Correspondence

Municipal Council, re sanitary arrangements at Xmas time, stating that the Chamber's letter had been received.

Opinions were expressed that the Council should take action to provide additional services at Xmas time, and it was finally agreed to take the matter up with the Council again in September.

HOME BUILDING AID SOUGHT

A special commonwealth allocation of £10 million should be made to building societies to enable home-building to be stepped up, the director of the Building Industry Congress, Mr. Stewart Fraser, said recently. Mr. Fraser said there were signs of a falling off in home building.

Some cottage builders were not working at their peak and were having difficulty in holding their tradesmen together.

Building costs could only be kept down if the trade was fully occupied.

The building societies had a waiting list of up to 25,000 people.

Most of the members owned their own land, had deposits, and were ready to build immediately.

Mr. Fraser said the deposits held by building society members must run into a colossal amount. This was "dedicated money" and it was a tragedy that it should be lying idle.

The present disinclination of the banks to make finance available for housing means a good opportunity for individuals seeking a sound investment in their own district, where they can watch over it. Most home-seekers are happy to pay interest rates equal to or

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FLOODS PREVENT NOMINATION

Although Mr. Radford Gamack, sitting Country Party Member for Raleigh, will win the seat unopposed in the coming State elections, only the floods of last week-end prevented Cr. Harry Bailey from nominating as a Labour candidate.

his nomination to the Electoral Officer at Kempsey on Friday.

Cr. Bailey lives at Dorrigo and early in the morning commenced his trip. He encountered difficulties at the Thora Bridge, which was under water, but made the crossing without mishap.

Cr. Bailey explained that it was necessary for him to personally complete the formalities of nominating, so he regretfully had to turn back with his mission unfulfilled.

Chamber Approached Council Re Fire Station

The aldermen discussed the matter of a site for a fire station on Monday night as a result of being approached, in correspondence by the Chamber of Progress.

Chamber of Progress, asking what was the position regarding the acquisition of land for a fire station and whether part of the Police land was likely to be available. They suggested as a site the unused part of Bridge Street, west of Horton Street. —To be informed Council had no reply from the Police Department.

Ald. Crisp pointed out there was anxiety in the town regarding the establishing of a fire brigade, and nothing much could be done until the matter of a site was finalised. He felt it was up to Council to take some positive action. He couldn't see that all the police land held in town was wanted. He supported the move to try and expedite the matter through the Chief Secretary's Dept.

Ald. Kenny said there were blocks in Bridge Street and in Lord Street which the town could get for nothing. He moved and Ald. Baxter seconded, that steps be taken to acquire one of these blocks.

Ald. Cowan and Bale moved an amendment that council take steps to have the Chief Secretary's Dept. expedite the matter of acquiring or otherwise portion of police paddock land.

The amendment was carried.

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LAY-BY NOW

NO POLICE LAND FOR FIRE STATION

The Municipal Council has been informed that it can't have any of the police land for the purpose of a fire station.

Council decided to see what Ald. Kenny could do about it when next in Sydney.

The Mayor, Ald. D. S. Kennedy, presided, and there were also present Ald. Stanfield, Cowan, Baxter, Walker, Bale, Kenny, Crisp, and Brownlow. The matter came up in correspondence:—

Chief Secretary's Department and L. C. Jordan MLA, regarding request for part of the Police land to be made available as a site for a fire station. The Police and Justice Departments say that it is essential that they retain the whole of their land for future Departmental requirements. They pointed out that Council occupied land diagonally opposite the Court House which should be sufficient for a fire station. When a site had been decided upon the Board of Fire Commissioners would assist Council in relation to plans and specifications.—Ald. Crisp pointed out Council's land was necessary for its own development; Ald. Kenny said there was land on the harbour side of the lock-up doing nothing.

Ald. Baxter moved that the

matter be held in abeyance until such time as Ald. Kenny was again in Sydney, to see what he could do in the matter.

Ald. Bale seconded.

Ald. Crisp claimed Council had plans for a civic centre, designed to cover the whole of its present site.

Ald. Brownlow pointed out the discussion had been going on since 1944, when his shop was burnt out. Council had been getting no where, he said.

He moved an amendment that steps be taken to have portion of the library site made available.

The motion was carried.

Residence For Headmaster

The Municipal Council will support a move to have the Education Department build a home here for the headmaster of the school.

Ald. Bale had a notice of motion carried on Monday night as follows:—

"That this Council write to the Minister for Education asking for a residence to be built for the Head School Master on the Department's vacant allotment in William Street next to the Domestic Science School."

Ald. Stanfield seconded.

Ald. Walker and Brownlow said it as no business of Council.

The Mayor, Ald. Kennedy, pointed out that the headmaster was at present living closer to the Tacking Point Lighthouse than the school; it was necessary for him to be handy to town, as the headmaster played an important part in much of the town's life.

Ald. Crisp pointed out that the R.S.L. had made a move towards getting a home erected for the headmaster, and suggested council might back up that move.

The motion was carried.

EDITORIAL

SMOKE AND FIRE

Providence played the major role in averting a second disastrous flat fire in Port Macquarie on Sunday afternoon last.

Heavy smoke from the source of the fire caused it to be detected before the building was well alight.

The most primitive method of fire fighting—a bucket brigade—was the means of bringing the fire under control.

More stark contrast with the modern block of flats and surrounding buildings could hardly be imagined.

There is little need to dwell on the extent of the tragedy involved in the destruction of flats—or any buildings—by fire.

However, the scream can't be too loud where the means of meeting the challenge of fire is concerned.

More flats and dwellings, and more people have trebled the dangers in recent years.

But the same passive approach to the question of a fire station site, or the provision of some temporary means, remains as it was when the town had no need for a brigade.

The Municipal Council is the authoritative body the residents have to look to, and it can only expect the criticisms freely levelled at it, for its lack of positive action.

Nor does it do the Council credit that the night after the fire its meeting went by without one word of mention of the problem.

Rather than castigate, we feel that the best means to an end is to appeal to the Council on behalf of the people to take some immediate action to provide a fire-station site, and in the interim some temporary equipment.

Introducing the subject, Mr. Lloyd McNeill pointed out there had been one disastrous fire, and three other near disasters, in the past few months.

He felt that something could be done to make some temporary equipment available and have a "local brigade" trained in the use of it with some one in charge.

FURTHER PROTEST TO MINISTER FOR PUBLIC WORKS ON WATER SCHEME HOLD-UP

FIRE STATION ON POLICE LAND?

The Municipal Council is to make further applications for portion of the Police Dept. land for a fire station site, and will endeavour to form a volunteer brigade.

This was decided when a letter from the Chamber of Progress was being dealt with at Monday's Council meeting.

The Chamber of Progress wrote expressing dissatisfaction with the progress being made to secure a site and suggested that if portion of the Police paddock was not available the unused part of Bridge Street, west of Horton Street might be acquired. Also that action be taken to organise volunteers into a fire fighting group.

The Mayor pointed out that arrangements had been made to have the premier inspect two sites, one in the police paddock in Murray Street, and one north of the police lock-up in Hay Street, and the Chamber is to be informed of this.

