, Nellie Reeson, a member of the nursing staff. She was a reasonably well educated young lady and from what she told me and the photos I have seen, back it up, came from quite a well to do Lincolnshire family. Her father owned a substantial amount of property as well as a flour mill. Young ladies of that standing just didn't work in military hospitals, her mother and father didn't approve, especially her mother.

Following the cessation of hostilities with Germany, Dad was repatriated back to Australia and finally honourably discharged at Wauchope. Mum, feisty young lady that she was, against all family wishes, packed up her bags, and followed Dad out to Australia marrying him in Wauchope – I think on May 21^{st} 1921. That will give you an idea of what my parents were like, one quiet and steady, the other more volatile – someone who hated injustice, but who was intensely loyal.

They settled down to married life, Dad working around the area and where three little boys, Keith, myself (Tony) and Bruce were born. It was then he secured the afore mentioned block of land, at what was finally to be known as Upper Pappinbarra. His brother Alfred, also in the ballot secured the adjoining property.

Pappinbarra Creek, headwaters in the now Mount Boss National Park, the largest and longest tributary feeding the Hastings, junctions into two arms some four miles down the creek from Dad's block of land, with both arms gazetted for Soldier Settlement. Now all this land was virgin scrub clothed in some of the heaviest forest, both rain forest and eucalypt on the North Coast, never been touched by the blade of a sharp axe, making the task of clearing the land



for settlement truly a daunting one. A fair proportion was never even occupied by those who won them in the ballot and I'm led to believe one man even committed suicide. I think there would have been sixteen or seventeen blocks all told and to my knowledge only six were finally settled by ex-servicemen, including my father's and two, one on either side of his, occupied. That included my Uncle Alf's.

Dad set about having his land cleared, either felling the trees or ring-barking the extra large ones

which were huge; burning it after it had dried off and then sowing down pasture. Most of the timber for the building of the homes and farm sheds were pit-sawn on the properties or into rough split slabs from suitable logs.

Our old home was built of some pit-sawn timber and slabs and lined to keep the cold out. A veranda out the back and one in the front, with a timber shingled roof. It was built butter-box style (no Jørn Utzon's around then) durable and serviceable. I have no recollection of moving to Pappinbarra, I was still too small, but have a vivid picture in my mind of my mother arriving home in the horse and sulky with baby number four, my little brother David. Dad was on the reins and Bruce in the middle with his leg all bandaged up.

We obviously had been living at Pappinbarra for some time, and while Mum was in hospital producing David, Dad was caring for us older three. Unfortunately accidents can happen in the best of family circles and I was the cause of a rather nasty one, leaving the lid of an opened 4 gallon kerosene tin laying in the backyard, Bruce tripped over it gashing his little leg very badly, which resulted a trip to hospital, hence the bandages and arriving home with baby David.

Another time Mum was doing the family wash in a copper over an open fire in the back yard, Bruce with his little hatchet, splitting up kindling. Toddler David placed a stick of kindling on the block and Bruce accidently severed David's middle finger and badly gashing the other. This meant another trip to Wauchope, 30 miles away in Uncle's car to see the doctor. I can still picture the scene in my mind.

I also remember the February 1929 flood: massive, still talked about in the Hastings by those of my vintage. We were really cut off from the world.

Drought and fires spring to mind and the struggle to keep weakened cattle alive – very trying times for everyone indeed. There wouldn't be many children in Australia who would have heard the eerie call of a dingo which was a frequent event in those days at Pappinbarra

especially on a cold winter's night. Their howling would send shivers up the backs of little boys, as we cuddled together in their bed, the animals only a few hundred yards away.

In the mid twenties with the phone now on and Dad working in the postal exchange, in a one room office erected on the end of the front of our veranda. This was a wonderful boon and gave a little extra cash for the finances. In the early days, Dad also had the mail run using a horse and sulky, where he had to pick up the mail from the next post office. I think this was at least twice a week to some 10 miles away. Finally we had a mail-man who arrived in a car three times a week.

Like most children in those days, slackness wasn't encouraged and we all had our farm chores, feeding chooks, pigs, and poddy calves and many other jobs. By the end of the twenties a good set of bails and a dairy had been built and set-up and a herd of cows to use them. Our cows were very quiet and it was not unusual for Bruce and me, one on either side with stools and bucket to milk one of the cows standing in the yard. We had become quite adept at hand-milking. I wouldn't do it now, no way. I guess it would be around this time I developed a great love of cattle, both dairy and beef to this very day. It gladdens my eye to see a good herd of cattle and always will.

