The Bonny View Shop

Established by the Litchfield Family

The Litchfield family, Frank, Margaret and Valentine, came to Bonny Hills in about 1953 when Frank took a job as compositor at the Hastings Shire Gazette in Wauchope.

At first they rented Jack Parker's house, then moved to the house east of "Boronia", later McCredies. Here they started a small shop in the garage under the house which opened at weekends only.

Margaret and Frank cleared a lot of the scrub and rubbish around the headland and down to the beach with hand mowers and brush hooks. Council did not bother too much in those days.

Margaret obtained employment at the office of Hornsby Sawmills in Wauchope so they bought a combi van and ran a small bus service to take the local kids to High School in Wauchope.


Seeing the potential in Bonny Hills, Frank and Margaret built the Bonny View Shop with living quarters behind it.

During Christmas holidays the Litchfield family hosted Rock and Roll dances in their living room for holidaymakers and locals. They were a lovely family and very community minded.

After about 20 years of service to the Bonny Hills community, they sold out and retired to the Atherton Tablelands in North Queensland.






The road from North Haven to Bonny Hill was nothing but a sand track which started where the North Haven Surf Club car park is now and proceeded just behind the sand hills. As the track came to the start of Bonny Hills the track went over the hills, which in those days were quite steep and very slippery in the wet. The road proceeded down the hill to where the Surf Club is now, fairly close to where the concrete footpath is now.



Memories of Childhood Holidays in the 1940s



Clare Webber (nee Martin)

Recently Clare recalled the times she visited Bonny Hills in about the mid 1940s.

Clare and her sister Ruth travelled by train from Sydney when she was about 8 and 9 to have holidays with her uncle Harold Martin and his family.

She remembers being collected from the railway station at Kew by the Suters family and travelling along a bush track to get to Bonny Hills. At the time Clare's dad, Alex Martin, was working with Harold and lived in Bonny Hills for 12 months.

Clare recalls the Martin's had a house on one side of the creek and a property where they grew vegetables on the other side. A sign on the old bridge said "Martin's Corner".

One of many happy memories was of the times concerts were held on the back of an old truck and everyone around joined in the fun.

Memories from Roger Masters visits to grandparents in 12 Seaview Street

The house at 12 Seaview St, Bonny Hills holds many happy memories for me. It was owned by my grandparents, Gordon A Fisher and E Mary Fisher.

He was headmaster of TAS 1940-60. My mother is June Fisher, their daughter. We first visited Bonny Hills in **1959** that I recall but I don't have any photos of that time. My family lived in Taree, where my Dad (Elliott Masters) was a GP from 1952 to 1961 when we left to go to England. My grandparents, known to me as Ma & Pa, also came to England at that time and Pa taught at Shrewsbury for a short while as he headed for retirement. We returned in 1965.

The photos of the front of the house, including dirt road, were taken in **1969** and include our 'new' car. There were no houses on each side. It was a lovely house and garden. (The brick veneer and number of additions and enclosures came after 1972, the year my grandfather died of a stroke.) There were virtually no other houses. The McCuddens lived opposite. Beyond them you could see the water tower.

I recall the daily walks with my grandfather down to the rocks to fish, on an old track from the end of Seaview St that lead beside an old timber post & wire fence. Often I would walk through a side gate into the western next door block they owned, then down to the post office to collect the mail from the pigeon holes.

In **1969-72** I would surf the beach, but I believe the sands have now moved and it's a lot smaller. The house had a large living room and after a day of swimming, fishing, reading etc we would watch the ABC news at 7 and then something like Ronny Barker etc. Near the front door was a long cedar bookcase, full of interesting books that I would fill my time in on those visits.

My grandfather planted some Norfolk pines in the eastern next door block that they owned; they are gone but the Norfolk pines you see down near the PO and the beach, he also planted.

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Jan Carney remembers the historic well at Bartlett's Beach

I remember surfing at Bartletts Beach, known to me as "Little Beach" when a very young girl. We would enjoy the surf and then go to the shower under the reservoir to rinse off the salt water. The water was crystal clear and ran non stop from the overflow of the well through a hole in the roof of the shower. The water came from a natural spring which runs through the reserve near the amenities.

