



Congratulations Tatiana!

Over the last few years, I have acted as Mentor for Tatiana Fokina, the Russian lady accountant (Russian qualification not accepted in Australia) who works for me in my part-time accountancy practice, Classic Tax & Accounting.

Formerly, Tatiana became a Russian university-qualified accountant. She worked for 18 years in a managerial accounting position for the Omsk, Siberia, branch of the Central Bank of Russia (similar to the Reserve Bank of Australia here).

My practice is based near Port Macquarie in the village of Telegraph Point. Tatiana has worked with me and my other senior accounting lady, Jay Verhoeven, for almost four years.

I have been Tatiana's Mentor for her Charles Sturt University Accountancy course and this has involved me in assisting her with course assignments and dealing with Chartered Accountants Australia & New Zealand on her behalf.

On Monday 9th. December 2019, I attended Tatiana's university graduation ceremony at "the Glass House" in Port Macquarie with two other friends of hers. On the stage, she was presented with her Bachelor of Accounting Certificate by the University Vice-Chancellor - photos attached.

Great credit is due to Tatiana for putting in all the long, hard hours of study to achieve her Australian Accounting University Degree. This is particularly so because she has only been in Australia for 10 years and could not speak English when she arrived.

She immediately began to study English at TAFE. Later she undertook an Accountancy course at TAFE and has now attained the status of Bachelor of Accounting at University.

With English only being her second language, attaining this University degree without failing any subject, is remarkable, particularly as she took up to four subjects in a semester to complete her course as quickly as possible.

Not resting on her laurels, she is presently partway through the Professional Course of Chartered Accountants Australia & New Zealand which will give her the prestige qualification of "Chartered Accountant" (CA).







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WARNING: Bushfires and scams

The start of 2020 has not been an easy one for Australia, particularly those impacted by the bushfires. Scamwatch is warning all Australians to be on the lookout for fundraising scams and do their research when donating so that money can get to those who are in need, rather than those who would take advantage.

Following every disaster it is natural to want to help and donate as quickly as possible. However, scammers also follow disasters in order to take advantage of the generosity of Australians.

These scammers will most often pretend to be associated with well-known charities, large businesses or government departments to make them look legitimate.

Scamwatch has seen many types of scams spring up in response to the bushfires, including:

- Calls and text messages impersonating businesses or government organisations seeking 'donations' that they will be sending on to well-known charities.
- Business email compromise scams where the scammer impersonates a high level employee in a business claiming the business will be making a donation to the bushfires to the scammers account.
- Individuals on social media and crowdfunding sites claiming to be fundraising where it is dubious that the money raised will actually be donated.
- Impersonation of real charities via calls, text, and even in person through door to door charity appeals.
- Individuals claiming to be relatives of those affected by

the bushfires seeking donations.

Ensure your money gets to those who need it by following this advice:

- Do not donate via fundraising pages on platforms that do not verify the legitimacy of the fundraiser or that do not guarantee your money will be returned if the page is determined to be fraudulent.
- Be careful about crowdfunding requests as these may be fake and also come from scammers. Check the terms and conditions of funding platforms and ensure you are dealing with official organisations. If you are unsure, make your donation to an established charity instead.
- The best way to avoid scams and make sure your dollars get where they are needed is to do your research and donate directly to registered charities.
- You can look up registered charities on the Australian Charities and Not-for-profit Commissions website If you believe you donated to a scam you should:
- Contact your bank to report the transaction immediately.
- Report the scam to the website it is hosted on.
- Make a report on the Scamwatch website, or find more information about where to get help.
- The ACCC has also set up a dedicated phone number for the public to report bushfire related scams. People can call 1300 795 995 to report these scams. @scamwatch_gov

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



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

After a week of weather at almost welding heat, beautiful rain fell on Sunday last, and it is still raining at the time of writing. We needed it, too, as the previous fall had almost disappeared. Quite a number of aspirants for our local Parliament, eh! Well, it is to be hoped that

the ratepayers will elect men who are able to satisfy all our requirements on our much-out-of-repair roads. The retiring Councillors have had a shortage of funds to work upon, and never thought of a remedy until too late to give effect to it — that is, to have a re-valuation this year. But perhaps it is as well they did not, as Holman is determined to raise the rate to 4d if possible; that is, if he is in power next Parliamentary term -and this, on top of high valuations, would certainly supply adequate funds for roads, but would harass many already over-burdened citizens. Our cricketers got one more drubbing on Saturday last — Port beat them by 99 runs.. But the excessive heat was the cause. We are pleased to know that our old friends Mr. and Mrs Sharpe and family are spending their holidays by the seaside. Since leaving here, Mr. Sharpe has been stationed at the public school, Canowindra, and surf bathing is rather scarce out there. We trust that their stay at Port will be most beneficial to them. Report says that a find of wolfram has been made in this vicinity. I hope it's right, as that mineral is valuable indeed just at present. Cream supplies are on the upward move, and may they keep going too. Mosquitoes are giving us their attention, and their bite is no milder than of yore. After five weeks out of work our teachers and scholars alike have to get back to toil again on Tuesday next. Hooray! Many visitors have been in our midst during the holidays. The sad news of the passing to the Great Beyond of Master George Rolleston, son of Mr. -and Mrs. J. Rolleston, came to us from Sydney on Mon day of last week. The untimely end of this bright youth cast a gloom over the neighbourhood. He was taken suddenly ill while in Sydney, and the doctors advised an immediate operation for appendicitis. This was un successful, and a subsequent operation was necessary, which resulted fatally. George was 17 years of age and a native of this centre, and every heart goes out in kind and deepest sympathy to the sorrowing parents, brothers and sisters. Certainly death is the one thing

that everyone is very sure of, but this fact does not lighten the sorrow of the bereaved. It seems hard that the young should be taken, and time alone can heal the wounded hearts that mourn his passing. If you wish to make a donation you can drop it off at the fire brigade station in Mooney Street on a Monday evening from 7pm (not on public holidays) or please give me a call or by simply dropping a few coins into the new donation boxes at the Service Station, Riverview Tavern, Sport & Rec. Club and Ricardoes Tomatoes, if you cannot see them, just ask, every little bit helps.

In an emergency call "000". Please remember "000" is for emergencies only.









Key information

The NSW Government and the Commonwealth are covering the clean-up cost of insured and uninsured residential properties destroyed by bush fire across NSW, as well as eligible commercial properties.

The NSW Government has appointed Laing O'Rourke Australia to manage the NSW bush fire recovery clean-up, working with Public Works Advisory. Local contractors and local suppliers will be engaged, where possible, to deliver clean-up services in communities.

Delivering these services means impacted property owners will not have to pay for debris, including potentially hazardous materials, to be removed and disposed of.

Impacted property owners who would like their property cleared need to register by calling Service NSW on 13 77 88. Registering helps deploy resources to communities and enables owners to provide consent for crews to undertake work on their property.

Clean-up timeline

We expect most residential properties will be substantially cleared by 30 June 2020. It may take longer to clean up isolated properties in remote areas and regions where there is still active fire.

Safety is the number one priority and before any clearing work begins, we need to ensure hazardous materials, such as asbestos, are identified and contained.

Clearing work will begin after properties have been made safe. Work will be undertaken simultaneously on the North Coast, South Coast, Snowy Monaro, Snowy Valleys and other impacted communities across the State.

Laing O'Rourke will begin contacting registered property owners from early February 2020 to begin planning.

We encourage owners of destroyed properties to register for the clean-up with <u>Service NSW</u> on 13 77 88 as soon as possible.

Local subcontractor engagement

Laing O'Rourke will work with qualified local subcontractors and suppliers to take advantage of local knowledge and expertise, as well as provide stimulation to the local economy.

Many local subcontractors have already contacted Public Works Advisory and NSW Procurement and their details will be provided to Laing O'Rourke.

Interested subcontractors are also encouraged to register on the <u>NSW Government bushfire</u> supplier portal.

Unlicensed tradespeople

Beware of unlicensed tradespeople offering cheap, quick, cash-only repairs. Only licensed tradespeople can carry out any residential building work valued at more than \$5000 and all specialist work, including asbestos removal, regardless of value.

Also be aware Public Works Advisory and Laing O'Rourke staff will pre-arrange any household visits and will not turn up unannounced or demand payment.

Port Macquarie Aews. SATURDAY, FEB. 7, 1920.

Telegraph Point. [FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT.]

After a, week that appeared more like winter' than anything else we are back again to summer level as far as heat goes. The cold snap caused much alarm throughout the district, and we are all glad enough it has changed to more seasonable weather conditions. Some of us had a trip to Rollands Plains on Wednesday of last week to attend the half-yearly meeting of the dairy company. Dairymen were pre sent in very small numbers, owing, no doubt, to the enormous amount of work that has cropped up since the beautiful rainfall. All the same it seems a pity that men cannot spare time enough to attend meetings of a company they are interested in and through which they earn a livelihood: -Items of great importance to the welfare of the dairymen were discussed, and at such meetings the views of producers should be aired. Whether their arguments are sound or otherwise discussion does good. The temper of the meeting was good and no excitement prevailed. The residents of Cooperabung Creek are astounded at the apathy of the Department of Education. The children at that centre have not been able to get to school owing to the fact that the contract for their conveyance thereto has not been let, although plenty of time has elapsed since receiving the tenders for same. This is contemptible neglect on the part of the Department, and the sooner a responsible Government is in charge the better. Very little interest was taken here in the election of Shire Councillors, only a fraction of the ratepayers voting. But many were turned away by the presiding officer owing to their names being deleted from the

We hope that all these ratepayers will be on the roll at the next election. The great necessity of a guard rail or fence on the dangerous portion of the Bluff-road has been overlooked. This is no silly argument, and some day an accident will happen there that will bring down the anger of the whole district upon the heads of the councillors responsible. The road is narrow, and the precipice very steep, and death is almost certain to the unfortunate person who happens to make an unexpected descent. Some folks talk of going barefooted on account of the robbery that is going on in the boot trade. Business people say that the grower of the hides squeals the loudest when asked these prices by the buccaneers of the industry. No wonder, when he (the grower) only gets 3s for what he is asked 25s for in boots. Calf skins realise from 1s 6d to 3s 6d per lb., generally the former, and sometimes much less, and for the manufactured article the general public are forced to pay 12s 6d per lb. Let

men flocking to the city. They have been reared in the country and know how to work the land. If rural conditions were only half as good as some people think these lads of .the 'Aussie' breed would not consider a city job at £3 10s but would buck in and make their fortunes at the work they love. But no inducement is offering, and politicians can talk more production, etc., until they are as black in the face, as they are in their hearts, but it won't come until world parity in prices is established, and price fixers of rural and primary products are as dead as Caesar. We want none of them un less we are to benefit by their actions. A meeting is to be held on Satur day night next to finally deal with the soldiers' money distribution. The advertised time for claims to be lodged expired last Saturday. It is a shame that no committee men were nominated for the District Hospital. Surely there are plenty of men who have enough spare tune on their hands to enable them to attend to such a noble work. This institution was erected for the benefit of mankind, and to think that this, haven of succour and rest must be closed because not one single in dividual is willing to work for God's own hospice is dreadful to think of. Wealthy people should count their blessings and see if they, in their turn, should allow God's poor to die and suffer unattended. I for one will make one on the committee roll, and although only struggling to make a living, will give up some of my time to the cause of suffering humanity. Let us all awake to a sense of our duty to the afflicted, and see that neither money nor time is spared, and thus keep this most necessary institution open for the scientific treatment of suffering humanity - both rich and poor alike. 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Screen Time with Mark Johnson





About seven years ago we were watching two British TV shows concurrently. One, "Beautiful People" was set in the 1980's and was a family comedy. The mother of the central character (a flamboyant teenager) was played by an actress I was unfamiliar with. She was a bleach blond, busty mum, loud and loving and more than little dizzy (not surprisingly, as she tottered around on giant stilettos). She was a mix of Barbara Windsor and Diana Dors. At about the same time we were watching a superb dark crime drama called "Broadchurch", in which the two central characters were detectives, one of which was played by David Tennant and the other by a dark-haired, thin, serious and intense actress. As the credits rolled, I realised that the actresses playing these two roles had the same name: Olivia Colman. We had watched both series without ever realising that the female lead was played by the same actress.