The dairying industry at that time was totally different to what it is today, and the keeping of pigs was essential to supplement farm income. Subsequently corn or maize as it is known, was grown to feed the pigs to add to the separated milk as their diet. The combination produced very good pigs for sale. Corn paddocks had to be ploughed up with draught horses and prepared for planting, not too many tractors around then, they arrived on the scene post World War II. Then the young corn had to scuffled and again with horses with an implement known as a scarifier to keep down the weeds and hill the young corn. This was all hard work and very time consuming. At the end of this and with the onset of winter, the corn and the cobs that developed dried off and had to be pulled (that is the cobs) and put in the barn. Again, with one horse and cart, and now with all hands on deck: Mum, Dad and the kids and anybody else who showed up. The weather was a big factor, the corn had to be dry for pulling. Corn pulling didn't always go down too well with the kids, but it had to be done. As an aside, the young corn cobs, colloquially known as mutti was a delicious supplement to add to the dinner table as well, for the family. Still to this day, I love it.

Chooks were another essential for their eggs and the table, and of course they had to be cared for and housed every night. We didn't want any of them falling prey to a marauding fox or quoll, even a goanna pinching the eggs. I still like chooks.

Fruit and vegetables are a must on any farm, there were no supermarkets then and it was too far away anyway, so we always had plenty of vegies and fruit. Mum did a lot of fruit preserving, especially peaches, pears and plums, and it was all hands on deck again peeling the fruit. There was much grizzling and moaning from the younger generation. Any large containers were used for preserving even an odd kerosene tin was brought into use. Dad would cut the lid off, thoroughly cleanse the tin ready for the fruit and then solder the lid back on with the fruit cooked and inside.

I might add some history here on the value of the four gallon kerosene tin. With no electricity, all lighting had to be from lamps run on kerosene, and being so far from town it was much more expedient to buy it in bulk. The empty four gallon drums (square in shape), were made excellent use of in a multiple of ways. Vessels for carrying water around the

house and garden, having the lid cut off, and a handle put in for carrying. Also in the dairy, especially for washing down purposes and carrying separated milk for calves and pigs. They also found a use in outside dunnies, very important, as there were no inside toilets those days. Also while I'm on the subject of bulk, the same went for sugar and flour. All in bags, you never knew when you might be cut off from town by floods or even bushfires. My mother always made good use of the bags in many ways especially the flour bags. She was a very practical woman. We made our own butter from the cream produced on the farm. All hands to the wheel turning the churn for the finished product. Homemade bread was always on the menu, Dad was a dab-hand at baking bread and with a growing family it was a never ending job. A great combination: fresh bread or scones, fresh cream and homemade jam. The elixir of life!

Transport was always a problem, Dad never held a licence, so no car. For the very early years of the children's lives there was the pony and sulky, until Dad came very close to losing his life trying to cross a flooded creek. No pony, no sulky. From then on it was either the mail car of the cream lorry for a necessary trip to Wauchope. The kids and men on the back of the cream lorry with the cans: shame if was raining!

Dad always kept a vealer or two, plus the same with the pigs for farm slaughter and meat for the table. I hated having to help skin a beast which was not the most pleasant job in the world. No fridges or freezers in those days and because of the lack of electricity, much of the meat had to be salted down and preserved in a specially made brine. Also the old time meat safe came in handy and hung up in cool air, and kept away from those icons of the Australian bush, blow flies.

Education: My mother especially was very strong on this aspect of life and as there was no school closely situated, she elected to teach us through the old Blackfriars Correspondence School. She was well equipped to do this and laid down basics until a subsidised school was built on the property and a teacher was engaged to put a bit of polish on us kids and the neighbours children. At most there would have been up to a dozen children attending. The teachers and there were three all told over a period of time, always boarded with our family, one teacher Bill Lake in particular, had a profound effect on my life as a person which has benefitted me greatly. Unfortunately he was to lose his life, while serving in the R.A.A.F. during World War II.

There is so much I could recall, but there is a limit to everything. Life was hard for parents, their sacrifices monumental, but the children knew no other life and by and large were happy and contented. Education being the main factor in my family's case, change had to take place. At this time 1936, when I was 12 years of age, Dad made the big move. Share farmed the property out and moved to Port Macquarie for six months, until relocating to Harrington on the Manning River and taking over the Post Office there. I finished my primary schooling at Harrington Public and then on to Taree High for the rest of my school days.

By that time World War II was in full swing and Japan was causing a bit of angst in the Pacific Zone I was now 18 years of age and joined the Army. I had a bit of a problem persuading my parents, especially Mum, giving permission so that I could join the A.I.F. but she finally gave in. I served in various places in Australia including Darwin when it certainly wasn't a tourist attraction, finally being posted to Bougainville and active service. I was in Rabaul at the end of the war before returning to Australia and was discharged in Sydney after nearly 4 ¹/₂ years Army service, and still only 22 years of age.