Council also resolved to call a public meeting for the form-

Department Inspection Sought

The Municipal Council on Monday night decided to make further protest to the Minister for Public Works for the delays with the water scheme, and will also seek an inspection.

Council decided on this action after receiving the following unsatisfactory letter from the Minister, Mr. McGrath.

The letter read in part:—

"Headworks: Contractor for this section, which includes the intake staging, pumping station and balance tank, is Boulder Pty. Ltd. Continual high level of the Hastings River delayed this contractor the year, but the work was for the first three months of approximately 65 per cent complete at the end of May. However, the concrete floor of the pumping station was poured in an unsatisfactory manner and the contractor was instructed to replace it. In an effort to save as much time as possible & reduce the delay caused by inferior construction, the Department has now prepared an amended design for an additional concrete floor to be constructed at Boulder's expense on top of the floor already placed. This will delay the completion of the work

but the Department cannot allow contractors to take advantage of urgency of construction to perform inferior work.

Bernard Victor Kenny, eldest son of the Hon. J. L. Kenny, M.L.C., and Mrs. Kenny will be ordained as a Priest in the Roman Catholic Church of St. Agnes' in his home town of Port Macquarie on Sunday.

This will be the first ordination of a priest at Port Macquarie, and the ceremony will be performed by His Lordship, Rt. Rev. Bishop Farrelly, DD, Bishop of Lismore.

Twelve visiting priests, along with Monsignor Farrelly and Fr. McGovern, of Port Macquarie, will take part in the ceremony.

During the course of his studies, Bernard Kenny spent four years at Spring-

wood College, and a further four years at the Manly College.

After his ordination on Sunday, it is expected he will return to Manly until the end of this year, when he will be assigned to a parish.

The service at the Church on Sunday will commence at 10 a.m. on Monday morning at 8 a.m. The newly ordained priest will celebrate his first mass.

It will be a proud day for Mr. and Mrs. Kenny and Bernard's brothers and sister, and also for the Sisters of St. Joseph Convent School, where he commenced his studies.

Mr. and Mrs. Kenny have issued invitations to a banquet luncheon, to be held in the Royal Hall at 1 p.m. on Sunday.

His letter reads:—
To the Editor P. M. "News"
Sir—I was surprised to learn by report in your issue of the 12th inst. that the P. & C. Association was advocating the taking by the Education Department of part of the old golf links park for the purpose of building a High School. This would be a retrogressive move and to put it bluntly "the height of May day madness."

Port Macquarie today is sadly deficient in sports areas and park lands. What will the position be in the next decade or two? In the old golf links area the people of Port Macquarie have a priceless treasure and a gift of nature that cannot be assessed.

With its close proximity to the Town Beach and other amenities and its elevated and healthy situation and with careful planning to sports areas, and park lands I can visualize it in future as a place of beauty and a mecca for thousands of tourists and a haven of contentment and pleasure for the adult population and their children.

The area is small now, and if a sufficient portion was allowed the Ed. Dept. to build a High School with its necessary trimmings it would add one more chapter to the tragic chain of errors of public matters that has retarded the progress of this beautiful and picturesque portion of the North Coast in the years gone past.

A well attended public meeting on Tuesday night decided to ask the Municipal Council to press on with its efforts to acquire a suitable site for a fire station.


Messrs. Swynny (Forestry) and H. Young (deputy captain of Wauchops brigade) were present and gave the meeting much useful information.



MOVE TO SPEED FIRE STATION

The Mayor, Ald. D. S. Kennedy, will personally take up the matter of a fire station for Port Macquarie with the Board of Fire Commissioners in Sydney.

In a mayoral minute on Monday night, he told council of the public meeting held on July 17th.

A Fire Brigade could operate prior to the completion of the Water Supply using supply from Kooloonbung Creek and the sea. Council would have to secure land and provide for the building of a station and it was desirable to have a residence attached. The site should be near the shopping centre.

It is Council's responsibility to find suitable men, a captain and nine men, their names being submitted to the Board for interview and final selection. The men are paid retaining allowances and for attending fires and drills. The cost of running the Brigade is met by Insurance Companies 75 per cent, the Government 12½ per cent and Council 12½ per cent. Rating would not exceed 1d. in the £.

The meeting asked that Council press for the acquisition of land for a fire station site.

During the discussion on the mayoral minute it was pointed out Council had to find the land and erect the building; the Fire Commissioners then

paid rent and rates.

Plans of suitable buildings were available.

Council carried a resolution to approach the Board of Fire Commissioners with a view to them making an approach for the acquisition of police lands adjoining the lock-up; further that the Commissioners make plans available.

Advantages of Liming Apparent This Winter

Whilst the cheapest feed is pastures it is dependent on seasonal conditions and so supplementary feeding will always be necessary.



The Engineer was asked to make all possible inquiries re trade-in values of the vehicles to be sold and report to next meeting, meanwhile tenders to be called for new vehicles.

Plans For New Building

Council approved final plans and specifications for Port Macquarie offices and show-room, as submitted by the Architects. Instructions were issued to call tenders for the work.

Reduced 'Plane Service

The reduction of East-West Airlines service from three days per week to one provided Council with much disappointment, and it was considered that the subject should be discussed with the General Manager & representatives of the Board of Directors of the Company. Failing a satisfactory outcome of these discussions, it was suggested that representations be made to the Commissioner for Transport.

Chairman and Clerk to determine where would be the best place to carry out tests. As it appeared nothing could be done to prevent the tests, the Chairman and Clerk were appointed to meet Mr. Whitton.

Questions

In question time, Cr. Hollis asked what progress was being made with Pappinbarra extension; also had anything further come of the proposed extension to Ellenborough, previously deferred because of the high guarantee cost.

As the cleaners had intimated verbally that they would apply for increased cleaning fees because three meetings per month were now held in the meeting room, Cr. Cr. Kennedy, in his position as Mayor of Port Macquarie, asked for Council's views on the Municipality annexing portion of Bridge Street, near Kooloonbung Creek, for a Fire Station. It was pointed out that the O.C.C. would have first right to annex land as they owned the adjoining property. The Chairman felt that it would definitely bring down the value of Council's land.



FIRST STEPS TAKEN FOR FIRE BRIGADE

The Municipal Council on Monday night decided to have the town's water scheme reticulation area declared as the fire brigade area under the Act.

The Council was dealing with a report from the mayor (Ald. Kennedy) on his recent visit to Sydney.

Present were the mayor (Ald. D. S. Kennedy), Ald. Stanfield, Cowan, Baxter, Walker, Kenny and Crisp.

Mayor's Report

The mayor's report read:— I conferred with members of the Board of Fire Commissioners concerning the formation of a volunteer Fire Brigade and also to enlist their support regarding the acquisition of a suitable block of land adjoining the Police land in Hay Street.

Mr. Watt, the Secretary, and a member of the Board, Ald. Duff, were present.

The first step is for Council to ask for application of the Fire Brigade Act to apply over a certain area of the Municipality, and to agree to comply with the requirements of the Fire Board Commission, to build suitable premises which will be rented by the Board.

They will supply the engine recruit and drill men, send an officer to train them for two weeks, 2,000 feet of fire hose, plus other equipment. Insurance Companies pay 75 per cent., Council 12½ per cent,

and the Board of Fire Commissioners 12½ per cent, 5 per cent, on capital outlay of building as a rental, maintain premises in good condition, also pay rates if applicable.