I was intrigued. Not only did the she look completely different physically, but she sounded different and each had totally different mannerisms.

It seems that the world has caught on to Olivia Colman, and none too soon.

Now she seems to be everywhere, especially at award ceremonies.

Last year, Olivia Colman won The Best Actress Oscar for her role in "The Favourite", an historical piece set during the reign of Queen Anne in the early 18th century. The basic plot concerns the rivalry between two cousins (Rachel Weisz and Emma Stone) for the position of "court favourite" to the ageing queen, played by Colman. "The Favourite" is by no means a polite, staid historical drama. It is wickedly funny, very earthy and at times, deeply moving. The supporting players are wonderful (Stone and Weisz both received Best Supporting Actress Oscar nominations), but the film stands on its central performance and Olivia Colman is remarkable. Queen Anne is petulant, childish and often confused. Her health is poor and she has suffered through seventeen miscarriages.

Don't assume that the film is dour and plodding. With a terrific script by Deborah Davis and Australia's Tony McNamara, "The Favourite" had me laughing out loud within the first ten minutes.

The director, Yorgos Lamthimos, keeps the plot moving at a lively pace and his use of fish-eye lenses at times ensures that the film is never dull to look at.

For a look at Olivia Colman portraying another queen, you should look at the Netflix's "The Crown" in which Col-



man takes over the role of Queen Elizabeth the second from Claire Foy, who played the younger queen. Colman brings gravitas and humanity to QE2 and somehow gives her a different spin than Helen Mirren did in "The Queen". Colman recently won a Golden Globe for this performance.

And if that's not enough to convince you, check out "Flowers", also in Netflix, in which Colman plays another (and totally different) mother to a dysfunctional family. "Flowers" is a very black comedy and once again, Colman is central to its success.

It is very gratifying to see that Olivia Colman is finally getting the notice she deserves. I'd suggest you have a look at one or more of these shows, and I'm fairly sure you'll become a fan.

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


NEW members are always welcome!

BLAZE AID WAUCHOPE TEMPORARY CLOSURE

Blaze Aid has been volunteering on farms in the Hastings Valley since early January this year, working on replacing burnt fencing on properties.

Since its opening at the beginning of the year, we have received over 100 claims for help with fencing, and we have completed 31 jobs with several part completed. That's about 27 kms of new and repaired fencing so far.

The Blaze Aid camp at the Wauchope Showground will be closing for approximately two weeks in April, with our last day before closing being 5 April. We will open again after the Wauchope Show on 23 April.

The last day for taking claims from property owners, whose fences were burnt in the recent fires, is 5 April. If you want to make a claim, make sure you do it by then. 
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Dear Residents,

Heat oil in a large frying plan on high. Fry patties in 2 batches, 3-4 minutes each side, until golden. Drain on paper towel

Serve patties with wasabi mayonnaise and vegetables.

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Corn Fritters

3/4 cups self raising flour

- 1/2 cup of milk
- 2 eggs
- 20 gm butter1 can corn kernels
- 1/2 cup cheese
- 2 tabs chives or shallots or diced onion!
- 2 tsp olive oil

You can add whatever vegetables you have, add diced capsicum/grated zucchini/ broccoli/grated carrot

Place flour into a large bowl. Whisk together the milk, eggs and butter. Stir into flour until batter is smooth.

Add the corn kernels, vegetables and chives. Season with salt and pepper.

Heat oil in a large non-stick frying pan over medium heat. Add spoonful's of mixture to pan and cook for 2 minutes each side until golden. Drain on paper towel.

Fritters are great for lunches, with salad or breakfast with avocado and bacon.

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

Telegraph Point Community Association President's Update

In these unprecedented circumstances, because of the recommendations not to hold gatherings and to stay 1.5 metres apart, and as there were no urgent items to discuss, it was decided to cancel the March meeting of the Association and conduct any urgent business via email.

To provide a quick update:

We are preparing to get the hall connected to the new sewerage system and have received several quotes. All group activities in the hall have been cancelled until further notice.

We have some good news. We were successful in receiving a State Government grant to have air conditioning installed in the hall and that should happen by the end of April. The system will be coin operated so those groups using the hall can choose to pay for cooling or heating of the hall. This addition together, with the ceiling fans and whirly birds that are already installed should make for a much more comfortable experience in the extremes of our climate.

Thank you for inviting me to address the meeting in support of our Telegraph Point & Surrounds Community Plan on behalf of the Telegraph Point Council Community Action Team known as the CCAT.

Telegraph Point has a somewhat unique advantage over other villages in the Hastings Valley because it sits less than half an hour's drive from three major towns, Port Macquarie, Wauchope and Kempsey, which provide families with opportunities for gaining employment within reasonable driving distances. For many years the Pacific Highway roared through the middle of the village, but now that the highway traffic bypasses us we enjoy a much safer journey on Telegraph Point Road. We have a thriving primary school with 135 pupils, six classes, two learning and support teachers, the principal and administration staff, a day care centre/preschool with places for 32 children, a sports oval that hosts the Western Phoenix Football Club, a post office, a service station/general store, two timber mills, two mechanical workshops, a smash repairer, a function centre, an aqua park, a sports and recreation club and of course the local pub. Dotted around the village and farms are various BNBs, one of which I know has won several tourism awards. Our community is very diverse including many tradespeople, farmers, health workers, business people, artists and quite a lot of retired people. We recently experienced a bushfire crisis that brought out the best in our little community with fantastic support given to the firefighters, residents and other small communities that were in danger of running out of supplies.

The process of developing this plan with Council has been very customer focused. Georgina and her team have been very supportive of the small group of Telegraph Point residents that became the CCAT. From the beginning she took on the task of gathering together all the enthusiastic ideas and suggestions from our community and forming them into this plan, but some of the more outlandish and overambitious ideas didn't make it into the plan, such as a Myers store and a tidal pool in the Wilson River.

However, we do have big ideas for our village and its surrounding areas with the valued assistance of Council. There is a need for increased opportunities for our children as there are very limited resources and the need for somewhere they can meet and engage in activities, particularly as the children, without transport, are isolated from the larger towns.

We have been steadily upgrading our community hall. In the last three years we have put on a new roof, a new ceiling with ceiling fans and whirlybird roof vents making it a more pleasant and healthier environment, because we want the hall to remain the focal point of the community and to be the emergency evacuation centre for the area which will mean building an ablutions block with disabled access.

Apart from the hall the outdoor areas of the village have been somewhat neglected over the years and if you read our plan you will see we envisage improved signage, historical information, walking tracks, bicycle tracks, a large undercover eating area for the beautiful Log Wharf Reserve with barbecues, an adventure playground, fitness equipment, and murals on the bridge pylons depicting our local Aboriginal heritage.

We must support the businesses and facilities that do exist in our village and encourage new businesses to start up; at the same time we must ensure our natural environment is preserved. The health of the river, a secure water supply and our native animals are high on our list of priorities.

We must also strive for safety on our winding country roads which are currently used by very heavy vehicles such as log trucks servicing timber mills, semi-trailers, livestock trucks and milk tankers which compete for space around the narrow bends with school buses, private cars and motor cycles. Added to this mix are the visitors to the area who are not familiar with the roads.

Helping villages like Telegraph Point develop in a positive way can only benefit the general environment of the Hastings Valley and its people. We want to make Telegraph Point a destination – a place people want to visit and live in and we look forward to the continued support of Council now and into the future.

Our presentation was well received by Council and the plan was unanimously endorsed. Stay safe everyone.



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
Telegraph Point Village Sewer Scheme near completion

Screen Time With Mark Johnson



Now that The Zombie Apocalypse is upon us, the small screen has become our main source of entertainment. Thankfully, the streaming services (mainly Netflix, Stan and Amazon Prime) are a rich resource of entertainment to help distract us from worrying about where our next roll of toilet paper is coming from.

Apart from the third season of my favourite Guilty Pleasure, "Elite", Netflix has a terrific series called "I Am Not Okay With This", which I bingewatched recently.

"Not Okay" is, superficially, a teen angst drama with a twist. The central character, Sydney Novak, is a teenager whose father has suicided recently and who is living with her waitress mother in a small American town, distinguished, as she tells us, by being the most polluted town

in The U.S.A for three years running.

Sydney is a bit of a misfit, both at school and socially, and she carries a load of unresolved anger as well as low self esteem. In other words, she is a typical teenager. She has one friend in school, Dina, who, much to Sydney's disdain, is dating the school football hero.

On the way home from school one day, Sydney meets a near neighbour, with who she is familiar, but not friendly. Stanley is, like Sydney, a misfit and again like Sydney, has a difficult relationship with his single father. Stanley is one of the most likeable and quirky characters I've seen lately. As played by Wyatt Olef, Stanley is gangly, gawky and socially inept. He dresses is retro op shop fashion, he is tall and uncoordinated and he reminds me very much of the "best friends" Molly Ringwald used to have in the teen comedies of the Eighties, like "Pretty in Pink" and "Sixteen Candles".

In fact, "Not Okay" is clearly influenced by the John Hughes teen films of the Eighties.

Sydney and Stanley strike up a sort of friendship, which compensates a little for Dina's "going steady" with the jock Brad.

Seems like a pretty standard teen comedy/drama, but there's a twist. Sydney is subject to bouts of anger and these are accompanied by what looks like a burgeoning telekinesis. That is, the ability to move objects with her thoughts. If you've ever seen the Seventies film "Carrie", you'll be familiar with this trope. Like Carrie, Sydney is initially unaware of this ability and shocked and disturbed when it starts to manifest itself. She confides in Stanley and he is fascinated.