I returned to the old farm at Pappinbarra exactly 10 years to the month since I left in 1936. A lot of water had flowed down that old creek in those years, I had well and truly grown up, seen quite a lot, met and associated with a lot of wonderful men, some who never made it back home.

I joined my brother David, now grown up on the old farm. We had dairy cattle together until I bought my own farm next door, having met and married the lady of my life, Pat a city girl. I ran a successful farm, raised three wonderful children and seven grandchildren, now at 86 well and truly "retired". Unfortunately I'm now on my own, but still very active and enjoying life, with a great family and many friends.

This sums up my recollections as a soldier settler's son and I feel so honoured to be the son of that man, Ernest Ostler and his redoubtable English war bride.

Appendix Five

Charles Henry "Harry" Nicholls

Charles Henry "Harry" Nicholls was born on 6th February 1897 to William Wood Nicholls and Catherine Lyon Nicholls (nee Paddle) at Port Macquarie. He was killed at Pozieres, Belgium on 12th September 1916. He is buried at 127 Railway Dugouts Burial Ground. Zillebeke, Belgium. Harry bought a diary in France to record his experiences and it is reproduced below courtesy of Anne Keena, a relative.

The first daily entry in Harry's diary is for 19 March 1916 and the last date of entry is 10 September 1916.

MARS (March)

19 Dimanche (Sunday) Inspected at Serapeum Camp by the Prince of Wales and his staff. Band played the King and a march while they rode past.

20 Lectured and inspected by our Battalion CO. Commanding Officer Major Stephens.21 Left Serapeum Camp at 3.30pm and bivouacked at Railway Station till Iam. Then entrained for Alexandria.

22 Entrained at Serapeum Railway Station at lam for Alexandria arriving there at 10am. Embarked on board the Cunard Liner Ivernia for France.

23 Allotted our life boats in case of accident. Had to wear our life belts all day. Inoculated second time. Lights out every night at seven.

24 Alarm sounded and all hands had to fall in at their boat posts.

25 Passed Malta on the left.

26 Passed Sardinia and Corsica. Water very calm. (Sunday)

27 Arrived at Toulon and lay in the harbour till 6am 28th. Three other transports in the harbour.

28 Left Toulon at 6am for Marseilles arriving there at 10.3Oam after a fairly rough trip ad being sick once. Drew near to wharf 1pm. Disembarked at 4.30pm and marched through the streets to the town. Entrained at 7.30pm

29 Passed through some beautiful villages. Stopped at Lyons and supplied with hot water for dinner by French nurses.

30 Stopped at Versailles a town just out of Paris for tea. Saw the Eiffel Tower of Paris.

31 Arrived at Renescure after trip of 58 hours in the train. Allotted our billets. The bandsmen billeted on a farm.

AVRIL (April)

1 Had a look around the village with some mates.

2 Played the hymns for church parade in the morning and at a concert by the men of A Company at night.

3 Alarm given and we all had to get out of bed at 9.30pm and were marched down to the village and had to stand to arms for an hour.

4 Very cold and windy very much like as if it was going to snow. Played a programme in village square in the afternoon.

5 Practiced some fresh marches in the morning and wrote letters in the afternoon.

6 Played programme in village square in the afternoon. Was paid our first pay while in France £1.8.8 or 40 franc.

7 Every man in the Battalion had to join his ranks and we were marched about 2 miles to a big paddock. Had to go through a dummy trench full of gas with our helmets. A Tommy Officer gave us a lecture on gas and how to use our helmets.

8 Practice in the morning. Half Holiday. Wrote some postcards. Daily routine. German Fokker plane came down in the village and the driver taken prisoner. Came down thro' running out of oil. Word came through that another had come down in the next village.
9 Received orders to be ready to move off at 7 am on the 10th inst. Supposed to be going to the trenches. Two taubs(?) flew over the village. Played programme in the village in the

afternoon.

10 Left Renescure village at 7am arriving at our new billet at 1pm after a march of 16 miles. We were very tired and foot sore .Passed through a lot of villages. Billet on a farm on the outskirts of the village of Merris.

11 Had a hot shower bath at Divisional showers and a change of under clothing. Walked to the village of Meteren and had a look around. A heavy bombardment started about 4.30pm not very far

away from here.

12 Woke up at 5.30am and had to be ready to march onto the parade ground. Fallen in on parade ground and inspected by General Walker. It rained nearly all day. Received letter from England.

13 Went for a short route march in the morning. Weather a little warmer. Received letter from Edie

14 It rained in the morning. Went for a short route march and sleet began to fall on our return journey. Joyce Paddle's birthday.