After these steps have been taken the Architect of the Board and a Member will visit Port Macquarie.

On the motion of Ald. Crisp and the Mayor, Council resolved to have the reticulated area of Port Macquarie declared the fire brigade area under the Act.

Ald. Kenny had a further motion carried that efforts be made to obtain an area of Crown Land on the western side of Lord Street, as a fire station site.

Cost of Building

The Mayor told Ald. Kenny that it usually cost about £4000 for a fire station building; if a recreation room was provided the building would cost an additional £1500.

It was the Board's experience that where recreation rooms were provided some members of the brigade were generally about the station, and consequently on call if required.

The desirable block of land was 50' x 150' but need not be that large.

MUNICIPAL COUNCIL CORRESPONDENCE

Board of Fire Commissioners of NSW, stating that the proposed site for fire station would be inspected by the Board's Architect as soon as practicable.—Received.

Minister for Local Government, advising Mr. Jordan, MLA, that his personal representation re Golf Club loan would receive consideration and he would be advised of the result as soon as possible.

Port Macquarie Hockey Club, stating that they were contemplating erecting Club House and Toilets and they believed Council assisted sporting bodies by way of grants. The amount they would like would be about £300.—To be asked to submit a concrete proposal to the Council.

Bush Fire Committee, forwarding a copy of the booklet "This is the Law" which summarises the provisions of the Bush Fire Act 1949, and advising that members who offer their services do so on a voluntary basis purely as a community service. Workers' Compensation (Bush Fire Fighters) Act 1944, covers all brigade personnel and other

"Fire Fighters" defined in the Act without any payment to the Fund, also covered by the provisions of this Act is damage to vehicles or equipment. Councils may in any one financial year levy rates not exceeding one-twentieth of a penny in the £ on the UCV of rateable land within the Municipality. There is no other provision in the Act whereby property owners may be called upon by Councils to meet costs involved.—Received.

Port Macquarie Pastures Protection Board, Camping Reserve 197, stating Council would be advised when the Board had considered the request.—Received.

CHAMBER'S WIDE AND VARIED ACTIVITIES

In a joint report, the president and secretary (Messrs F. M. and David Donovan) told of the wide and varied activities of the Chamber of Progress at last week's annual meeting.

The report, adopted by the meeting read in part:

The Chamber has, at the close of its financial year, a financial and active membership of 50. At the close of its third year, it is felt that the Chamber has the support of the citizens of the town and that its representations to Municipal and public bodies have the weight of public support behind them. An increase in the number of its active members would naturally strengthen its position and any citizens interested in the aims of the Chamber, namely the progress of Port Macquarie, are invited to join its ranks and lend support to the work to be done in the year ahead.

The Chamber suffered a loss during the year when in March last its able and enthusiastic Treasurer, the late Ross Simpson, was suddenly taken from our midst.

The 1955 Carnival of the Pines was successfully finalised and showed a net credit balance of £2,170/4/9, of which £2,000 was invested in

the Australian Guarantee Corporation. This investment falls due on the 27th October next.

The Chamber lent its assistance and support to Mr. Athol Platt in the establishment of bulk loading rail freights, which have proved a decided advantage to the town.

The matter of distribution of milk supply through the Milk Board was taken up with the local Council. The Council has indicated its approval of the proposal which, however, has not yet come into operation.

Cathie Bridge

The proposal to build a bridge over Cathie Creek was enthusiastically sponsored by the Chamber and its members met the Municipal and Shire and Camden Haven representatives on two occasions, one on a Sunday morning at Cathie Creek itself, and subsequently at a well attended public meeting at Laurieton. Preliminary arrangements for the erection of the bridge are well advanced and it is anticipated that the Chamber will be requested in the near future, to organise voluntary labour for its construction.

The question of the provis-

ishment of technical classes here has been pursued and as a result, it seems certain that classes, at least in some subjects, will be established in 1957.

The Chamber decided to support the proposal to establish home for the aged within the Municipality and sent delegates to a public meeting called by the Council for that purpose.

Arrangements were made for the erection of road signs at Telegraph Point and at the Taree-Wauchope turn off. Two members of the Chamber have agreed to arrange for the erection of these signs and it is expected that they will be in position in the near future.

The Chamber has continued its agitation for the establishment of a fire brigade in Port Macquarie, but so far the Council has been unable to find a suitable site for the fire station. It is considered imperative that when the water supply is turned on in the near future, a fire brigade should be in operation.

A double page spread in the N.R.M.A. monthly journal, "Open Road" was published during the year and the Chamber owes its thanks to Messrs. Uptin and Edwards for their efforts in that regard.

During the early part of 1956, Dr. John Bell, of Melbourne visited Port Macquarie and with the assistance of the

WAUCHOPE BRIGADE SAVED PORT MACQUARIE FROM DISASTROUS FIRE

Receiving an alarm at a quarter to five on Saturday morning last, the Wauchope Fire Brigade was twenty minutes later playing water on a fire in Port Macquarie's main street.

But for the Wauchope brigade's wonderful efforts there is no telling how little of Port Macquarie's main street would have been standing today.

The fire started in the Royal Hall, the property of Hatsatouris Bros., of Port Macquarie and Three.

The hall was situated at the rear of the Monterey Cafe, and was once a picture theatre as well as a dance hall.

A Forestry fire-fighting unit also came down with the brigade, and this thoughtful action contributed greatly in bringing the blaze quickly under control.

Member of the local fire fighting unit, under Fire Officer Mr. Sid Hinton, were also quickly on the scene and gave valued assistance in quelling the fire.

The fire appeared to be centred about the middle of the hall.

It soon got into the rear of the Monterey Cafe premises, also owned by Messrs Hatsatouris, and when the hall collapsed the fire fell on the rear of Mr. Norm Earnett's Pineapple Inn.

A good deal of the rear portion of this building was destroyed.

Without the aid of a fire brigade it can be readily imagined how far the fire might have spread.

The fire was first noticed by Mr. Ledwidge (father-in-law of Mr. Ron Deece, who only a few weeks ago took over the Monterey Cafe).

Mr. Ledwidge was on the way to gather wood for the morning fire when he noticed the blaze in the building.

The fire spread quickly, and with fibro sheets exploding and flying everywhere it was impossible to get near the blaze.