That's about as much plot as you need to know. Except, of course, that the story unfolds in flashback, and

when we first see Sydney she is running down the deserted main street of the town covered in blood. How she came to be in this situation is for you to find out.

"I Am Not Okay With This" is beautifully written and structured. The acting, especially by the three main leads, Sophie Lillis as Sydney, Wyatt Olef as Stanley and Sophia Bryant as best friend Dina, is wonderful, and there is a lovely and poignant performance by Kathleen Rose Perkins as Sydney's exhausted, worrying mother Maggie.

The last episode centres around the end of year school prom, that fundamental ritual of American schools, and is, I have to say, mind-blowing. How? I'll let you find out. But there are the makings of a second series, and I, for one, can hardly wait to meet these characters again.


Class News – KW

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



The death toll is estimated to have been anywhere from 17 million to 50 million, and possibly as high as 100 million, making it one of the deadliest pandemics in human history.

Family history is quite a popular hobby.

The National Australian Archives have opened and are available to the public the World War One Service Records, Boar War and not all Second World War Records are open. For \$30.00 a digitized copy will be available.

Another excellent research tool is the AIF Project which has 331,000 records of personnel who served in WW1. The Project was undertaken by the Australian Defence Force Academy.

The Department of Veterans Affairs, DVA, has produced Nominal Rolls for WW2, Korea, Vietnam and a preliminary First Gulf War list. From this site a Certificate can be printed showing where Enlisted, Service, Service Number, Rank, Corps, length of Service and NOK.

The Australian War Graves Commission have very good information on the War dead and PDF Remembrance certificates can be printed.

I certainly hope a story can be attached to the medals worn on the Right.

We share our stories, let us not forget theirs.



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COVID-19 Stage 1 restrictions



What's changing for NSW under COVID-19 Stage 1 easing of restrictions?

When using outdoor equipment or playgrounds, people are advised to maintain social distancing and public gathering requirements and are encouraged to sanitise the equipment before and after use.

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SCREEN TIME WITH MARK JOHNSON



Biographical movies have been a staple of Hollywood since its earliest days. When Al Jolson made "The Jazz Singer", the first official "talkie" in 1927, he was practically playing himself. Cut to the Seventies and there is Diana Ross playing the great Billie Holiday.

Now, Diana Ross is a terrific pop singer and as it turned out, a terrific actress, scoring a Best Actress Oscar nomination for her first film. Unfortunately, in my opinion, having Ross herself sing the Holiday songs was, at the very least unfortunate. Diana Ross sounds as much like Billie Holiday as Kylie Minogue sounds like Joan Sutherland.

So it was with some trepidation that I approached "Rocketman", knowing that Elton John had assisted in the movie and so was expecting a sugar-coated version of Elton's life.

Elton John has become, in the last two decades, something of an "International Treasure". It was quite wonderful to see, at his recent Australian tour, audiences ranging from teens to octogenarians singing along.

The second big surprise? His story, for all its truth, is not treated as a straightforward biopic. It is structured as a traditional musical, using John's songs to comment on his life.

In short, "Rocketman" is a great big, colourful, noisy, camp musical; and being about Elton John, that's the perfect format.

What's interesting about it though, is that within this format, it still presents us with some of the tougher aspects of Elton's life: his alcoholism, drug dependency, and his struggle with his sexuality in a time when being gay could spell the end of a career.

"Rocketman" begins with in the Eighties (I think) with Elton, dressed in an outrageous stage devilcostume, attending his first Alcoholics Anonymous meeting. He is angry, stubborn and crying out for help. We flash back to his childhood (his mother and father do not come out of this well) and his early career, including his first meeting with Bernie Taupin, his lyricist and ultimately, his great friend.


We then follow Elton on his road to sobriety, all interspersed with his songs.

The film becomes a story about self acceptance and the end is especially moving.

Another surprise came later when I discovered that the actor playing Elton, Taron Egerton, did his own singing. I assumed Elton himself had dubbed the vocals. ln short, "Rocketman". It's funny, charming and wildly with terrific performances, entertaining, especially from Taron Egerton as Elton and Jamie Bell (a long was from Billy Elliot) playing Bernie Taupin.






Slavery on the North Coast. -TO THE EDITOR PORT MACQUARIE NEWS.



TELEGRAPH POINT READY TO CONNECT TO NEW SEWERAGE SCHEME

1 May 2020

Telegraph Point residents are the first of three communities in the Port Macquarie-Hastings region that can connect to a new reticulated sewerage system from this week.

The three-village sewerage scheme is a major project being delivered by Council for the townships of Telegraph Point, Comboyne and Long Flat.

All three communities will benefit from the construction of new sewerage treatment plants and full collection systems which include a pressure sewer system in Telegraph Point, and gravity sewer systems in Long Flat and Combovne.

Mayor Peta Pinson said current sewage waste disposal within the three villages is through on-site management systems. "The new fully reticulated sewerage network will provide a more efficient disposal method, and importantly, protect the environment and health of the local community," Mayor Pinson said. "This is a \$29 million investment in Telegraph Point, Long Flat and Comboyne, and yet another example of Council working closely with the NSW Government in delivering for our rural villages."

The first connections to the Telegraph Point sewerage network are expected to take place in May, with 101 properties able to be connected.

Member for Port Macquarie, Leslie Williams said people living in smaller villages such as Telegraph Point deserve to have the same modern infrastructure as larger centres like Port Macquarie.

"I am pleased the NSW Government has been able to provide funding to allow Council to provide reticulated sewerage services to these three areas," Mrs Williams said.

Work is also progressing well on the sewerage schemes in Comboyne and Long Flat, on track for completion and connection in August and September respectively.

Council will be in contact with property owners in Telegraph Point with information on what needs to happen to connect to the new system.

The three village sewerage scheme project is an investment of more than \$29 million, which is being funded by Council and through a \$6 million contribution from the NSW State Government under the Restart NSW Water Security for Regions Program.

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

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

Telegraph Point Community Association President's Update

It's good news that NSW is slowly coming back to life after the shutdown imposed by Covid-19. Local businesses are re-opening and some people are getting back to their workplaces with Covid-19 protocols in place of course. This shutdown has impacted on our TP Community Association in that we haven't been able to meet to discuss the general running of the Association, but have just been meeting our obligations, paying bills etc. The hall has been closed for months so there has been no income generated from there. During that time our Hall Manager Ross resigned after doing a sterling job for three years.

This newsletter has been struggling to get contributions from members of our community, making it difficult for our publisher Di to fill the pages. Di has now advised us that after four years of great work she can no longer continue to be responsible for the newsletter compilation and distribution which leaves us with a big hole in our communication strategy. What I am saying here is we need more people to step up and help with the work of our Association, coming along to meetings bringing ideas and suggestions for fundraising and generally maintaining and improving our Tele Point lifestyle and someone to help with communications.

- A quick summary of some of our achievements and activities over the past three years:
- A completely new roof on the hall with whirly bird extractors
- A new ceiling in the main part of the hall with ceiling fans and sustainable lighting
- Air conditioning installed in the hall
- Liaison with Council and State Government to get the footpath from the primary school to Log Wharf Reserve with refuge points and new parking spaces opposite the school
- Participation in the Council Community Action Team to develop the Telegraph Point and Surrounds Community Action Plan that was recently adopted by Council
- Free First Aid Courses provided in the hall for community members
- A defibrillator installed at the hall that we hope will never need to be used
- Markets, exhibitions, sausage sizzles and cake stalls

We have been successful in receiving a grant to pay for the connection of the hall to the new sewerage system and arrangements are under way to get this done as soon as possible. Blake Gittoes is the plumber who will be carrying out the work of the new connection and the removal of the septic tank.

We have also received grant funding to commence preparations for the building of an accessible amenities block at the hall which will provide access to less mobile people who have not been able to participate in activities at the hall due to the lack of accessible facilities. We are still in the design stage but when the time comes to excavate the site at the northern side of the hall, after the septic tank has been removed, we will be calling for expressions of interest from locals who can do the work.

Our hall will reopen on 13 June 2020 with Covid-19 protocols in place for the safety of all who use the hall. There will be a meeting of the Community Association at 7.00 pm on Wednesday 24 June 2020 so please come along and take part in community activities. We can now switch on the air conditioning to warm up the hall prior to the meeting.





VP DAY PROJECT

Local Hero: Aircraftman 1 William Ossian Chelman 25061 was born at Telegraph Point; he joined the RAAF in May 1940.

On the 8th August 1942, William was on board Sunderland W4019 of No 10 Sqn RAAF, which crashed in the Bay of Biscay, off the coast of Spain and all the crew were killed. They have no known grave and their names are commemorated on the Memorial to the Missing Runnymede, UK.

William's story and 148 other locals will be on display at the Hall from 10:00 on Sunday 16th of August to commemorate VP Day. The display will be presented in folders containing personal World War II history and stories, hopefully we can answer questions like, what is a Sunderland and why was No 10 Squadron there?

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

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



Over the last month the weather has been good allowing people to do hazard reduction burns and generally tidy up around their properties in preparation for the next fire danger period.

The brigade has been very quiet. We have used this time to reinstall equipment on our replacement Cat 1 and carry out maintenance ie rust removing and painting etc, to make it operational and observing Covid19 rules as well.

We are all looking forward to returning to normal as possible after Covid19 virus. Our training schedule and meetings hasn't happened and all members miss our gatherings on a Monday evening.

With the restrictions on travel etc with the Corona virus, at the moment, its a good time to have a cleanup around your home and to put in place a **Bush Fire Survival Plan.**

The information to assist you with this is on the NSW Rural Fire Service internet site (just google RFS). Booklets and further information is available at our Wauchope RFS Centre or call there on 1300643262.

PERMITS NOT required

But you still need to notify your neighbours and fire control (1300643262) 24hrs in advance of lighting. Put a sign on your gate to notify passing traffic that you are carrying out a hazard reduction burn is very helpful and could prevent good will callouts for us.

If you are thinking of doing some hazard reduction burns please give 24hrs notice to your neighbours and fire com on 1300643262. Sometimes their message bank may be full or they are out of office. If that's the case you can email firecom on midcoast.district@rfs.nsw.gov.au



Connecting to a Village Sewerage Scheme Frequently Asked Questions

1. What existing fixtures are required to be connected to the scheme?

2. How do I decommission the septic tank / collection well?

The contents of the tank / collection well are to be removed by a licensed waste contractor; either by tanker removal to an appropriate site or pumped into the existing disposal trench, which should then be sealed.

The sides, lid, baffle (if fitted) and square junctions of the tank should be hosed down as the waste is being removed.

The tank is to be disinfected by broadcasting Builders' (Hydrated) Lime over the exposed surfaces. Several holes should be punched into the base of the tank. The lid and those parts of the walls, baffle and square junctions above the ground should be demolished and collapsed into the tank and the tank filled with clean soil or rubble and topped with clean soil.

3.Can the existing septic tank be reused for collecting and distributing water to the garden or for internal use?

4.As the plumber, can I lodge the Section 68 application on behalf of the property owner?