15 Sleet still falling. Went for a long route march with D and C Companies and the Captain shouted a drink for each bandsman (22 in all) when we came back for our good playing.

16 Church parade in the morning. Generals Birdwood and Maxwell and their staff were on parade. Played a programme at Battalion Headquarters in the afternoon. Weather getting warrner. Received letters from L Mander, Rita and Maude.

I7 Still raining and very cold. Issued with our steel helmets. A rumour going round that we are off to the trenches on the morrow.

18 Left Merris at 11.30am arriving at our next billet about six miles nearer the firing line at 2.30pm after a pretty rough march through water and slosh. Paid 5 francs or 317. Billet in the outskirts of Sailly.

19 Left Sailly for the trenches. Entered trenches about 8pm. On duty from 9pm till stand to. The trenches are very sloppy. Relieved the Pantanks (?) (an English regiment.)

20 Had to stand to from 4am till 5am. Germans very quiet with their rifles. Two German tanks flying over the trenches

2I On duty all night and on look out duty with three mates working one hour shifts. Still raining and the ground very sloppy. Watched as duel between French and German aeroplanes and anti-aircraft guns. One German plane brought down.

22 Stood to from 4amto 5am. Still raining and very cold. Germans firing a few ins-bangs but no damage done. Received letter from Rita.

23 Weather very warm. Left firing trench and went into the supports for four days spells or light duties. Put on guard for the four days. Having a good time. Part of firing line which we occupy is called Layes River Post. Piece of aluminium dropped near my dug out.

24 Usual daily routine guard duties. Watched the Germans shelling a couple of cottages at the back of our lines and a couple of airships.

25 Continued guard duties. Germans shelled our communications trenches. Watched our aeroplanes manoeuvring over the enemies lines. Terrible rifle fire going on between our men and enemy during the night.

26 Continued guard duties. Germans shelling our lines with trench mortars. Warned to keep our gas helmets as the Germans were making a gas attack on our left flank. Received letters from Aunty Hilda and Ethel Grahame

27 Guard duties as usual. Very heavy artillery duel between our gunners and the enemies from 10.30pm to I 1.30pm. We were called out of bed and had to stand to for the hour. A lot of shrapnel and pieces of shell dropped about my dugout.

28 Weather continuing very warn. Enemies fire very quiet all day. Watched enemy firing at our

aeroplanes and some of the shrapnel and pieces of shell fell over my dugout.

29 Weather still very warm. Very heavy rifle fire on our right flank early in the morning. Still on guard duties. Received letters from Thelma A Roper (?), Daisy Kean and Rita's photos. Letter from Rita.

30 Guard duties. Watched the German's trying to bring down three of our planes. Three of the planes flew off across the German lines towards Germany. Came back into firing line in the evening. Received letters Vera, 2 home, Rita, Bill, Ruby Denham, 2 Thelma, E Hollis.

MAI (May)

1 On look out duty watching enemies trenches. Things very quiet.

2 Our guns opened up on enemy for a bombardment but enemy would not reply. Our aeroplanes manoeuvring round on the lookout for enemy gun positions.

3 Relieved from trenches by 4th Battalion. Sent back into reserve billets. Put on guard over Tommy's gun supports very good job. Fourteen Tree is the name of guard post.

4 Enemies aeroplanes flying round on the lookout for our big guns. Driven off by anti aircraft guns. Was told by a Tommy that the gun we are guarding put a German Field Battery out of action. Noise enough to deafen one when the gun fires.

5 Day very sultry. Germans shelled the battery we are guarding, but no damage done to guns. The farm houses nearby blown to bits and road blown up. Our battery opened up on Germans in afternoon. Very heavy bombardment on our left flank. Germans attacked under gas.

6 Things very quiet along the line. Had a walk around the town of Bac-Saint-Maur.

7 Days still warm. Gun removed to another part of line. A few aeroplanes flying over head. Things very quiet along the line.

8 Weather wet and cold. Strong wind blowing from the west. Too windy for aeroplanes. Paid 20 francs or I4/-.

9 Still raining and very cold. A few aeroplanes flying about.

10 Relieved from guard duty by men from B Company. Sent with some more men to dig a new communication trench near firing line in the night. Got back to billet after I2pm. Received letter from Richard.

11 On duty with Pioneers putting duck boards down in new support trenches from 7am till 4pm. Made to walk about 3 miles from the billet.

12 Still on the duck board fatigue for a couple of hours. Shifted from old billet to a guard billet.

13 On fatigue work filling sand bags for dressing station behind firing lines. Weather very wet and cold. Received parcel from L Bones 1212116

14 Weather finer and warmer. On fatigue with pioneer surveyor surveying a section of the trenches. Saw Cpl H Price (?) Received letter from Thelma

15 On fatigue building dug out for dressing station. Weather very wet and ground sloppy16 Still on dug out fatigue. Germans fired a lot of shells at one of our batteries and our aeroplanes.