Unfortunately, progress and development of Bonny Hills spoilt this wonderful reservoir as in the early seventies new residents to Bonny Hills were required to install septic tanks. The septic tanks were pumped out by a truck and disposed of. Due to the expense of having to pump out the tanks, many tanks were left to overflow with the effluent finding its way to the reservoir

Hastings Council as it was known then decided it was a health issue and ordered the reservoir to be emptied of its water.

My father Alex Sharkey worked for the Hastings Council in the mid seventies and was asked to "blow up" the reservoir.

He was quite upset about having to demolish it because he had also enjoyed holidays each year with his family the Suters, but as an employee of the Council proceeded to carry out their wishes.

He placed explosives at the base of the wall and set it off. The concrete in the walls was made from sand and grit from Bartletts Beach and was very hard and strong - it didn't succumb to the explosives much to his delight. However a small hole was made in the bottom which served to drain the water and that is how it stands today.

The well acts as one of the best environmental friends the old weathered cliff face could have. The natural spring plus water from the above residential area still spills into the reservoir. It then overflows onto the rock platform at the base of the well - NO EROSION.

Take note of the erosion caused by the drainage installed some 100 metres to the southeast of the well. Pipes were installed under the road and open out onto the reserve. In a downpour the local children ride their boogie boards down the reserve. The water channels its way across the reserve and gushes down the cliff face causing massive erosion.

I would love to see the well preserved for it is a very important part of Bonny Hills heritage and the history of its early settlement.


Wouldn't it be wonderful if life was still simple enough for the old shower and reservoir to return?

Let us think back to all the things that have been knocked down in other villages for progress and look ahead to preserve our well.




Musical talent runs in the family for the extended Bennett brood of Bonny Hills

The secret of living in harmony

IT'S tempting to paint the Bennett clan as an Australian version of the von Trapps or the Partridge Family, yet there's nothing quite like them.

Meet mum Shirley, 56, dad Ross, 53, and their musical brood, Steve, Beau, Bonnie, Free, Cassie, Tifanee and Ginger, ranging in age from 15 to 36. They live in Bonny Hills, on NSW's mid-north coast.

Cassie, Bonnie, Free, Tifanee and Ginger make up the vocal group known as The Bennett Girls. Steve and Beau rock a little harder in the band Ghost Road.

To keep things in the family, Ghost Road's line-up has included one of the children's uncles, various of the girls' partners and father Ross.

The only family member unwilling to get up on stage is Mrs Bennett.

"I enjoy singing," she says, "and the family always sung a cappella in the car or on the bus, but I've been busy as a mother and babysitter."

Mr and Mrs Bennett have raised their musical children in an unorthodox manner.

Although the family now lives on acreage at Bonny Hills, the Bennetts spent many years travelling and living in old buses, eking an income by making and selling leather goods.

Ghost Road and The Bennett Girls have recorded CDs, but the demands of school limit the girls' ability to tour.

The blokes, who have built a music studio on the property, often perform two shows a weekend.

"When we were kids, Dad always had musical instruments lying around," says Steve Bennett, 36.

"Nothing was ever pushed on us but, because they were there, it was just natural we'd eventually pick them up.

"When Ghost Road started, Dad and our uncle were in the band. It was totally family-oriented. Now we've got Bonnie's boyfriend, Brody, and Free's boyfriend, Ben. They've been around so long they're classed as family anyway."

Most Fridays, Ghost Road go to gigs as far away as Sydney, Narooma and Nambour.

Despite the travelling, Steve says: "We want to see how far we can take this."

"It wasn't an expensive lifestyle, because we reared kids on natural foods and didn't eat meat," Mrs Bennett says. "It's easy and cheap, don't have a lot of junk."

"We never ate fast food, Coca-Cola, cordial or alcohol. You can survive without a lot of money."

"When Beau was in his first year, he came home one day and said, 'Mum, are we hippies?'"

"I looked it up in the dictionary and it said a hippie is one who chooses not to go the ordinary way, so I guess we are."

One of the Bennetts remains on the family's Bonny Hills property, where it was as a kitchen until last October.

"The girls want to start a clothing business," says Mrs Bennett, "so they're doing a bus out as a workshop."