Yes, although all owners must sign the application form.

5. What paperwork am I required to lodge?

For Approval - under the Local Government Act, 1993:
□Completed application form with property owners' signatures
□Required fee of \$252.00□One complete plan set; plan is to include a site plan showing the house, location of the septic tank, point of connection, the proposed pipe work and any relevant information.
□The plan is to have a notation stating the septic tank will be removed from the site, or decommissioned.
Before works commence onsite - under the Plumbing and Drainage Act, 2011: □ A Notice of Work commencement form. As outlined by the Act, this must be submitted to Council with a minimum two (2) business days prior to theworks commencing onsite. (Note: this form can be lodged with the Section68 application).
After Works have been completed - under the Plumbing and Drainage Act, 2011: □The Certificate of Works Compliance. As outlined by the Act, this must be submitted to Council and a copy provided to the property owner within two(2)business days after the works have been com-



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

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Spiced Carrot Soup

This is a lovely starter to nibbles or finger food.

1/3 cup olive oil

- 2 teaspoons honey
- 3 teaspoons ground cumin
- 3 teas corianders seeds, lightly crushed
- 2 cinnamon sticks, broken in half
- 1.5 kgs carrots, cut into even chunks (about 3 cm)

3 cups (750ml) chicken stock

100ml cream

3/4 cup (185g) sour cream

3 tabs fresh coriander leaves (optional)

Preheat the oven to moderately hot 200°C. Combine the oil, honey, cumin, coriander seeds, cinnamon sticks, 1 teaspoon salt and plenty of cracked black pepper in a roasting tine. Add the chunks of carrot and mix well to ensure that all the carrot is coated in the spice mixture.

Roast for 1 hour, or until the carrot is tender, shaking the pan occasionally during cooking. Remove from the oven, discard the cinnamon sticks with tongs and allow the carrot to cool slightly.

Transfer half the carrot chunks 1½ cups (375ml) of the stock and 1 cup (250ml) water to a food processor or blender. Blend until smooth. Strain through a sieve into a clean saucepan. Repeat with the remaining carrots, stock and another 1 cup (250ml) water. Brings the soup to a simmer and cook for 10 mins. Add the cream and season to taste. Pour into shot glasses or expresso cups. Garnish each cup with ¼ teaspoon sour cream and a coriander leaf.

Makes 1.25 litres.

Think ahead: The soup can be refrigerated for 2 days or frozen before the cream is added for up to 8 weeks.

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

Victory in the Pacific Day marks Japan's unconditional surrender to the Allies after more than 3 years of war.

The 15th August, 2020 marks the 75th anniversary of Victory in the Pacific Day.

On VP Day, we reflect on the important role that Australians played to end the war in the Pacific region.

Australians are most well known for their engagements with Japan in the Pacific in the Papua New Guinea campaigns of 1942: Kokoda and Milne Bay. However, Australians also supported the Allied cause in the Pacific towards the latter half of the Second World War. In total, six Australian divisions, supported by the Royal Australian Air Force and the Royal Australian Navy were in action against the Japanese from 1942 to 1945 throughout the Pacific region, including in Singapore, Borneo, Malaya, Papua, New Guinea and New Britain.

OUR LOCAL HEROS: POWER B. J.

Bernard joined the Army in January 1943 he died in New Guinea through illness in August 1943, he was 20. He was a private with the 11th Australian Division Mobile Laundry. Bernard is buried with Honours at the Bomana Cemetery Port Moresby.

Members of the local History Association are researching almost 150 Soldiers, Sailors and Airman from our district. The stories of these local heroes will be on display at the Hall from 10:00 on Sunday 16th of August to commemorate VP Day. The display will be presented in folders containing personal World War II history and stories.





SCREEN TIME

With the Zombie Apocalypse into its sixth month, and cinemas closed (not to mention film and TV production halted too), streaming services have become much more prominent and some film makers are choosing to release their films on Netflix, Stan, Amazon Prime etc. This works for smaller-budget films but poses a dilemma for the big Hollywood players. A movie with a hundred million dollar budget, which is not expensive by Hollywood standards, won't make its money back without a theatrical release. A big budget movie, like "Avengers: Endgame", with its US\$356 million budget, stands no chance. Even if cinemas were open, social distancing means that each session will probably hold about a quarter of the audience than before the pandemic. All of which means that film-going will not return to normal for at least a year, if not more. "An ill wind blows no good", as the old saying goes and some interesting small films, which would probably have failed to find audiences before, are now getting a bit of chance to shine.



"The Vast of Night" on Amazon Prime is one such little gem of a film. Made in seventeen days on a budget of less than a hundred thousand dollars (or about the cost of roughly twenty seconds of "Avengers: Endgame" if my primary school maths serves me right), "The Vast of Night" is as smart and entertaining as any film I've seen this year.

Set in small Texas town one one night in 1959, "Vast" begins when a teenage telephone switchboard operator hears a

peculiar electronic/mechanical sound on one of the town's manual telephone lines. Most of the townsfolk are attending a local high school basketball competition, so she calls a teenage friend who mans the local radio station for the night shift. Between them, they try to work out what the sound is, but then a caller to the radio station tells them of secret constructions he was involved in at a nearby air force base, the source of the noise becomes more intriguing.

That's as much of the plot as you need to know. The two teens try to work out what is happening, which generally involves a lot of running around the nearly deserted town. Now, when I say "running around", I mean it. This is one of the most dynamic films I've ever seen. The camera tracks and follows the characters as they chase through the dark and dusty streets.

I read about these long tracking shots and they were apparently produced using such "hi tech" equipment as an old go-kart being pushed by a local high school student. There is one long, continuous tracking shot, at about thirty minutes in, which boggled my mind and which I still can't work how it was done. The camera follows the telephone operator, Fay running out of the telephone exchange and across the town, through the gymnasium where the basketball game is taking place and out to the other side of the town.

There are echoes of other sci-fi movies, from the Fifties "Invaders from Mars" to Spielberg's "Close Encounters of the Third Kind". There are also cute references to similar texts (the radio station name is

WOTW, which, of course, spells out "War of the Worlds".

The end is interestingly ambiguous.

The film is a first film for director Andrew Patterson and the writer (James Montague) and the editor (Junius Tully) are both pseudonyms for director Andrew Patterson.

It may be a very small and modestly budgeted film, but "The Vast of Night" heralds the beginning of what should be an amazing career for Andrew Patterson.

Behind the clubhouse at Charlie Watt Reserve and heading into the Cairncross State Forest are a series of fire trails perfect for walking tracks, plus the old mountain biking trail. While the mountain bike trails are no longer suitable for riding at speed, they make a great track for casual BMXing or a scenic walking trail for bird spotting.

The old mountain biking trail is a 9 km loop track that runs from Blackbutt Road heading west (parallel with Pembroke Rd), then south towards the 7/4 Fire Trail before doing a loop alongside Blackbutt Road. The timber boardwalks are not well maintained in some spots (and need some TLC) so please walk the bike trail before riding at speed.

The wider fire trails also offer walking and horse riding options if you prefer, but there are some muddy spots at the moment after the recent rain. Being a State Forest, dogs are welcome, and there's plenty for your four-legged friends to enjoy.

Plenty of rain has fallen during the past week, to thoroughly soak ~the land. Cold winds have also been prevalent. much to the discomfiture of stock. Much sickness is with us just at present, and quite a number of cases of influenza, some mild, and others severe, have been reported. There are also a few isolated cases of measles. Mr. H. Bailey has been obliged to seek medical aid owing to the after effects of 'flu. He left here for Sydney last week. We hope soon to hear of his complete recovery. Just while I am referring to these maladies I would like to know why it is that more supervision is not forthcoming from the Shire Health Officer. Cases of most infectious diseases, appear from time to time ? (each year more frequently), some times ending fatally, yet practically no action is taken to combat the evil. We know that the order is a big one, but the sooner this super vision is taken, in hand and dealt with the cheaper and better it will be for all concerned. If in any particular centre, a virulent outbreak of diphtheria occurs, dealing death on every hand, then our civic fathers -will realise that 'a stitch in

time,' etc., would have been much the cheaper. Anyhow, further neglect will necessitate the direct stepping above the local authorities by citizens, and, although it would be done reluctantly, the Minister for Health would not take any excuse that might be offered by the local Parliament. Must people are reasonable enough to, know that if the Health Officer Council's enforces the Act that it is for their own good and to safe guard the community. Our roads, owing to the continued rain; are very muddy, especially the by-roads. Some of our residents do quite maintenance work on their by-roads because their rates are swallowed up on the main roads for the benefit of tourists chiefly, and the Council's funds are, defunct so far as the byroads are concerned. This is done in a fairly good spirit, because we know the Council is helpless to help us. But when timber haulers travel these roads in pouring rain and tear up things generally it puts the damper on their lot. The heavy trucks, with their loads, slip and slide about tearing great drains in the roads, and then the rush of water does the rest. 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
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
IGA Store, Lake Cathie Community Centre, Port Macquarie Neighbourhood Centre and in Laurieton, to collect toiletries for distribution.



Don't be a fire risk to your community

Safe Burning

Even if you've been using fire on your property for years, safe burning is your responsibility. Every year, fire services attend to hundreds of fires which start due to the careless use of fire. In some cases, fires have been lit illegally. Many have escaped, threatening homes, crops and livelihoods.

There are simple things you can do to make sure you use fire safely on your property and avoid becoming the fire risk to your community.

Things to remember

Rules and laws on safe burning are there to keep you and your community safe. Get a fire permit. Permits are required during the Bush Fire Danger Period. Fire permits are free and easy to get. Contact your local fire brigade on 0265850103 for a free permit.

Your Safe Burning Checklist BEFORE

- 1. Check you're allowed to burn. Are you allowed to have a burn in your area? Check with your council or local Fire Control Centre. There are alternative ways to get rid of waste or vegetation talk to your council to discuss further.
- 2. Get a permit. Permits are required during the Bush Fire Danger Period. They're free and easy to get. Contact your local Fire Brigade on 0265850103 before you plan to burn.
- 3. Let people know. You can let us know of your planned burn at www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/notify or 1300643262. Make sure you also notify your neighbours at least 24 hours before you intend to burn.

ON THE DAY

- 1. Check weather conditions like the fire danger rating, wind and temperature. Permits may be suspended during bad conditions. If there's a total fire ban, no fire is allowed out in the open.
- 2. Make sure you're using fire safely. Check your permit for any special conditions. Ensure you have a cleared area around any material you're burning and monitor conditions closely.
- 3. If the fire gets out of control, call Triple Zero. It's important that you monitor the fire and have firefighting equipment on hand. If you have any problems, call Triple Zero (000) immediately.

AFTER

Extinguish the fire and monitor it. Keep an eye on the material or area you've been burning and call Triple Zero (000) if the fire causes any concern.

PERMITS NOT required

But you still need to notify your neighbours and fire control (1300643262) 24hrs in advance of lighting. Put a sign on your gate to notify passing traffic that you are carrying out a hazard reduction burn is very helpful and could prevent good will callouts for us.