17 Had a day off to-day. Weather lovely and warm. Rumour going round that we are going back to Sailly tomorrow for a month's spell. Third Brigade taking our place in firing line. Received letters 2 home, ?,2 Edie, Thelma, Phyllis, Claude, Preston.

18 Removed from reserves back into drill billets for drill and a spell. Received papers home, Edie and Rita.

19 Had drill for four hours. A few aeroplanes flying about. Lectured on how to talk when we are in the village.

20 Weather very warm. Given a lecture on the use of gas helmets. Paid20 francs or I4I-. Received letters from Rita and Edie Welch.

2I Weather very hot. The men are having a bit of a jollification and have painted some of their faces with the soot off the field kitchen. Received letter from Claude.

22 Weather very hot. On fatigue digging trench for cable wires from 8.3Opm 21't until4am22"d. Saw Jim Badge (Budge?). Had a walk round Sailly with him. Received letters from Rita, Aunty Edie and Aunty Bess.

23 Sent to relieve a man on guard at the Tree Post. Saw a fight between two game cocks. English officer driving along in car stopped and had look at it too.

24 Empire Day. On daily routine of guard duties. Weather very warm in morning but dull and cold in the afternoon. Rained a little during the night. Tank machine manoeuvring round well behind our firing line our anti aircraft guns fired on it but failed to bring it down.

25 Still raining and cold. Still on guard duties. Things seem very quiet in the firing line.

26 Weather very dull. Very heavy bombardment going on the left towards Armentieres. A few aeroplanes flying round.

27 A bit of strafing going on with our guns. Weather a little brighter. Received letters Rita, Lucy W, Rene W and Mabel.

28 Nothing to state.

29 Very dull and inclined to be cold. Watch the trail trip of the new aeroplane. Raided during the night. Cleaned dirt from along duck boards of trench.

30 Still dull and cold. Very heavy bombardment on our sector of the trenches now occupied by 3'd Brigade. Received letter from Rita.:

31 Weather very warm. Went to YMCA at Bac St Maur and met Jack Mills. Rumour reported that 2"d Brigade lost a lot of men in previous nights attack.

JUIN (June)

1 The Battalion inspected by Mr W Hughes but I was unable to go as I was on duty. Watched a

couple of our aeroplanes chasing a couple of tanks. But tanks too fast for ours. One of our observation balloons broke away and the wind carried it away across the German lines. Received

parcel from Rita.

2 Germans putting a lot of big shells into the village of Tilverbaix (?) and nearby.

3 (nothing written)

4 Germans shelled the road and billets not far from here. Heard rumour that there has been a big naval battle in North Sea and 20 of our ships sunk. Heavy bombardment on our right flank during the night.

5 Weather very cloudy, windy and exceptionally cold. Got full account of North Sea battle in paper. Rained during the night.

6 Still raining and very cold. Very little artillery fire on our sector of line. Staff Officer inspected our post. Received parcel from Richard.

7 Weather very dull and cold. Paid 20 francs and then went over to canteen and YMCA to get some requisites. Received letters Edie, Roy, Claude, Mabel A and A Atkinson, E Welch, Rita, Olie

(?), Mrs Staples, Aunty ??

8 Weather still dull. Went to Bac St Maur for a walk saw J Badge. Saw the account of Lord Kitcheners death in paper. Filled the day in in writing letters. Received letters mother, Rev Wilson, Claude and Thelma.

9 Rumoured that we are going into the trenches again tomorrow. A pair of planes flying over head. Received parcel from Mrs Teare.

10 Left 14 Tree Post relieved by 8th Battalion. Left Sailly for firing line at 8pm got to post at 11pm. Rained nearly all night. Received letter from Lena, Rita, Richard, Maude, D Orchard, E Hollis, L Bones, Papers from Edie and parcel Renie W.

11 Still raining but cleared off later in the day. Had a look at German trenches about 300 yds from our own. We shelled the German parapets with our trench mortars.

12 Still raining and fairly cold. Raiding party went out from D Company to German lines and captured six prisoners and a machine gun and killed a good many. Rita's Birthday.

13 Still raining and very cold. Had to stand to from 12pm till 8am while raiding party was out. Our artillery bombed Fritz's parapets to pieces. Received papers from Edie and Rita.

14 Transferred from A Company to Scouts Platoon and attached to D Company. Weather a bit finer. Received Sydney Herald from Rita.

15 Weather cleared up and warmer. A party went out on patrol from A Company and met a German Patrol which bombed them wounding some.