EDITORIAL

1956

In saying farewell to 1955 we hailed it as Port Macquarie's greatest year, because of the many building advances made, and because "it is the year preceding the turning on of the town's water supply." Which goes to show how right we are sometimes—even if there are only a few days left to get the water going. All jokes aside we feel that in some major respects the gains made in 1955 have not been consolidated. It seemed almost certain at one stage that the water authority would join the long list of fifty-five credits, and mis-management can be the only explanation for another year fritting away with still no water. Nobody is to blame, so it seems, and in a few months—or weeks—we are sure to be publishing speeches of the great achievements of the government, the council, the member; the contractors and the workers; for giving Port Macquarie its water scheme—started in 1943 at a cost of £80,000 and completed in 1957 for something in the vicinity of £400,000. The air service has worsened rather than improved, and can never hope to be popular under the present twice a week arrangement. The poignant lesson of Slater's flat fire had only the desired effect until memory faded; now the civic conscience has been pricked again. Whilst the wheels of officialdom ground slowly, enthusiasm waned for the Cathie Bridge project. However, the road position on the Port Macquarie side has been improving and the prospects are that the bridge will be erected next year. On the credit side we find substantial buildings still going up and others planned. In the main street, the C.C.C. building is under way; there's the rebuilt Royal Hotel; Donk's garage has started on another solid two-storey building, and there's the handsome C.O.R. garage. The new amusement arcade will add to the assets, as will the improved Panorama Guest House. Large numbers of high standard flats continue to be built. Some of the other notable events included the opening of the beach mining plant, the move to establish memorial baths, the opening of the C.W.A. building. Apex got its Charter; the need stressed for a high school site; sovereignty on the camping area and the green; a homes for the aged project started; and in the personalities, Mrs. Nunn (102) died, the Premier (Hon. J. Cahill) came and stayed; a local boy (Rev. Fr. Bernard Kenny) was ordained Priest; Miss Eev. Dullanty had her first book published; and Alan McKibbin became a Queen's Scout. We've tried to put it all on record; we've offended some, and there's one or two we could never please. We leave the year behind with the one regret that we still haven't done enough for the town that it is our privilege to serve. We've had a lot of help, a lot of co-operation, and a lot of tolerance, and we express our thanks. We commend to Churches, to put Christ into Christmas, and for our own part, for your part, and for the sake of mankind there is ever the need of peace on earth and goodwill towards men.

COUNCIL DECIDES ON BRICK BUILDING FOR FIRE STATION IN LORD STREET

The Municipal Council decided on Monday night to erect a brick building for its fire station in Lord Street, at an estimated cost of £4000.

Plans, prepared by the Fire Board's architect were before the meeting. In fibre the same building would cost £2480.

Present were the Mayor (Ald. A. L. Crisp), Ald. Kennedy, Kinnay, Graham, Cooper, Mumay, Hatsatsaris, Waitlers and Walker.

The Mayor, Ald. A. L. Crisp presented a detailed report to Council, following last week's visit by members of the Fire Board.

Ald. Kennedy and Kenny the resolution for the brick building, and also the adoption of the report.

This means that some temporary fire-fighting equipment will be made available to the town almost immediately.

The Mayor's report stated: Site for Fire Station—The site in Lord Street, three blocks north of Burravan Street, was considered as very suitable. It has a good approach to the street, it is handy to the residential section of the town and not too far from the business section.

Personnel

At least twelve volunteers will be required. They will be trained by the Board, and be supplied with uniforms and covered under Workers Compensation to the full extent of their earnings.

It will be a matter for the Council to select the men. The architect stated that that Board would advise the Lands Department that the land was suitable and he asked Mr. Richardson to supply him with levels of the land and its relation to the road level.

The minimum requirements for a fire station consist of an engine room, a watch room, showers and conveniences. Council will have to construct the building for which the Board will pay a rental to cover the interest on the money borrowed and the Board will maintain it.

The Board requires particulars of residential population, holiday population, mileage of streets, and source of water supply. The area to be proclaimed a Fire District will be considered and in that area it is usual to strike a Fire Brigade rate up to 1d. in the £. Persons outside the fire district will be required to pay for the services of the brigade.

As soon as Council decides on the type of building the plans and specifications will be prepared so that tenders can be called for its erection. Pending the erection of the building and the supply of the fire engine it will be necessary for Council to apply to the Board for supply hose and all necessary fittings. Council will have to give an undertaking to see that the equipment is properly cared for.





areas could mean an annual loss to the Hastings-Macleay community of £35,380 per year.

The following portion of Mr. Lancaster's statement is taken from the "Macleay Argus":—

"With regard to the Hastings being declared a zone for the distribution of Wauchope milk, the Milk Board cannot be criticised, for the Milk Board was dragged into it," said Mr. Lancaster.

"I approached the Hastings Shire Council and told them that it would be better if the Milk Board did not come in; in everybody's interest.

"However, I see by press reports and public statements that they contradicted the line I took.

"There is no doubt where Mr. Ferguson stands; if two Local Government bodies demand that he come in and take charge he must do it," said Mr. Lancaster.

"I now quote some figures to justify my statements made at the Hastings Shire Council meeting, these figures being based in an approximate figure of 600 gallons of milk bottled by the Hastings Co-op. Dairy Company.

"On the previous basis, the vendors purchased 600 gallons of milk at 4/9, which they sold at 7/- per gallon (10½d. per pint), showing a profit of £67/10/-.

"On the Milk Board basis the vendors purchase 600 gallons at 5/5½, still retailed at 7/- per gallon, which reduces their profit to £46/5/-. This means that the vendors show a loss of £21/5/1 per day (£7756/5/- per year), equal to 8½d. per gallon."

Connections To Water Main

A question at Monday's Council meeting regarding licensed plumbers led to some discussion on the subject.

A plumber operating in the town for some years couldn't make connections to the water scheme because he didn't have the necessary certificate.

He had made approaches to the Council to issue him a license to do so.

Ald. Walker took the point that if Council was to demand that a licensed plumber do the work, it should also require some certificate that all connections had been made by a licensed plumber.

The deputy mayor quoted from the Local Government ordinances that anyone unlicensed and doing their own connections would be liable.

Mr. de la Rue said one stipulation of the issue of a license was to prove a five-year apprenticeship.

Ald. Kennedy said he had heard a remarkable story recently about one license; there was no five-year apprenticeship that he could see.

Mr. de la Rue asked Council what it would do if it found say 50 properties that had been illegally connected?, and no one attempted to answer the question.

The engineer said the position was that Council would eventually have to employ an inspector.

The deputy mayor agreed, saying they were fast reaching the stage of more inspectors than workers.

Mayor Presents Favourable Report From Board of Fire Commissioners

The Mayor of Port Macquarie, Ald. A. L. Crisp, was able to tell the Municipal Council on Monday night that the new fire station and completely equipped garage will soon be an established fact.

The president of the Board of Fire Commissioners, Mr L. E. Duff, accompanied by Mr. C. J. Edwards, and the assistant secretary, Mr. Webb, met the Mayor and Ald. Graham and the town clerk (Mr. Percy) on Thursday night.

The Mayor's report to Council stated:

Mr. Duff said as far as his Board was concerned the fire station could not be built soon enough.

The policy of his Board had changed and they considered that Councils should not be called upon to erect the buildings, but they should be erected by the Board.

However, as they had not provided for the building this year, the present arrangements would stand. Council would erect the building and it would be taken over by the Board at a later date.

They proposed to send officers here to define the fire district which would be gazetted and the Fire Brigades Act would then apply. A charge would be made where the brigade attended a fire outside the fire district.

The fire engine and equipment is now available. Plans and specifications for the building will be sent on within a week or two. This would provide for a recreation room in addition to the accommodation previously provided.

The site has been selected, but he considered that a more suitable site might be secured nearer to the fire hazards.

After the Act had been applied Council should make application direct to the Fire underwriters for a re-classification of the area for fire insurance purposes.

The Board would assist Council in its application for approval of a loan for the erection of the building.

The Board suggested the establishment of a local committee to provide amenities for the firemen.