If you are thinking of doing some hazard reduction burns please give 24hrs notice to your neighbours and fire com on 1300643262. Sometimes their message bank may be full or they are out of office. If that's the case you can email firecom on midcoast.district@rfs.nsw.gov.au.

INSOMNIA CORNER

I haven't watched much in the way of movies lately, seeing as how the Zombie Apocalypse has reduced my attention span to that of a three year old (apologies to any three year olds reading this, and well done if you are). So instead I've been listening to podcasts to get me through the insomniac nights.

Ten years ago, podcasts hardly existed, but are now bit of a boom industry. So, what is a podcast? (just in case you haven't heard of them). As my friend Eve Golden in New York says, "Honey, I've never even *cast* a pod".

The simplest way of describing a podcast is that it is like a radio program, except it isn't broadcast over the radio, but through the internet and not at any set time. So if your mobile phone or tablet connects to the internet, you have access to podcasts.

Now there was a time (brace yourselves for a shock, kiddies) when The North Coast didn't have television. Up until 1965, when NRN 11 started transmission (as Channel 10, which was later changed to 11) families gathered around the radio to listen to such programs as "Dad and Dave in Snake Gully", or "The Argonauts" children's show, "Doctor Paul" ("an adult drama of human conflict") or my favourite, "Mostly Ghostly". Possibly the most famous was "Blue Hills". I can still hear the theme music in my head. But I digress.

Podcasts are a boon to the insomniac. Instead of tossing and turning waiting for either sleep or morning to come, you can listen to a podcast on just about any topic of interest. As someone who has taken insomnia to an Olympic level, podcasts are a godsend to me. They also make excellent entertainment if you are on a car trip. I have dozens of podcasts listed on my phone, but here are a few of my favourites.

"My Favorite Murder" is now one of the most popular podcasts in the world now. It was started in 2016 by two comedians in Los Angeles, Georgia Hardstark and Karen Kilgariff. It is now downloaded over 35 millions times a month. "My Favorite Murder" achieves the unlikely feat of combining real-life crime stories with humour. It shouldn't work, but it does. As the hosts explain, combining crime and humour is not to trivialise the crime, but is a way of dealing with the horrors of the crimes. It's hard to explain why it works, but it does.

Fatal Accident.

We regret to announce the death of Hugh Donald Stewart, Ballengarra, who succumbed injuries sustained through being thrown from his horse. Deceased, who was 43 years of age, was a son

of Mr. C. Stewart, and was born at Telegraph Point. At the age of 23 he married Miss Ann Murray Nelson at Kempsey. There were six children of the marriage — five boys and a girl, viz., John Hewitt (19), William Clement (17), Hugh Donald (14), Dallas Garfield (11), James Allan (6), and Ann Murray (2). Deceased was engaged in farming pursuits, and was a hard-working, industrious man. We extend our sincere sympathy to the widow and children in their tragic bereavement. On the 12th inst. the District Coroner (Mr. F. Hayward, J;P.), held an inquiry at deceased's late residence into the circumstances surrounding death. The evidence given showed that deceased was riding along the Ballengarra Road on the 10th inst., when horse his became unmanageable and rushed between a sulky and an embankment. His foot slipped from the stirrup, and the bolting horse was last seen by witnesses disappearing among the trees. What happened after that can only be surmised, but when the witnesses next saw deceased he was lying unconscious on the road. He was conveyed to his home, and died at 1p.m. next day. The medical evidence showed that death had resulted from a fractured skull, hemorrhage of the brain, and shock. A Bushfire Recovery session will be held on Tuesday 18 August 2020, 10am until 12.30pm at the Rolland's Plains School of Arts. The session will be facilitated by Julie King, Recovery Officer Rural Recovery Support Service – Mid Coast NSW Department of Primary Industries and Kate Macfarlane, Community Recovery Officer Port Macquarie Hastings Council and Resilience NSW.

During this session PMHC representatives will outline the range of important services and support that residents can still access. There is a variety of assistance available including; financial grants, trauma and recovery support and mental health services. Council staff will also



introduce themselves in person to establish future contact points.

The TPCA also received a letter from the PMHC in response to the presentation of the Telegraph Point & Surrounds Community Plan to Council in March. The most promising point to come out of this is that we can start developing a Master Plan for Log Wharf Reserve to ensure delivery of planned capital works in the 20/21 financial year.

The Tele Point Community Action Team hopes the Operational Plan will include an inter-generational playground with large undercover eating area, exercise equipment and barbeque facilities etc. It's important residents continue to have their say on what they would like to see at Log Wharf and other future capital works projects.





The 7th September was Australia's National Threatened Species Day. The first Threatened Species Day was declared in 1996 to commemorate the 60th anniversary of the death of the last Tasmanian tiger (the thylacine) at Hobart Zoo in 1936.

This day of awareness aims to help people learn more about the local plants and animals that are at risk of extinction and what we can do to help. The Telegraph Point area, particularly Cairncross State Forest, Ballengarra, Bril Bril, and Cooperabung, is home to several threatened native species including:





The endangered Large-footed Myotis (Myotis macropus) is a mouse-like micro-bat with grey to reddish brown fur. It weighs a tiny 15 grams, with a wingspan up to 28 cm. It is named for its disproportionately large feet that are about 1 cm long with widely-spaced toes. Its little feet are very hairy with long, curved claws. The Large-footed Myotis is one of Australia's most fascinating bats. It is the only native Australian bat that catches fish

for food. It fishes by trawling its long feet along the water's surface to catch aquatic invertebrates and fish.

The endangered Stuttering Frog (Mixophyes balbus) is a large species of frog reaching up to 8cm. It is a pale brown with darker brown blotches, a dark band across its nose, and a pale yellow belly. It survives only in small pockets of NSW in hilly or mountainous areas along vegetated streams.

Until next month, stay safe everyone. Sue Pike



Australia's National Threatened Species Day...

Its cousin, the endangered Giant Barred Frog (Mixophyes iteratus) is Australia's second largest frog, growing up to 15 cm in size. It is a slightly paler brown with a white belly and distinctive golden eyes with a vertical pupil. It survives only in several isolated populations around forested streams in northern NSW and south-east QLD. Its numbers are continuing to decline due to clearing of forests and reduced water flow.

The endangered Fritillary Butterfly (Argynnis hyperbius inconstans) is one of Australia's rarest native butterfly





It has been almost 20 years since the last specimen of this butterfly was catalogued, although there have been a number of credible but unconfirmed sightings

in the local area including one last month at Gum Scrub. If you have Arrowhead Violet growing on your property, keep an eye out and photograph this butterfly if you're lucky enough to spot one.

You can report a sighting of any of these endangered species to the Office of Environment and Heritage. If you want to do more to help protect our threatened species visit the Saving Our Species program website.

You can volunteer online on a number of different collaborative projects through the **SEED Citizen Science Hub.** Projects that you can contribute to include reporting sightings of native species and feral animals, counting birds, photographing fungi, identifying plants or animals in photographs, sampling local water sources, monitoring food & water stations, and more.

Plan and Prepare

Getting ready for a bush fire is easier than you think. Make a bush fire survival plan so you know what you will do if there's a fire near you. Visit

<u>www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/plan-and-prepare</u> to get started on your bush fire survival plan or download the MyFirePlan app, available on <u>iOS</u> and <u>Android</u>.

A well prepared home is more likely to survive a bush fire. Even if your plan is to leave early, the more you prepare your home, the more likely it will be to survive a bush fire or ember attack. Please ensure your property is fire ready and defendable during the warmer months to come.

Things to consider;

- Ensure there is a good, safe distance between structures, trees, shrubs and flammable materials.
- Mineral earth clearings are ideal fire breaks.
- Keep grasslands as low as practically possible.
- Clear below trees, removing as much lower fuel litter as possible.
- Regularly ensure gutters are free from debris.









Fire Permits

The bush fire danger period commenced September 1, 2020. This means that landholders are required to obtain a fire permit before commencing any burning.

Local residents are encouraged to contact our local brigade to arrange a permit request. The Telegraph Point brigade phone number is 65850103. As many of our permit officers also work full time, our station is not normally attended and it can take up to seven days for us to get back to you. Please be patient with us and leave a message. We will attempt to return your call as soon as possible and make an appointment to meet you on site.

You aren't guaranteed a permit; however, should you receive one you must notify RFS online at www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/notify or if you don't have internet access, call the fire control centre 1300 643 262 (1300 MID COAST) and your neighbours at least 24 hours in advance of commencing the burn.

Approval conditions impacting permit requests include but are not limited to the following:

- ✓ What is being burned.
- ✓ Size / Area of burn pile.
- ✓ Location.
- ✓ Water sources.
- ✓ Residential area exclusion zones.

Once you have received your conditional permit, before you light the fire, please check that there are:

- Favourable weather conditions forecasted, in particular low winds.
- You meet all conditions of the permit.
- NO total fire bans (TOBAN) or a high fire danger rating.

Our Local History at the Port Macquarie Museum

If you haven't visited the Port Macquarie museum in person, you might not be aware of the range of artefacts and objects on display and in their archives that relate to Rollands Plains, Telegraph Point, and the surrounding area. This bronze Memorial Plaque, (or Dead Man's Penny) was presented to the Reid family to honour the life of John Reid (1886 -1918) a farmer from Rollands Plains who was killed while serving in the 34th Battalion at Villers-Bretonneux in April 1918. Object number: 2657.



Wooden tomahawk made from gidgee (Acacia cambagei) apparently made by a man known as Sharkface Jimmy who resided at Glen Esk on the northern bank of the Wilson River.
Object number: 731.

Diary of Thomas George Wilson and family papers of the Wilson family. Thomas Wilson arrived in Australia in 1840, moved to Port

Macquarie in 1860, and then to the family property at "Willesbro", Rollands Plains in 1867. Object number: WIL.

SCREEN TIME

with Mark Johnson

It has taken me a while to become interested in the mystery/crime/whodunnit genre, but I've finally learned to appreciate a good crime thriller (and if you are looking for a terrific crime novel to read, I'd recommend "The Woman in the Window" by A.J.Finn). I can't say I'm particularly partial to what they call "crime procedurals", the C.S.I, Law and Order type TV shows, but I do like a good old-fashioned whodunnit, in the Agatha Christie style.



So I was looking forward to seeing "Knives Out", an American whodunnit very much in the style of Christie, but set in contemporary times. I was planning to see it in the cinema, but then the Zombie Apocalypse set in and that just didn't happen. Mercifully, it began streaming on Amazon Prime a few weeks ago and I was able to finally catch it. It didn't let me down.

"Knives Out" begins, as most whodunnits do, with a death. In this case the victim is Harlan Thrombley, a prolific and hugely successful mystery writer who, on

the morning after his eighty-fifth birthday party, is found by the maid with his throat slashed. Harlan is played with dependable style by Christopher Plummer, who seems to be having a latelife career resurgence, having won a Best Supporting Actor Oscar in 2012 for his charming and moving performance in a terrific little film, "Beginners" (making him the oldest actor to ever win an Oscar). The previous night, his large family had gathered for his party and as we get to meet them, we realise, in good Christie style, that they all had a reason to want him dead.