16 Sun shining brightly first time since we came in. Gas alarm sounded during the night and we all had to stand to. Heavy bombardment on our left flank.

17 Weather still fine and warm. Watched a duel between three enemy planes and three of ours. Two enemy planes supposed to be brought down inside their own lines and one behind our trenches. on patrol work in no man's land during the night. Received letter Maude.

18 Went down the line to 2 Battalion to see the boys but they were away. Payed 20 francs. Heavy bombardment all night.

19 Weather very dull and cold again very much like rain. A lot of strafing going on with the artillery.

20 Weather fine and warm. Saw a big fire in church at Armentieres caused by an enemy shell. Church burnt to the ground.

2I Weather still fine. Saw Jim Badge (Budge?) and had a good yarn with him. A lot of aircraft manoeuvring about and enemy fired a lot of shots at our planes. Took reports to headquarters.

22 Watched another fight between two of our planes and a tank. Pulled out of bed about midnight for gas alarm and had to put gas helmet on.

23 Heavy storm in the afternoon. A lot of strafing going on with the artillery. A shell burst in a dugout and wounded three men. Received letters t home, 2 Rita, Claude, Thelma, Lucy, Edie, Bessie.

24 Heavy artillery duel all afternoon. Relieved from trenches by 4th Battalion. Saw A Andrews and M Way in Fleurbeaux after I got to my new billet. Had a stroll round the village.
25 Had a look round he town with one of my mates. Went on fatigue laying cables in the night. Heavy bombardment going on nearly all the time we were there. Arrived home at2am.
26 Slept till 9.30an and had breakfast about 10am. Our officer inspected our gas helmets in the afternoon and gave us a short lecture.

27 Trained nearly all day. Our CO gave us a lecture on gas and carefulness of speech when talking to strangers. Inspection of rifles and rations

28 The enemy shelled the billet of B Company and caused a number of casualties. Had a yam with A Andrews. Heavy artillery action during the night.

29 Weather finer .Watched a fight between two of the scouts. Went on fatigue at night at 'Convent Wall' putting up barbwire fence for entanglements and had to come home early on account of bombardment.

30 Went to Bac St Maur for a bath. On fatigue putting out barbwire entanglements at night. Heavy artillery fire all the time we were working. Fritz spotted us and turned a machine gun on us but no one was hurt.

JUILLET (July)

1 A lot of aeroplanes flying about. On gas guard at night. Heavy bombardment on our right. Warned to go away with bandsmen to practice some new marches but did not go
2 Fritz put a shell into our billet about 3am and we all had to get out as quickly as possible but no more shells followed.

3 Fritz shelled our billet again about 3 am and we had to get out, one shell hit the road nearly

opposite our billet and wounded 3 of the scouts and killed one. Ordered to get our gear ready to proceed to Sailly. Left Fleurbaix at I2pm and proceeded to our new billet about 1 mile out of Sailly.

4 Had a good feed of cherries fresh off the trees. Had a walk round with two mates and had a look at the countryside.

5 Had a kit inspection and rifle drill in the morning and a route march in the afternoon. Received letters home, 2 Rita, Charlie.

6 Drill and bathing parade in the morning. Went for a route march about 6 miles in the afternoon. Marched through Dalleuil and around the outskirts of Estaires.

7 Bomb practice and bayonet drill in the morning. Went for another route march through Dalleul and back through Estaires. Received letter from Maude.

8 Inspected by our Colonel in the afternoon and were told that we were leaving the billet early next morning.

9 Left our billet at 7 .30 and joined the battalion about Sam and marched about 8 miles arriving

at our old billets that we were in before we went to the trenches.

10 Left billet at Outerstune at 9.30pm and proceeded to railway station at Bailnet. Left station at 12.30 for unknown. Arrived at Flenvillers-Candas station at 6.30am. Left station at 8am and proceeded to a village about 8 miles arriving at 12 noon. Village Domaft

11 Arrived at village of Domart at 12pm. Had good rest ready for next day.

12 Left billet and marched about 8 miles to our next village. Had to climb a large hill and when

at the top had a good view of the countryside village Vigna Court(?)

13 Left village about 2pm and proceeded to next village about 12 miles off. Passed through three small villages on the route. Village Allenville(?)

14 Bayonet exercise and squad drill in the morning. Met Mick Coombes with Norm Way in the afternoon. Paid 20 francs or I4/-

15 Bayonet drill in morning. Ordered to stand by in case we had to move off in the afternoon. Mess orderly for the day and had to draw water out of a well about two hundred feet deep for the cooks. Received letters home, Rita, and Edie.