The Mayor also informed the meeting, in reply to a question by Ald. Walters, that seeking a more central site would not hold up the plans to establish the brigade at an early date.

Municipal Council Correspondence

Fire Station for Hay Street

Board of Fire Commissioners, advising the approval of the site in Hay Street adjoining the Fishery Inspectors office and recommending that the Crown Land be acquired by Council. They asked for the lot to be cleaned of long grass and growth to enable their Architect to establish levels. A copy of the description of the proposed fire district had been forwarded for Council's information and for the computing of the Unimproved Value of all rateable land within the area which Council was requested to furnish to their office—Council to make early application for the land.

MORE CONCERN OVER WATER SCHEME

Alderman on Monday night expressed further concern over Port Macquarie's water scheme, particularly in relation to the slow progress in completing the pumping plant at the headworks.

The Council was discussing a letter from the Dept. of Public Works, advising that the design of the intake works at Koroore Island had been changed, and that the contractors had now commenced with the preparatory work necessary in connection with the new design.

Mr. Engineer Richardson informed the Council that he had no detailed information of the new proposal.

Present were the Mayor, Ald. A. L. Crisp, Ald. Kenny, MLC, A. Cooper, G. Munday,

R. Graham, G. Warlters, A. O. Walker and D. S. Kennedy.

Ald. Warlters asked did the Mayor know what affect on the cost the change would have?

He was informed that Mr. Engineer Bailey had assured the Mayor no extra cost would be involved, and a better system would result.

Ald. Kenny pointed out that under the present arrangement pumping was only possible when there was somebody to supervise; he said the Mayor had only been given a verbal report from Mr. Bailey. The first things were being done last. More water was being used than could be pumped under the present system at the headworks.

Ald. Kenny said there were men prepared to bet that the scheme would be completed before last Xmas; he wondered what chance there was before this Xmas.

Ald. Kenny moved that the Engineer be instructed to visit the headworks immediately and report to the Mayor.

In the near future people would be paying the additional water rate.

Ald. Graham seconded; he suggested adding that any interested aldermen accompany the Engineer, and this was endorsed.

Ald. Warlters pointed out that in less than six months there would be another influx of visitors, and it could be, at the present rate, that the town would be out of water.

The motion was carried; the Mayor (Ald. Crisp) then informed Council that he had approached Mr. Engineer Bailey (PWD) with a view to having more men put on to get the scheme completed.

FIRE STATION LAND

The Mayor (Ald. A. L. Crisp) assured the Municipal Council on Monday night that the Lands Dept. was hurrying the transfer of a Crown Land block to the Council so that a fire station could be built.

The land is situated in Hay Street, next to the Fisheries Dept. residence.

Council expects to have plans for the building soon, and will be in a position to call tenders when the transfer of land is affected.

In a Mayoral Minute, Ald. Crisp stated:—

Whilst in Sydney I interviewed Mr. Webb, Officer-in-Charge of Fire Station buildings, and he informed me that plans would be complete within three or four days; they would be forwarded to Council for the calling of tenders—the cost would be approximately £5,000.

I would recommend that Council apply for loan approval and arrange a short term loan with a Bank or Insurance Company so that as soon as the Lands Department grant the land applied for the tenders can be accepted and the building of the station commenced.

I stress the urgency of the Fire Station because when installed, the reduction in insurance premiums by reclassification will offset Council's water charges.

EDITORIAL

THE NEED FOR BATHS

Change of thought on the question of baths is now apparent in a section of the community, and the type and place, as well as the need or not buys ready argument. Last night, the Chamber of Progress decided to switch horses from a Services Memorial Pool to a rock pool. Whatever is done there can be little doubt about the need for a swimming enclosure. This is supported by the popularity of the "pool" the Council has provided at something like an average annual cost of £175 per year for the

pool. The pool would be reinforced concrete and rock with a four-foot apron out to a safety fence. The floor of the pool would be concrete, and water in it would always remain at a certain level. Lighting could be provided for night swimming, and cement paths made up to the present new sheds.

All this, said Mr. Hanlon, could be included for £10,000.

He went on to say that the correct procedure would be to engage an architect, who in turn would get a marine engineer on the job. He would like to see his own architect, Mr. Kirkwood, do the job.

Mr. Hanlon said the bogey of floods would be raised, but, he asked, how many floods have you had in the past two years? If there are floods the baths could be cleaned up within a week, he said.

Mr. Hanlon made the offer, that if the cost exceeded £10,000, he would be prepared to make available an interest free loan up to £3000.

Mr. H. A. Buckmaster seconded.

Mr. Albert McWhirter did not think a rock pool would be as good as an ordinary pool. Heavy seas would prevent its use, and he had seen flood rubbish not cleaned up before the next flood came.

Mr. Col Bailey favoured the motion. A pool at Nyngand had just cost £87½ thousand. If the council or anyone else supported an olympic pool here it would be another 25 years before it could be built. If the cost here was to be something like £100,000 it would be foolish. For £10,000 they could build the rock pool, and it would be an asset.

Mr. Cec. McWhirter pointed out that Wauchope's pool was costing £40,000 to £45,000, not £100,000.

He said the photo of a pool shown by Mr. Hanlon

and the car parking space.

Mr. A. M. Keena couldn't see where the money would come from to provide an Olympic pool and maintain it. He felt if they could get the rock pool and it was a success they could go for the other pool later.

Mr. Edwards pointed out there would be a charge to go into baths; the rock pool would be free.

Mr. Wilson opposed baths because of infection he had seen children suffer. He made the point that if a million people in Sydney could be satisfied by a rock pool, 6000 in Port Macquarie should be.

Mr. Ian Austin, of Motel Park, said he was keen to see progress. He claimed that at Goulburn 20,000 people with no beaches in opposition the swimming pool still ran at a loss. He added that people came to the seaside for the salt water.

Mr. Lance Hartley claimed that the assurance to back an olympic pool depended on individual effort, and with people getting tired of the carnival work it was a slender thread to back on.

Mr. Joscelyne said cost was the dominating factor. The way he saw it, the rock pool would be a possibility "tomorrow". He would like to see them stuck into something they could do.

Ald. A. P. Cooper raised the question as to whether the Chamber was dumping the Baths Committee after having backed it, and it was agreed to leave this question until the motion was disposed of.

The rescission motion was, after a vote had been taken, declared carried by a large majority.

But the area mentioned will I think, always remain Port Macquarie's "Golden Strip". EDITORIAL

WHAT OF THE MEMORIAL?