His children, grandchildren and assorted spouses are played by a terrific ensemble of reliable actors, starting with Jamie Lee Curtis at her driest and funniest. Oh, did I mention that "Knives Out" is not only a clever mystery, but is also very funny? Don Johnson, Michael Shannon and Chris Evans play the other children and Toni Colette plays a daughter-in-law, and would steal the whole movie if it wasn't for the consistently excellent performances by the whole cast. What a truly remarkable performer Toni Colette is. She can play a distressed mother in films like "The Sixth Sense" and "Hereditary" brilliantly, then turn in a slyly hilarious performance such as this one. And she's a terrific singer too.

There is also a superb performance by an actress I had never heard of before this, Cuban-born Ana de Armas, as Harlan's nurse. She has virtually the central role and she is a star in the making. Her presence, as a Latino nurse, provides some of the best satirical jabs at middle-class white privilege. For example, as much as the family assures her that she is "one of the family", no-one seems to know which Latin American country she is from.

I haven't mentioned the main character, a private detective called Benoit Blanc. He is played by Daniel Craig and his Blanc is a splendid creation. Craig sports a Southern accent so rich it sounds like he's been gargling bourbon since he was a child. If you put Foghorn Leghorn is a suit and tie and slowed down his speech, you'd be getting close to Benoit Blanc. He's Hercules Poirot, if Poirot emerged from the swamps of Louisiana instead of cosmopolitan Belgium. At one point, someone calls him "CSI-KFC".



Apart from all the fun, "Knives Out" is a very nifty little thriller. Cleverly written, and directed by, Rian Johnson, (miles away from his last directorial effort, helming the last "Star Wars" movie, "The Last Jedi), there are plot twists aplenty and if you guess who actually "dunnit", you're a better man than I am, Gunga Din.

Hugely entertaining, "Knives Out" is the most fun I've had watching a movie in ages. The good news is that there will be a "Knives Out 2", with Benoit Blanc tackling a new case. I, for one, am looking forward to it with great anticipation.





ORIONIDS METEOR SHOWERS



The annual Orionids meteor shower will light up the early morning sky between October 21 - 23.

This meteor shower is caused by Earth passing through the dust stream of Halley's comet, the same comet that is responsible for the Eta Aquarids shower earlier in the year.

It's not as spectacular as the Eta Aquarids, but you could see at least 13 meteors an hour between 4:00AM and 5:00 AM at the peak of the shower if you are in a dark area.

Not only will the meteors start high in the sky an hour before sunrise, the first quarter Moon will be below the horizon.

"The best time to see it is the morning of the

22nd, but you'll see decent meteor rates on the 21st and 23rd, Dr Musgrave says. To find the

Orionids, scan the northern sky and look for the 'Saucepan'. This is actually the belt of the constellation of Orion.

The meteors will come out from a point below the belt near a big orange star called Betelgeuse and shoot up through the belt.

"If you can see the stars of the belt then you've got a good chance of seeing a meteor," Dr Musgrave says.

If you are Lucky, you may even see a meteor shooting in from the left from the neighbouring constellation of Taurus.

The southern Taurid meteor shower (formed out of debris from Comet Encke) peaks on October 10 but runs right through the month.

However, the rates are much lower — only two meteors an hour at the peak.

Even though the rates are very low, Taurid meteors tend to be brighter than Orionid meteors, says Professor Horner.

"If it's moving quickly its an Orionid meteor, if it's moving slowly it's a Taurid," he says.

HISTORY OF THE TELEGRAPH POINT FLAG

Ken flew the Telegraph Point flag at the VP Day display at the hall, and many local residents may not have been aware that we have our own village flag.

As part of the local Bicentennial Celebrations in 1988 the local council invited each village to design a flag representing their history and environment.

A competition was held and a small committee was formed to develop the winning design to be flown on Town Green on 26 January 1988 to celebrate the Bicentennial along with all the other village flags.

The flag shows the morse key in the centre, as Telegraph Point was one of the original communication points for the telegraph system which used morse code. The blue represents the Wilson River, the black stripe represents the highway and the two white stripes represent the railway lines surrounded by a background of green fields.

Long-time resident of the village Mrs Mooney had the honour of raising the flag on Town Green and also at Telegraph Point Primary School.

BUSH FIRE DANGER period has commenced

Plan and Prepare

Getting ready for a bush fire is easier than you think. Make a bush fire survival plan so you know what you will do if there's a fire near you.

Visit <u>www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/plan-and-prepare</u> to get started on your bush fire survival plan or download the *MyFirePlan* app, available on <u>iOS</u> and <u>Android</u>.

A well prepared home is more likely to survive a bush fire. Even if your plan is to leave early, the more you prepare your home, the more likely it will be to survive a bush fire or ember attack. Please ensure your property is fire ready and defendable during the warmer months to come.

Things to consider;

- Ensure there is a good, safe distance between structures, trees, shrubs and flammable materials.
- Mineral earth clearings are ideal fire breaks.
- Keep grasslands as low as practically possible.
- Clear below trees, removing as much lower fuel litter as possible.
- Regularly ensure gutters are free from debris.

Fire Permits

The bush fire danger period commenced September 1, 2020. This means that landholders are required to obtain a fire permit before commencing any burning.

Local residents are encouraged to contact our local brigade to arrange a permit request. The Telegraph Point brigade phone number is 65850103. As many of our permit officers also work full time, our station is not normally attended and it can take up to seven days for us to get back to you. Please be patient with us and leave a message. We will attempt to return your call as soon as possible and make an appointment to meet you on site.

You aren't guaranteed a permit; however, should you receive one you must notify RFS online at www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/notify or if you don't have internet access, call the fire control centre 1300 643 262 (1300 MID COAST) and your neighbours at least 24 hours in advance of commencing the burn.

Approval conditions impacting permit requests include but are not limited to the following:

- ✓ What is being burned.
- ✓ Size / Area of burn pile.
- ✓ Location.
- ✓ Water sources.
- ✓ Residential area exclusion zones.

Once you have received your conditional permit, before you light the fire, please check that there are:

- Favourable weather conditions forecasted, in particular low winds.
- You meet all conditions of the permit.
- NO total fire bans (TOBAN) or a high fire danger rating.

Cairncross Waste Treatment Centre by Sue Pike

On 29 September 2020, I was invited to join Mayor Peta Pinson and Member for Port Macquarie Leslie Williams to inspect the Cairncross Waste Treatment Centre. This project was an example of Port Macquarie Hastings Council working with the NSW Government to deliver benefits for Telegraph Point.

The new fully reticulated sewerage network is controlled remotely from Port Macquarie and provides a more efficient disposal method to the village of Telegraph Point and importantly, protects the environment and health of the local community. We were shown two water samples, before and after treatment which shows the improvement in the water being disposed of into the Wilson River.

Already 45 properties are connected to the system.





Mooney Street Pathway

With the completion of the pathway and new pedestrian refuges outside the primary school through to Log Wharf Reserve it is now much safer for our children and parents at the school.



Member for Port Macquarie, Leslie Williams said the huge improvements to pedestrian safety for the Telegraph Point community has been welcomed with open arms. "This is the single biggest footpath expansion program in the LGA and I am delighted it happened at Telegraph Point."

The safety improvements in Telegraph Point are a \$698,000 project delivered by Council and fully funded by the NSW Government under the Stronger Country Communities Fund.

Mayor Peta Pinson said it's great news in that we've been able to deliver more than was originally planned within the allocated budget. "Due to project efficiencies and the hard work of our team, we've also been able to complete some road resurfacing on Mooney St to further improve safety."

"Telegraph Point is such a beautiful village, and these improvements will ensure the safety of children coming to and from school, and make Log Wharf Reserve much more accessible and enjoyable for everyone."

The TPCA continues to work with our local council to improve facilities at Telegraph Point.



SCREEN TIME

with Mark Johnson

Now that 2020 has gone from ridiculous to even more ridiculous, I figured it was time to do my head a favour and watch something gentle and optimistic. It was with this in mind that I happened upon "Paddington" on Netflix.

Now, Paddington has been around since 1958, when Michael Bond wrote the first book, but I somehow missed the books when I was a child. I was a devoted Enid Blyton fan, my favourite book (which I still own) being, "The Three Golliwogs". Totally politically incorrect, of course, especially as one of the golliwogs had The N-Word for a name. My grandparents in Sydney always took me to a pantomime at The Tivoli Theatre each Christmas, and one year it was "Noddy in Toyland", and The Three Golliwogs made a cameo appearance. I remember going embarrassingly hysterical. If Jesus himself decided to make his return via the Tivoli stage, I wouldn't have been as excited.



Anyway, I was mostly unfamiliar with Paddington until last week when I decided to watch "Paddington", the movie. And what treat it was.

The film begins with a black and white sequence in Darkest Peru, where a British explorer discovers a family of bears living a comfortable existence in their tree house. He teaches them English, as you do, and they in turn look after him. When he leaves, he tells them that if they ever get to London, they will find the same hospitable reception.

Cut to the present and the young bears are now an older couple looking after their grandson and making marmalade. Various

circumstances force the grandmother to retire to The Home for Aged Bears, and their grandson sets off for London, stowing away on a ship with a good supply of marmalade.

Once he arrives in London, the bear discovers that the promised welcome is not forthcoming and he finds himself standing on Paddington Station with a sign around his neck asking for a home. A quirky family passes by and notice him. The mother, Mrs. Brown, played by the always reliable Sally Hawkins, stops and talks to him and soon Paddington (as he is now named) is heading home with them for a night's accommodation. We soon realise that the family is a bit more dysfunctional than we might have thought. Mr. Brown is an insurance risk assessor, obsessed with the potential danger of absolutely everything, their teenage daughter has retreated behind headphones and her mobile phone and their son's sense of adventure has been stifled by his father's fastidiousness. Only the housekeeper, played brilliantly by the great Julie Walters, remembers how adventurous Mr. Brown was in his youth.

Of course, Paddington's stay is an insurance assessor's nightmare, but despite Mr. Brown's objections, Paddington stays on with The Browns while Mrs. Brown and Paddington track down the explorer who first invited him to London in the first place. There is also a villainess, played by Nicole Kidman, wearing a blond bob so sharply styled it's a wonder she doesn't have scratch marks on her cheeks, and stiletto heels high enough to cause nose-bleeds. She is a taxidermist who is desperate to add Paddington to her collection.

I should point out that Paddington is a completely convincing digital creation, beautifully voiced by Ben Whishaw.

Gradually, a subtle political theme emerges; that of our increasingly negative view of refugees. Paddington is, after all, a refugee, and there is a lovely and poignant scene with the great Jim Broadbent playing an antiques dealer who remembers arriving in London just before World War 2 as part of the Kindertransport, when over ten thousand Jewish children were sent out of Germany, Austria, Hungary and Poland and fostered in Britain. Often these children were the only members of their families to survive The Holocaust. The echo of the Kindertransport serves to remind us of how much we have closed our political and emotional borders.