16 Left billets at 10.15am and proceeded to Warby-Ballion a village about 8 miles nearer the fring line.

17 Went for a route march in the morning and had to stand by ready to move off at half hours notice.

18 Had to stand by all the morning. Had physical exercises in the afternoon. Saw three German prisoners going along the street under escort.

19 Came into the trenches at night. A lot of heavy strafing with the artillery while we were coming in. Received letter from home

20 On fatigue carting water and rations. Dug a dugout for myself. Very heavy bombarding at night. Ona Keena's birthday.

21 On fatigue carrying bombs and flare lights ready for advance. More heavy artillery duels. Watched a duel in the air between two of our planes and two of the enemies. One of the enemies brought down. Our planes also set one of the enemies balloons on fire.

22 General advance. Scouts and bombers went over the parapet and advanced to an unoccupied trench and cleaned it out. Bombardment started about T2pmand the advance followed.

23 Scouts and bombers lined out into shell holes and dug a sap about one hundred yds from German front line. Heavy shelling all night. Watched 5 of our chaps capture 4 Germans in a cellar.

24 Germans shelled our trench all day. Had to retire out of it late in the afternoon but went back later on.

25 Captured a trench with bombs and machine guns. Took a lot of prisoners and left a lot of Germans killed in the trench. I was wounded in the right arm and right buttock late in the afternoon. Was driven in motor car to different dressing stations and then taken to No 3 clearing station.

26 Wounds cleaned and dressed in the morning. Left clearing station by train at about 12.30pm and arrived at Etaples about 7pm. Entered No 1 Canadian Hospital. Bob Campbell in the same ward as I am.

27 Nothing to report

28 (nothing written)

29 Marked for convalescent camp. Weather very hot and sultry.

30 Was inspected by Doctor. Went to church in the evening with the Sister of the ward I was in.

31 Left No 1 Hospital for convalescent camp about two miles away. Weather very hot. Went to a concert in YMCA hut at night.

AOUT (August)

1 Went to Base to get some pay but did not get any. Met Vic Kenny whilst there. He had just come from England.

2 Inspected by Dr of conv camp and had wound dressed. Went to the orchestral recital in YMCA hut at night.

3 Went down to the Australian training camp to find some of the boys but had to no luck. Went to concert in YMCA hut at night.

4 Inspected by Dr and marked for Oasa. Met some boys from Camden Haven in YMCA hut.
5 On ration fatigue in the morning had to go to railway station to load ration wagons. Left

convalescent camp for Base, arrived at Base at 6.30pm and met Bob Burns Sgt Major of B Company 1't Depot Battalion.

6 Paid 20 france by adjutant of 1't Depot Battalion. On fatigue moving tents.

7 Details fallen into line and the officer asked for volunteers to join the Battalion. I was one to volunteer. Inspected by Dr and passed fit.

8 Joined depot lines in the morning and issued with all shortages. Listened to a lecture given by Secretary of Royal Army Temperance Association. Watched aeroplane land in the Bull Ring and went down and had a good look at it and watched it rise.

9 Watched a dirigible flying over the channel. Went to the hospital to see a mate in the afternoon.

10 Went to the Bull Ring for bomb and first aid instructions. On ration fatigue in the afternoon.

11 On fatigue all the morning. Went to rifle range for instructions in the afternoon and had to march about six miles.

12 Drill in the morning. Went for a steam bath with my mates in the afternoon. Weather very hot.

13 Went on church parade in the morning. Went to church and communion at night.

14 Had a tooth pulled by the camp dentist. Paid 40 francs £1.8.8.

15 Went to Bull Ring for drill but came back to camp early with three mates.

16 Went to Bull Ring for drill. On fatigue during the afternoon carrying rations. Went to concert in the evening given in aid of the Depot Band.

17 More drill in the Ring all the morning. Went to concert in the YMCA at night.

18 Drill all the morning.

19 Drill in the morning. YMCA sports in the afternoon. I made one of the team in the tug of war. Artillery team won the pull.

20 Drill in the Bull Ring in the morning. Went to Church and communion in the evening. Received card from Aunt Nancy.

21 More drill in Bull Ring. Went to Mr Lorell's lecture on the war in the evening.

22 Drill as usual. The YMCA finished off their sports from Saturday afternoon.

23 Instructed by SM that we are to proceed to Battalion on the morrow. Went to lantern lecture in YMCA tent.

24 Inspected by Dr and Camp Adjut in the morning. Left camp about 2pm and proceed to train. Left Etaples station about 3pm for Battalion.

25 Arrived at No 3 Clearing Station about 2pm after a very tedious trip. Marched from station to Talmas camp about five miles distant. Left camp at 6.3Opm after having tea and marched to Donllans to Batt.