Confusion gave way to chaos when Baths Committee delegates voted for "a pool of not less than Olympic standard size 'on the town Beach. The Chamber of Progress had said "yes" to a rock pool, whereas the amendment for "a pool" has in mind something altogether different. Without any authority from the bodies they represented, the Baths Committee delegates settled for "a pool." No "a pool" site has been chosen or even discussed, and now a panel of three has been told it can spend money on plans and specifications for something that not even the Baths Committee, let alone the Chamber, the R.S.L. and the other town organisations, is agreed upon. How any member of the Chamber of Progress could be content to see its hard-earned funds frittered away on a doubtful project will always remain a mystery to this paper. Those funds, together with the R.S.L. contribution, form a nucleus no one ever dreamt of, and seem to be the assured means of doing something really big for the town. If they go, so must go all hope of the memorial pool. We have backed the Chamber beyond the limit in all its efforts so far, but we are not prepared to jump with it from one foot to another. Even though the first sign of unanimity followed the announcement for a Services' Memorial Pool, every known obstacle has been placed along the rails, so much so that it has become the fashion to talk in negative terms. Baths can only be a liability if they are poorly made and poorly situated. These two objects some people seem determined to achieve. We're prepared to accept the challenge of the rock pool or "a pool" and will lead the fight against it, but we can't achieve anything alone. We believe the town should have salt water baths; there could be no better Services Memorial, and the place—and only place—for them is in the very heart of the town. What better preference could be given the R.S.L. than having fresh salt-water baths within 100 yards of their present extending building? Kooloonbung is the warmest, most sheltered and most central site in town for the baths

his title vested in shares which carry with them the rights of occupation of his unit, and part ownership of the land the building erected thereon.

THE DIFFERENCE:

As home unit ownership mainly applies to the flat dweller, it is of interest to examine the difference between the flat dweller's normal rights as a tenant, and his rights and privileges as a home unit owner.

1. As a tenant his right of tenure and use of his flat is limited by the terms of his tenancy and the operation of the landlord and tenant act.
2. He is required to pay rent which includes his proportion of his rates taxes and common services, and the owner's operational profits on the property as a whole.
3. He has no right of permanent tenure; he is not entitled to sell his tenancy for profit; he is subject to any rent rises served under the law.
4. He cannot sublet or assign his tenancy without leave and does not participate in the proceeds if the building as a whole is sold at a profit.

On the other hand, as a home unit owner he has clearly defined rights of permanent occupation of his unit.

1. He pays no rent—only his proportion of the total running costs of the property

NOTHING DEFINITE YET FOR FIRE STATION AND WATER EXTENSION LOANS

Although "favourable consideration" has been promised, no definite approval was given by the Minister for Local Government (Mr. Renshaw) or the Minister for Works (Mr. McGrath) in connection with Port Macquarie's requirements for loan monies.

In the Council Chambers on Friday last, the two Ministers were approached by the Mayor (Ald. Crisp) and Mr. L. C. Jordan, M.L.A., in the presence of aldermen and other citizens.

Council sought approval for three loans:

- £8000, to carry out extensions to the water supply scheme.
- £5000, to build a fire station.

- £4000, to commence the Kooloonbung project.

The Mayor told the Ministers, and he was supported by Mr. Jordan, M.L.A., how important it was and essential that loan monies be made available for the water extensions and the fire station. He also pointed out the advantages which would accrue from a sand pump, for which they wanted to borrow funds to purchase.

Mr. Renshaw told the gathering that "a further look" would be taken at the three loan applications and these would be "given every consideration."

Mr. Jordan had spoken to him about the requirements, and had mentioned the unemployment that would follow if Council was unable to raise loan monies.

Mr. Renshaw said the position was such that employment was sure to be affected somewhere.

With three months of the financial year gone, applications were £1½ millions in excess of what could be approved.

He stressed that the present position presented opportunity for local government to take a good case to the Federal Parliament, seeking relief.

He appreciated the need for water extensions, and knew the town could do with loan monies for other improvements.

However, although there seemed to be more money than ever about for Local

Government, it couldn't take it.

It was quite evident to him that local employment would be affected.

He didn't know how essential the Kooloonbung reclamation and baths scheme was, but he urged that local funds should build it—and not the Crown—if it were to be a memorial venture.

Mr. Renshaw said he appreciated what a sand pump could do for Port Macquarie, and it was a wonder to him that the town didn't have one long ago.

Messrs. C. M. Edwards, president of the Chamber of Progress, and Mr. C. Uptin, told the Minister of the pool projects, and after Ald. Kenny, M.L.C., had referred to oyster leases holding up the Kooloonbung project, the Ministers agreed that complete details of the scheme and plans should be made available to the Dept. before a decision could be made.

COUNCIL'S NEW GRADER

A report from Council's Mechanic, Mr. A. Fenning, that all is not well with Council's new grader, is to be further investigated.

Council recently purchased the grader for a cost exceeding £9000.

The report dealt with repair work said to have been necessary; the grader has 165 hours on its clock.

A committee of the Council as a whole, Council's Mechanic, a representative of Waugh & Josephson, and an independent mechanic, is to go further into the matter.

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MAYOR REVIEWS YEAR

Ald. A. L. Crisp, Mayor, has presented a report on Council's activities for 1957 to the Municipal Council as follows:—

In this review of Council activities during 1957, I will mention the main projects which have been completed. It is evidence of a year of achievement in the advancement of Port Macquarie, especially in view of the fact that Local Government borrowing has been severely restricted, with the consequence that Council has been obliged to rely on property rates for the major part of its income. Although it is difficult to list works in order of importance I would say that the completion and handing over of the Town Water Supply is deserving of first mention and a definite landmark in the progress of our town.

Final arrangements are now in hand for the erection of a modern fire station, a tender has been accepted and it is expected to have the building completed early in the new year. A volunteer brigade is to be formed shortly and this service combined with the water supply will ensure the protection of town properties against the hazard of fire which has caused so much destruction throughout the State during the past few weeks.

Bathing facilities have been enhanced by the completion of the Town Beach building at a cost of £7,000 and improvements to the beach area.

Important drainage work is nearing completion, the Town Beach drain has been removed

the Department of Main Roads for the purchase of the ferry.

Motel, camp, flat owners and the like are to be invited to put a proposition to

A New Shopping Centre

Kuringai Council has given a bold lead to other Local Government bodies by building and selling a complete, planned shopping area. When completed, the scheme will provide two colonnades of shops enclosing a grassed pedestrian mall with shade trees, a nearby carpark, and a service lane for delivery of goods to the rear of the shops.

With Minister Renshaw's recent invitation to apply for loans to acquire land for developmental purposes still ringing in their ears, our aldermen will be very interested in this project.

The shops were sold individually before building commenced, on terms providing for instalments as the building work proceeded. In this way the Council's outlay was minimised. The sales covered the cost of acquiring the land and building the shops.

Here are some of the reasons why such a project should be a success here:—

1. The town is geographically more widespread than most—residents at Flynn's Beach and beyond need a shopping centre closer than Horton Street.

2. Extension of the Horton Street shopping centre is notoriously restricted, hence the high rents demanded for new premises and the somewhat startling increases granted by the Fair Rents Board recently. Parking is already a problem, even on week-days.

3. The present shopping centre grew up adjacent to the only access of goods and passengers to the town—the wharves. These are no longer used.

4. Horton Street is not as centrally located in regard to the residential areas as is

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Mayoral Explanation Led To Hot Words In Early Morning Hours

Council Criticised On Baths Project

Ald. Peter Hatsaturis classified the town's attitude to its beaches as "too silly for words."

He was criticising the Council for its part in the Town Beach project, and said Flynn's Beach had been ruined, then Oxley Beach, and now it was the Town Beach.

Ald. Hatsaturis told the Council he felt he had grounds for asking the Minister to dismiss it for what he termed its waste of the ratepayers' money.