Don't assume, however, that "Paddington" is in any way maudlin or depressing. It has been made with great visual flair by Paul King, and maintains a cheerful and entertaining air from beginning to end. In other words, the Little Ones will be thoroughly entertained, while the adults will be entertained and hopefully a little moved.

Naturally, it all ends well (hardly a spoiler) and I emerged charmed as all get out.

I thoroughly recommend "Paddington". It is beautifully made, very amusing and manages to hit all the right notes. Now I have "Paddington 2" to look forward to, especially as it contains what is said to be a delicious performance by Hugh Grant (and hasn't he developed into a wonderful comic actor, now that his matinee idol days are over?).

Oh, and one last thing. Keep an eye out in the sequence when Paddington is coming home by taxi from Paddington Station, for an elderly man sitting in a cafe who waves at Paddington. That's Michael Bond, who wrote the Paddington books. He died not long after the film was made (and died in Paddington, London, appropriately). The Paddington film is a fitting final tribute to its original creator.

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Everyday Fruit Cake Recipe by Gaylene

Ingredients

- 2 packed Cups S/R Flour
- 2 Cups Orange Juice or V8 tropical
- 850 g mixed Dried Fruit (chopped)
- 150 grams of Walnuts/Glace ginger chopped
- Mixed Spice to your liking
- · Drambuie etc or omit



Method

Night before soak dried fruit in Juice add a splash of Drambuie or similar.

Next morning - Sift mixed spice and flour into soaked fruit, stir in well.

Add mix of Walnuts and ginger.

Grease and line a 23 cm square cake tin.

Cook in pre-heated oven 150°C for 1 to 1.5 hours.

Check cake after hour, depends on oven.

Cake is cooked when skewer comes out clean. Cool cake in tin.

I change the ratio of fruit to nuts/ginger depending on whether I want a more fruit or cakier cake.

Enjoy and change it up as much as you like.

This is based on the original 3 ingredient Fruit Cake (c2. Flour and juice, 1 kg of fruit) that I have adapted to my preference.

Omit nuts and increase fruit for a Diary Free, Nut Free, Egg free cake.

Further north in my electorate the community of Telegraph Point reaped the benefits of an injection of \$698,000 worth of pedestrian upgrades thanks to the Government's Stronger Country Communities Fund.

We all know a town is not a town without adequate footpath access to facilities and amenities, which is why this major investment is so imperative to the future development and safety of locals residing in Telegraph Point. The upgrades include additional pedestrian refuges and 800 metres worth of pathway from Mooney Street to Log Wharf Reserve and improvements to footpath access next to Rollands Plains Road.

Telegraph Point has only recently become the first of three communities in the Port Macquarie-Hastings region to connect to a new reticulated pressure sewerage network. This \$29 million investment, of which the Government generously contributed \$6 million to council's Three Village scheme project, will provide an efficient environmentally friendly waste disposal.

Telegraph Point is a small town of just over 600 residents. Whenever I visit I am always impressed by the passion and determination of the local community to improve services to ensure this tight-knit community remains prosperous and vibrant after being bypassed as a result of the Pacific Highway upgrades. I thank our dynamic Telegraph Point Community Association led by president Sue Pike, secretary Samantha Cutler, treasurer Gaylene Codd, Scott Manning and Therese Glen-Holmes for working collaboratively with all tiers of government to progress the development of Telegraph Point.

Plan and Prepare

Getting ready for a bush fire is easier than you think. Make a bush fire survival plan so you know what you will do if there's a fire near you.

Visit <u>www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/plan-and-prepare</u> to get started on your bush fire survival plan or download the *MyFirePlan* app, available on <u>iOS</u> and <u>Android</u>.

A well prepared home is more likely to survive a bush fire. Even if your plan is to leave early, the more you prepare your home, the more likely it will be to survive a bush fire or ember attack. Please ensure your property is fire ready and defendable during the warmer months to come.

Things to consider;

- Ensure there is a good, safe distance between structures, trees, shrubs and flammable materials.
- Mineral earth clearings are ideal fire breaks.
- Keep grasslands as low as practically possible.
- Clear below trees, removing as much lower fuel litter as possible.
- Regularly ensure gutters are free from debris.

Fire Permits

Please allow adequate time for officers to attend as all also have employment and cut off is Friday mornings for weekend burns.

Again I would like to thank all residents for notifying the RFS and their neighbours before conducting the many pile-burns and hazard reductions experienced for the month of September. Landholders are required to obtain a fire permit before commencing any burning. You aren't guaranteed a permit; however, should you receive one you must notify RFS online at www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/notify or if you don't have internet access, call the fire control centre 1300 643 262 (1300 MID COAST) and your neighbours at least 24 hours in advance of commencing the burn.

Approval conditions impacting permit requests include but are not limited to the following:

- ✓ What is being burned.
- ✓ Size / Area of burn pile.
- ✓ Location.
- ✓ Water sources.
- Residential area exclusion zones.

Once you have received your conditional permit, before you light the fire, please check that there are:

- Favourable weather conditions forecasted, in particular low winds.
- You meet all conditions of the permit.
- NO total fire bans (TOBAN) or a high fire danger rating.



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SCREEN TIME

with Mark Johnson

I've recently watched two films, made seventy years apart, which share a sort of cinematic DNA.



The first film was "**Saboteur**", which Alfred Hitchcock made in 1942. This was his first film set in the United States. Hitchcock had made films *in* the U.S.A, but his previous American films, beginning with "Rebecca", had been *set* in Britain.

"Saboteur" begins at an aircraft factory in California when a worker, Barry Kane, played by Robert Cummings, is falsely accused of starting a fire to sabotage the production line. His friend is killed, Barry is accused, and he goes 'on the run" to try to clear his name and to stop any further acts of sabotage. If this sounds familiar, it could be because Hitchcock used this set up more than once. The great "North by Northwest", from 1959, uses a very similar premise.

Along the way, Kane teams up with a girl, Patricia, played by Priscilla Lane, (just as Cary Grant, in "North by Northwest" teams up with Eva Marie Saint).

In typical Hitchcock fashion, the people he meets are not necessarily who they seem to be. In 1942, America had just entered World War 2, and so, while they are never named as such, the actual saboteurs are American Fascists, in support of the Nazi regime in Germany. While the film begins in California, the act of sabotage Kane is trying to prevent is in New York, so the film crosses the country from coast to coast.

Obviously, more plot details will be spoilers, so you'll just have to believe me that "Saboteur" is rattling good fun. Its most famous sequence is its finale, atop the Statue of Liberty. Brilliantly staged, it is a sort of dress rehearsal for the Mount Rushmore sequence at the end of "North by Northwest".

Interestingly, that last scene involves a character, Fry, we saw at the factory in the very beginning. He was played, in his film debut by Norman Lloyd, who became a well-known television face on such shows as "St. Elsewhere". I looked him up on Wikipedia to see when he died and was pleased and surprised to discover that he is still alive at 106 years of age. In 2017, at the age of 103, he attended a Yankees baseball game. He and his late wife Peggy were married for seventy-five years.



The second film I saw would probably not have been made if Hitchcock had not virtually invented a whole style of cinema.

"A Simple Favour" was made in 2018 and is a fairly low budget, no-stars little gem of a...what is it? A thriller? Not exactly. A whodunnit? Hmm, not really.

"A Simple Favour" begins when the central character, Stephanie, a young recently-widowed mother of one meets the mother of her son's best friend. Emily Nelson makes an entrance like a Boticelli

Venus. Emily is brash, straight-talking, rich, with a high powered PR job, married to handsome Asian-American writer Sean. Emily is the mirror image of Stephanie yet they bond over super-strong cocktails and become "besties".

That's about as much as I can reveal without spoiling the plot, but nevertheless the rest has more twists than a Persian carpet. What I haven't mentioned yet is that "A Simple Favour" is also very funny, in a dry subversive way. This comes as much as anything from the performances of the two leads, Anna Kendrick and Blake Lively.

Anna Kendrick I knew from her terrific, Oscar-nominated performance in "Up in the Air" opposite George Clooney as well as her wonderful turn as Cinderella in "Into the Woods" (she can sing! She was starring in the musical "The Secret Garden" on Broadway at the age of twelve). She is most well-known in the "Pitch Perfect" films. Here she is absolutely charming. Klutzy, good-hearted and smart, she makes Stephanie sympathetic and it is through her eyes that we see the plot twisting.

I wasn't familiar with Blake Lively, apart from a nice turn in Woody Allen's "Cafe Society", but here she strides onto the screen like a 1940's screen siren; a 21st Century Barbara Stanwyck. She is, in a word, fabulous.

Jones, with a family of six little children, arrived in Telegraph Point from the Old Country in response to an invitation from a brother who had promised to set them up on the land. But, sad to relate, while they were on the journey out here, the brother passed away, and they landed in our midst to find themselves stranded in a strange country. They were without friends or money until a few kind folk at 'the Point' gathered a little for them, provided for them temporary home. About three weeks ago Mr. Jones secured a job at Newcastle, and on his way home from that centre on Monday of last week he evidently took a fit (to which he was subject) in the train, and fell and injured his head. On the doctor's advice he was brought into the Port Macquarie hospital Wednesday of last week, and in spite of the best medical skill, he passed away on Saturday night. 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

Electoral Redistribution

The Electoral Districts Redistribution Panel has released their draft report for changes to boundaries of electoral districts of NSW. Redistribution occurs after every second NSW State general election to ensure that each electoral district of the Legislative Assembly has an approximately equal number of electors.

Due to population growth in the current Port Macquarie electorate, the Panel proposes to transfer Telegraph Point, The Hatch, Blackmans Point, and King Creek from the electoral district of Port Macquarie to the electoral district of Oxley.

The Redistribution Panel is open to submissions for feedback on these changes and will consider the

potential impact upon communities in regards to communication, travel, and social impact.



TELEGRAPH POINT OLD BUTTER FACTORY AND THE SINKING OF THE WOOLONGBAR II

18,000 cases of BUTTER was onboard the North Coast Steam Navigation (NCSN) steamer, WOLLONGBAR II when she was torpedoed by Japanese Submarine 1-180 on the 29th April 1943 at 10:15am 6 nautical miles off Crescent Head.

The Captain and some crew witnessed the Submarine diving 300 yards away and the wake of a torpedo heading towards them. Two torpedoes hit the WOOLONGBAR II killing the Captain and 31 crew.

Thousands of boxes of butter, debris (flotsam) and 6 survivors were floating on the surface. Witnessing this event was an RAAF Catalina flying boat transiting from Brisbane to Rathmines (Lake Macquarie).



Rathmines received an urgent message from the aircraft and the information was passed to Port Macquarie. With some luck, fishing trawler XLCR had returned to port to be informed of the tragedy, extra fuel, food and blankets were loaded. XLCR sailed and guided by the Catalina located the survivors.