26 Arrived at Donllans about 2am. Entrained with Battn and proceeded to our next camp arriving

there about 1 1.30am.

27 Went to church in the morning. On in lying picket from 5pm till 6am. Received letters from Edie and Lucy.

28 Drill parade for about four hours. A lot of our aeroplanes scouting round and two or three observation balloons up one near our billets. Saw M Way and he told me some of the boys were killed. Received letters from Roy and Bess. Received parcel of socks from Lucy.

29 Drill in the morning. Went for a bath to the Canadian baths in the afternoon. It rained nearly all night. Gas alarm given about eleven pm.

30 Raining all the morning. No parade but we had to clean our ammunition and examine our helmets.

31 Orders issued for us to get ready to proceed to the trenches. Saw J Badge and M Way in afternoon. Came into trenches at night. Trenches very muddy. On duty till next morning.

SEPTEMBRE (September)

1 On day look out duty. On fatigue cleaning out trenches in afternoon. On post at night with three mates. Germans sent a few trench mortar bombs over.

2 On day lookout duty again. Things very quiet this morning. A bit of strafing going on in the afternoon. Received letters from Rita and Lena.

3 Fritz putting over a few trench mortar bombs. Rained nearly all night and very cold. Received letter from mother.

4 Still raining and very cold. A bit of strafing going on between our guns and Fritz's. Heard a mine blown up on our right flank. was told that v Kenny was killed.

5 Weather finer but still cold. Things very quiet during the morning. More trench mortars flying about in the afternoon. Received letters from Aunty Bess and E Hollis.

6 Beautiful fine day. Relieved from firing line by ? Btn. Marched back to second support trenches. Very comfortable dugouts. Received letters 2 home, 2 Rita, Richard, Lilly and Vera.

7 Had a cosy time all day. Went on fatigue to firing line with timber for mine at night. Got back about 12.30


8 Slept in till 9am' Weather beautiful and clear and warm. On fatigue in advanced sap at firing line. Arrived back to dugout about 4.30am. Received letters from Lena, A Ettie., Mabel, Lucy, Rita 2 Thelma and 3 Maude.

9 Slept nearly all day. Paid 40 francs £1.8.8. Came into support trenches to relieve Nos 1 and 2 Platoons. Received letters from A Ettie, Claude and Rita

10 Things very quiet in front line. Canadians blew up a mine in no-man's land. Saw J Badge (Budge?) and had a yarn with him.



Pte. 2854 " <u>Killed in Action 12-9-16</u> " A shell struck the dugout where Nicholls and others were resting, at Mont Sorrell - Ypres Salient. on September 12th 1916. I assisted to dig them out. Nicholls was then dend. I saw his body taken away for burisl and saw his grave in a small Military Cemetery situated between Woodcote Farm and the railway dugout. Nicholls was a cornet player in the 2nd Battalion Band. 6ft fair, age 24-25.




9th Reinforcements. 2nd Battalion. A.I.F. Liverpool, August 1915.

This is a transcript of the last known letter written home by Harry Nicholls just 15 days before his death.

Mrs W O Keena 'Fern Hill' Ballengarra Wilson River NSW

28th August, 1916

I received your welcome letter last night with one from L Welch and I got Roy's and Bessie's this morning, so you see I read yours first as you wished I would. I am very sorry to hear of poor Grandpa's death and I am sorry dear Mother did not get down to Sydney in time to see him before he died. It is nearly time Aunty Rose had a holiday and it ought to do her good is she can stop in Port for a couple of months. I am glad the boys had such a good time while they were down home, I suppose I will see a big difference in them when I get back. I suppose dad has plenty of news to read in the papers now as things have been pretty lively of late. I suppose you have heard ere this that I was wounded at Pozieres (which place I

guess you have heard a lot about) but thanks to the care of the Nurses in the No1 Canadian Hospital my wounds are alright again and I am back with my Battalion. Glad to hear you got PO's alright. I have not received Lena's letter or papers yet. I suppose you will hear before you get this that Mick Coombes was killed in action. I saw him a couple of days before we went into the trenches. You asked me about Roy Dransfield in one of your letters. Well I only found out the other day that he was in this Batt and has been wounded. The chap that told me about him said that he was a splendid fellow and very religious so his people need not worry about him going astray. I met the son of the manager of the mill down near the wharf the other day, he is in this Battalion too. Joe Borger is back in the Battalion again and looks real well after his spell. The days are beginning to get short again here and it is getting cold of a night time. I had a card from Aunt Nancy a couple of days ago, she seems to be getting on well again. Well Edie I think this about all this time so I will ring off hoping to hear from you again soon. With love to all from your ever loving brother and uncle Harry XXXXX

PS the extra kisses for the boys.