Ald. Hatsaturis was not alone in his criticism of the Town Beach proposal.

Mayor's Explanation
Shortly after midnight, Ald. Crisp said he wished to explain that he had been incorrectly recorded in the minutes of a baths committee meeting.

These had stated that he had given an assurance that a permanent man would be put on when the pool was built to be responsible for the cleanliness of the pool and the dressing sheds.

Ald. Crisp said that all he had said was that Council had a permanent man, and he could be responsible for the cleaning.

He agreed it was a matter

for decision by Council whether they put a man on.

Ald. Walters said Council may be committing itself to expenditure before the baths were built. If the pool was to be as now planned, the plant and maintenance would be substantial, and they may have to put a "gate" on. It seemed to him they were half-way to a complete pool. If they go that far they may as well go the whole hog. If the

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

The local brigade, under Captain Keith Hardaker, was present in full uniform, and along with a number of


Salt Air

In 1909, the present volunteer system was set up, and the movement felt it was doing a good job.

Port Macquarie's first Mr. Duff said the first approach to the Board from Port Macquarie came 14 years ago when Brownlow's store was burnt out on the 8th of January, and damage done to Ryan's Chemist shop and Miss Trahey's restaurant. Keenpsey brigade was called in, and Council stood the cost. £22/7/6. Mr. C. G. Orr was then Mayor, and on the 11th January, the deputy mayor, Dr. McLaren (schoolmate of Mr. Duff) wrote of the need.

In Sept., 1945, the Board visited Port Macquarie, and it was then decided it was useless to set up a brigade here without a water supply.

In December, 1956, Ald. Crisp had come into the picture on behalf of the Council. Council decided to borrow the £5000, on the undertaking (the board) pay rates and rental, too.

Mr. Duff said he was taking back to his Board the suggestion of re-purchase of the building.

There was another fire in September, 1956, when the Royal Hall was destroyed and the Wauchope brigade under Captain Ion King, had effected a good save.

In December, 1957, they had

seen the proclamation of a fire district, and now it was their opening day.

Mr. Duff expressed thanks to Ald. Crisp and his Council for their fine co-operation.

It was a credit to them he said that all had been accomplished without argument and the people could go to their beds at night safe from the threat of fire.

Mr. Commissioner Mallam, formerly engaged in inaugurating brigades, pointed out that each new station set up became a monument to the service.

He welcomed the brigade members to the 2,600 already enrolled in New South Wales, and ventured to say—in the light of experience—everywhere else—that all would remain members for many years to come.

He urged people not to hesitate to call the brigade when a fire occurred.

Some people feared they had to meet the cost, but there was no payment involved.

Mr. Mallam spoke highly of the services rendered by the volunteer members of the brigade.

A foolproof system of bells in their homes called them out at night when necessary. This disturbed their family life, but he assured the men they would enjoy being members of such a great movement.

Chief Fire Officer The Chief Fire Officer of the N.S.W. Fire Brigade, Mr. Pye, said the vast developments in Port Macquarie since he had holidayed here showed a brigade was warranted.

He referred to the N.S.W. fire brigades as the biggest volunteer movement of its kind in the world, controlling also the biggest area.

A permanent staff of 1500 was backed by 2,600 volunteers in 198 country stations and 57 in the metropolitan area, tied up with which was £2½ million in equipment.

The need for fire brigades was shown by American figures, where 10,000 people lost their lives each year through fire.

The main function of the N.S.W. brigade movement was to save lives and property, and records showed they had done a good job.

Master Fire, he said, was man's greatest servant and greatest master. Controlled fire did more for mankind than any other element; when uncontrolled it was master, and would burn on till nothing remained to burn.

Mr. Pye said the public could best help by preventing fire; by removing rubbish they removed the chance of fire.

Mr. Pye went on to say that too much credit could not be given to the public spirited action of the volunteer brigades.

He told how the brigades were divided into seven divisions, and Port Macquarie was under Fire Officer Bradley. Seven districts had 10 to 20 stations, and each was under the guidance of a fire officer, with standards of efficiency demanded.

Mr. Pye said the organization now had 300 different appliances as means for putting out fires.

He spoke of the advances in equipment. Mr. Webb, secretary, told of the opening of the fire station 20 months after the first official visit, and spoke of the "likeable and tenacious" manner in which Ald. Crisp had kept at the Board.

Mr. Duff then unveiled a plaque and declared the building officially opened. He thanked the firemen, and concluded his remarks by saying "may God protect all firemen who serve in this brigade."

Demonstration Run. Brigade members gave a demonstration of their efficiency when they took the engine on a trial run.

Buffet Luncheon. At the conclusion of the opening, the visitors, brigade members and firemen enjoyed a buffet luncheon at the station.

pool was to be of its present nature and not tiled, it would be impossible to keep it clean.

Ald. Writers supposed he shouldn't be saying such things at that juncture; he felt other places should be visited for inspections.

He felt the town, having the seaside, wasn't big enough yet for baths such as at Wauchope. It seemed to him it would be a shame to spend £15,000 to £20,000 and then find the baths should have been put somewhere else.

Ald. Hatsaturis: Has Council selected the site?

Ald. Crisp: The baths committee selected the site.

Ald. Hatsaturis: What about the council. There is no motion in the Council to build baths in the middle of the beach where people sit. Kooloombung is the only place for baths in this town. If there is any more destruction of the beaches I am going to ask the Minister to bring in a Bill to ask the Minister to dismiss this Council. If we had any go in us we would have had the Kooloombung job started now.

We ruined Flynn's Beach, we've ruined Oxley Beach, and now you want to ruin the Town Beach. I intend to fight this tooth and nail. We spoilt Flynn's Beach by not putting the building at this end of it, and leaving the open space for the people. You can't move there at Xmas time. I can tell you I have the people with me in this.

Ald. Crisp: We have had an inspection of the Town Beach and Council has decided.

Ald. Hatsaturis: Where did Council decide? The Town Clerk: On 30th June Council agreed on a concrete pool of Olympic standards. The next meeting was of the Baths Committee when it was decided to put the pool 60 feet west of the existing sheds.

Ald. Hatsaturis: Right where the public sit and relax. It's too silly for words.

Ald. Crisp: Council decided against a rock pool.

Ald. Hatsaturis: I'll take you all down and show you the mess of the Town Beach, and of Oxley Beach, too.

Ald. Kennedy: When an engineer was standing beside a peg on the Town Beach I told him I had seen the water over his head where he was stand-

ing. Ald. Hatsaturis: £9000 has gone on the Oxley Beach drain. It is a disgrace.

Ald. Kennedy: If we have a failure on the Town Beach we'll never get another pool. Ald. Hatsaturis: We should have a plan like Kooloombung where we let the public behind us when they can see the benefits of it. Anyway, I've told you what I'm going to do. In other places millions of pounds are being spent to improve beach areas, and we are destroying them.

Ald. Crisp: The matter has to be approved by three Departments. They have to come here yet.

The discussion then closed.

Port's fire brigade celebrates 40 years of service

Service always highest priority

It was only during the 1950s that a reticulated water supply was provided to the municipality of Port Macquarie, a move which was to lead to the formation of the town's first urban fire brigade.

Prior to this time fire fighting consisted of "bucket brigades" with water supplied from rainwater tanks and wells.

In fact, Wauchope brigade had responded to several emergencies over the years, always to be frustrated by distance of travel and lack of water on arrival.

In 1957, after consistent lobbying to the government by the then mayor, Ald Les Crisp, the announcement was finally made that funds were available to create a fire brigade in the rapidly developing

town of Port Macquarie.

No. 51 light 4 Dennis motor engine with stores and equipment had arrived on Saturday, December 7.

On Monday, December 9, 1957, District Officer Viv Lowther (later to become chief officer NSW Fire Brigades), arrived in Port Macquarie with a charter to select men to establish the Port Macquarie Volunteer Fire Brigade.

That evening from an attendance of some 30 invited citizens 10 men were selected.

Keith Hardaker was appointed captain with a crew consisting of Kevin Scott, Albert (Mate) McWhirter, Todd Roods, Les Worthy, Bob Graham, Ken White, George Thom, Tom Gaul and Bill Settle.

Commencing Tuesday, December 10, regular drills were carried


out daily until Friday, December 20, when D.O. Lowther returned to Sydney.

During this period of training with the assistance of Resident Inspector Stan Bradley stationed at Grafton a comprehensive program was carried out consisting of motor driving, pumping, suction, hose work and general fire fighting strategies.

The first recorded incident was a grass fire at Settlement Point, posing a threat to a private dwelling on Saturday, December 21, 1957.

A tin shed had been erected in Clarence Street on the site of the present library to act as a temporary fire station. A siren was installed on the shed.

Through the manually operated telephone exchange a call

would be directed to a volunteer fireman at his home. He would proceed to the shed, activate the siren, start the motor and wait for a crew to arrive.

Special mention and heartfelt thanks should go to the "hello girls" of those days for the dedication and efforts they made to find the firemen and get them onto the job, bearing in mind that the fires could be working (or playing) anywhere throughout the community and out of earshot of the fire alarm.

On Saturday, August 9, 1958, a single bay fire station was opened

in the southern end of Hay Street by the president of the Board of Fire Commissioners, Mr Duff, in the presence of a number of dignitaries among them Ald Crisp and local citizens.

Here again the firemen were alerted by a much bigger and louder manually operated siren which must have caused a great deal of discomfort to the nearby neighbours particularly the sisters of the convent opposite, the O'Bree family (Don is presently serving in the brigade), and no doubt Father Donnelly "blessed" the brigade on

many occasions.

During the first year of operation Port Macquarie attended 23 incidents, mostly grass, two dwellings and a couple of petrol spills. As a comparison in 1996 the brigade attended just on 400 incidents.

In the early days the response was to common every-day fires while today with the introduction of plastics and other ever-present hazardous materials firefighting is a much more dangerous profession.

The increased high speed motor accidents causing unbelievable injuries and death on

our highways places present firefighters and rescue crews under tremendous pressure and stress.

Port Macquarie brigade has always given positive support to civic events such as sponsoring candidates for the Carnival of the Pines, street parades, presentation of a humicrib to Port hospital, and regular donations to the burns section of Westmead Hospital.

One of the highlights was the purchase of a Dennis motor by brigade members, restoration to its original

Port Macquarie Fire Brigade celebrates 40 years of Service

Competition record is second to none

SINCE formation, the Port Macquarie Fire Brigade has been under the control of five captains, starting with Keith Hardaker, Tom Gaul, Ken White, Ross Hoy and presently Ashley Roods.

Without exception all captains have guided the brigade into a great period of competition in what was known as the NSW Volunteer Fire Brigades Demonstrations, now referred to as NSW Fire Brigade Championships.

The first championship event won by Port was at Tweed Heads in 1968 when the team consisting of Ken White, Kevin Scott, Todd Roods, Ian Anderson and George Thom took out the Dennis 400g suction, considered to be the most prestigious event in the competition.

In 1982 Port team became the state champions for the first time and has repeated that achievement by taking out the 1988, 1994 and 1996 championships, and will be competing in Dubbo in 1998 in an endeavour to hold that title.

Following the 1982 win, Port team consisting of Ross Hoy, G. Murrell, Geoff Kempnich, Stewart Richards, Trevor Richards and Ashley Roods was invited to represent the NSWFB at the Victorian Centenary Championships being held at Ballarat in 1983.

After their 1996 success the team of Geoff Kempnich, Ashley

Roods, Peter Whalan, and Rick Morgan was invited to participate in the New Zealand championships where they ran very competitively considering the events and equipment were very different to NSW.

The NSW championships have been held in Port Macquarie for a record six times.

The value economically to a community hosting a championship is immense. When you consider the presence of the permanent officers who attend up to two weeks in advance to prepare for the event then the appearance of up to 100 teams representing communities throughout NSW, Victoria, Queensland and New Zealand, and each team comprising from five to eight members plus families and supporters staying for the week of championship and often having a family holiday afterwards inject hundreds of thousands of dollars into the district.

There has always been a close knit feeling within the Port Macquarie brigade, accepting any excuse for a family barbecue or party.

Extending invitations to visiting fire associated people from throughout Australia and overseas including chief officers, board members and all ranks and particularly the "slaves" who are the career firefighters who are assigned to the championship activity by setting up equipment, motors, timing de-

vices etc and assisting the week of rivalry.

Family tradition has been created starting with twin brothers Stewart and Trevor Richards who joined more than 20 years ago and the father-son combinations of Todd and Ashley Roods, Mate and Steve McWhirter, Geoff and Troy Kempnich and Bob and Peter Graham.

At a recent celebration at the Port Macquarie RSL Club several brigade members were honoured.

Captain Ross Hoy received a clasp to his National Medal having service in excess of 25 years.

Ross had previously been the recipient of the national medal and Australian Fire Service Medal for his service to the fire fighting organisation, and though stepping out of the Port line-up will continue to fill the role of chief executive officer of the NSW Fire Brigades Association.

Captain Ashley Roods was presented with the National Medal by the Commissioner of the NSW Fire Brigades, Ian MacDougall AC.

Trevor Richards, Bill Redpath, Steve McWhirter and Christine Veech also received recognition for their service to the community.

It is appropriate at these and other occasions that the spouses are recognised for the huge effort provided by them in assisting their fire fighter partner.

condition and the regular appearance together with brass helmeted crew to schools, charity days, parades and the like.

Probably the most notable fire in the early days was the Rural Co-operative which was located in the vicinity of the Colonial Arcade.

Storage of farm supplies such as 44 gallon drums of methylated spirits, kerosene and other combustibles offered a threat to many of the adjoining buildings on the eastern side of Horton St.

More recent incidents of note have been Blairs Newsagency in Horton Street, the Pancake Place and adjoining

shops in Clarence and Hay streets, the navy vessel at the Port Macquarie Slipway and the Players Theatre.

In early 1982 Port Macquarie sent a rescue crew to Kempsey to assist in the Barsbys incident caused by a semi-trailer leaving the carriageway and crashing into the department store. This occasion is

thought to be the first time that volunteer firefighters had use of fully encapsulated protective suits and occurred shortly after the first permanent officer Earl McGinity was appointed to serve at Port Macquarie. He has been followed by several replacements, the current station officer is Ron Sloan.