Boxes of butter washed shore and XLCR gathered more from sea, the butter was reconstituted at the Telegraph Point Butter Factory repackaged and sent to Sydney by train.

In June 1943, butter was added to the list of rationed foods. The allowance for each adult was 1lb per fortnight. Butter rationing continued until 1950. Other foods, including eggs and milk, were rationed from time to time when shortages occurred.

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Looking Back On Last Year's Fires



Thank you to everyone who has joined us tonight for the Annual General Meeting for 2020.

What a year 2020 has been for everyone around the world. This time last year, having experienced severe drought for several years, we were thrown into the worst bushfires we'd seen in this area for decades. We missed out on a Christmas party but celebrated the New Year at our community party which was held in our repaired and freshly painted hall on Saturday 25 January 2020. Although many people were away on holiday we had a good turn out and we had a very pleasant evening, relieved that there had been no loss of life in our local community during the bushfires.

Who could have imagined just as we were catching our breath in early 2020 the world would be plunged into a pandemic with the consequent chaos that followed.

We are very lucky to live in Australia, as most of us already know. We have so far escaped the extent of the infections and deaths that other countries have gone through. It has been difficult living through the restrictions that have been placed on us not being able to see and hold our loved ones who live in other countries and other states, and for those people who lost loved ones to Covid-19 we offer our deepest sympathy.

All activities at the Telegraph Point Hall and access to the Book Room were suspended from March until the middle of the year when we opened the hall to regular users, yoga, the exercise group, crafters and card players, on the proviso that they follow Covid-19 precautions. We have now re-opened the Book Room with one person at a time permitted to enter.

The closure of the hall of course impacted on income received. A booking enquiry from MIBT, an apprentice training company resulted in them booking the hall in August and September for several days. They were providing training for four local painter and decorator apprentices from Wauchope and Port Macquarie. It is hoped that they will make use of our hall in future as their bookings helped a lot with supporting the hall financially.

Our great little committee has worked really hard this year and despite Covid-19 we have achieved a few goals. Once again the hall has been the main focus of our attention. It continues to be an extremely important cornerstone in our community and as restrictions are lifted it will once again be available to celebrate special occasions and hold regular community events.

Simon Hughes and his team completed the replacement of the ceiling, upgraded lighting and new ceiling fans which we were able to do with a grant from the State Government Community Building Partnership and it has been commented on by everyone who has been in the hall.

Another grant was received from the State Government Community Building Partnership to install coin operated air conditioning in the hall and we took advantage of the hall being closed to get this done by Gleeson's Refrigeration & Air Conditioning of Wauchope. Once the hall was re-opened users took advantage of being able to heat up the hall which can be very cold during the winter months.

The hall was connected to the new Telegraph Point Sewerage Scheme thanks to a grant received under the Federal Government Bushfire Disaster Recovery Funding via Port Macquarie Hastings Council.

In August Ken Greenwood set up a wonderful display in the hall on the 65th anniversary of the end of the Second World War in the Pacific honouring those men and women from Telegraph Point and surrounds who served.

We are participating in a photographic project of local community owned halls which is in development by Sue Frost of Pappinbarra Progress Association. An exhibition will be held in each hall over the next few months.

We now have a website <u>www.telegraphpoint.com.au</u> and I encourage everyone in the community to visit it and see the wonderful work that is being done by Michelle Richards.

Our Association does not just look after the hall. Over the past few years we have been working cooperatively with Council on several projects and these are now coming to fruition. The Telegraph Point and Surrounds Community Plan was finalised and endorsed by Council in March. This can be seen on Council's website.

The footpaths from the school to Log Wharf Reserve and two refuge islands in the road outside the school were completed by Council, together with an upgrade to the paths from Rollands Plains Rd to the Wilson River Bridge and from the bridge to Mooney Street.

Council also completed the upgrade to lighting and drainage at Charlie Watts Reserve.

We're now working with Council to develop the Master Plan for Log Wharf Reserve incorporating ideas put forward by the community over the past couple of years. Our draft design, which was developed by Sam Cutler, can be seen on our website.

Many thanks to our volunteers Josie McKinnon, who continues to keep the hall clean and tidy by attending to cleaning every week, and Ian Rutledge who kindly mows the lawns around the hall on a regular basis, keeping it looking neat and tidy outside. Thanks to those people who have continued to donate books to the Book Room even though it has been closed for so long.

Our newsletter continues to be a great means of disseminating news and information to

our community. Our editor Di Barber retired from the position early this year and we thank her for all the hours she put in for us in putting it all together. Michelle Richards has taken over the production of the newsletter in conjunction with the website, and is doing a great job.

Our Facebook page continues to provide a platform for regular up to date information on events and happenings in our area. Thank you to Therese Glen-Holmes who keeps it up to date for the Association and to those community members who contribute.

Our Hall Manager, Ross Trevelyan, retired from the position early this

year as the pandemic forced us to close the hall, after several years of managing the bookings and maintenance of the hall and we thank him for his dedication to the job. Scott Manning has taken over the position of Hall Manager.

A well prepared home is more likely to survive a bush fire. Even if your plan is to leave early, the more you prepare your home, the more likely it will be to survive a bush fire or ember attack. Please ensure your property is fire ready and defendable during the warmer months to come.

Things to consider;

- Ensure there is a good, safe distance between structures, trees, shrubs and flammable materials.
- Mineral earth clearings are ideal fire breaks.
- Keep grasslands as low as practically possible.
- Clear below trees, removing as much lower fuel litter as possible.
- Regularly ensure gutters are free from debris.

IONA

IONA was a 50 foot vessel built on the North bank of the Wilson River Telegraph Point, opposite the now Riverview Tavern by Mr. Jim Sonter in 1940.

To the best of my knowledge, she was sold and home ported in Newcastle. Where she was purchased/requisitioned by the SMALL SHIPS SECTION U.S.A.S.O.S (United States Army Services of Supply) 19 Dec 1942.

When the Japanese started to make their way down through South East Asia heading for Australia, our troops were on the increase to New Guinea. There was a need

for small craft to operate in the shallow waters and rivers around the Islands.

From early 1942 more than 3,000 small vessels were purchased or requisitioned by the American Army, from barquentines, ketches, fishing trawlers, barges and tugs. Hence, earning the title; The RAGTAG Fleet.

IONA sailed to Sydney, where she was refitted, painted grey, armed and designated with an "S" number. IONA was S179. These vessels sailed under an American Flag. They were maned by crews deemed too old or too young, unfit for General Service. They were paid by the American Army under 6 to 12 month contracts.

15th April 1943 IONA sailed from Sydney to Newcastle, Seal Rocks, Townsville, Cairns, Cook town, Thursday Is, Moresby and Milne Bay.

S179 was then used as a ferry between Wagga Wagga and Gilli Gilli, in November 1943 she was surveyed, parts were salvaged and IONA was burnt. A long way from Telegraph Point

I seem to have lost a sense of time in this weirdest of years, so it was a bit of a surprise when I noticed Christmas puddings for sale in the supermarkets. These days, the holiday season seems to start in about July (I'm looking forward to the hot cross buns coming out on Boxing Day, as usual), but then I noticed that getting a parking spot in town is getting trickier, so I assume Christmas is upon us.

I'm all a bit "bah humbug" about Christmas in general, but I thought I'd see what the streaming services were offering in the way of Yuletide programming. I started by having peek at "Dolly Parton's Christmas on the Square". "C on the S" is a very traditional piece of Christmas kitsch and is a riff on Dickens' "A Christmas Carol" with the great Christine Baranski playing Regina, who has come back to her small home town, which her rich and recently deceased father owns. As in, owns all the shops in the town square, which Regina has sold to a developer as a site to build the biggest mall in the Midwest. Regina's Christmas present to each shopkeeper is an eviction notice Bah humbug, indeed.



Dolly wrote the songs and co-stars as (spoiler alert) an angel. In the opening number, a rousing all-singin', all-dancin' affair, Dolly is disguised as a homeless person begging in the square for loose change. Now, I love Dolly Parton. I really do. When I was a feckless youth, I used to think Dolly was the apex of American kitsch. It took me a while to realise that behind the wigs and the makeup there was an enormously talented artist. She has an extraordinary voice and is a great songwriter, but she also has a nice unpretentious view of herself. When she said, "It costs me a fortune to look this cheap", I was sold.



So accepting Dolly as a homeless beggar may have strained the credibility a tad, and it was pretty clear that Regina would find the Spirit of Christmas and the town would be saved. I have to admit that I didn't watch past the first ten minutes, but if the movie ended differently I'd be very surprised. But I will get back to it. I've loved Dolly in every movie she's been in (well, apart from that one with Sylvester Stallone, which I couldn't watch because I'm allergic to Sylvester Stallone), and I'll get back to this one.

I then happened upon a Netflix series called "Dash and Lily" and was immediately rapt. Based upon a YA novel, "Dash and Lily" begins as Dash, an obviously wealthy New York late teen sets his plans to spend the Christmas season alone. It's his present to himself, as he says. Dash hates Christmas, by the way. While browsing in a bookshop, he finds a notebook wedged between two novels and inside there is are a series of clues as to the owner, as well as a dare. The plot structure is clever, too. It loops back on itself every now and then to show you previous scenes from a different perspective.

"Dash and Lily" may be intended for older teen audiences, but it's so charming it should appeal to all ages (well, apart from the littlies. There might be a few things to *explain*). I for one am looking forward to watching the rest of the eight episodes. Give "Dash and Lily" a go. It's terrific fun, and isn't that what we want over Christmas? And did I mention that it's also very funny.





Free Solar For Low Income Households

The NSW Govt is trialling a new way to help people on low incomes reduce their electricity bills by installing 3 kilowatt solar systems on their homes. The program aims to improve energy affordability by helping households unlock long term savings on their electricity bills.

This program is only available to a limited number of households. Homeowners must be receiving the Low Income Household Rebate and hold a valid Pensioner Concession Card or Department of Veterans' Affairs Gold Card. There are several requirements including agreeing to stop receiving the Low Income Rebate, ongoing maintenance of the system, and a contract with the solar installation company. Landcare Fights Invasive Weeds

A group of committed Landcarers from Rollands Plains Landcare have been steadily poisoning some of the invasive weeds, Madeira Vine and Cats Claw Creeper. These weeds have been growing on private land along the Wilson River and its tributaries. If left to their own devices it would dominate the area

and suppress native biodiversity as it has in

other areas, like the Macleay.

For many of the volunteers it was the first time they had encountered these weeds, but they now feel they are much better at recognising them. Madeira vine reproduces by developing many bulbous tubers along its vine that fall to the ground and produce numerous new plants. Early eradication is preferable so that control is possible. Port Macquarie/Hastings Council helped with free chemicals and advice.

How to identify Madeira Vine

- Madeira vine has fleshy, waxy green, heartshaped leaves which are usually 4-5 cm in length, but can range between 1-15.
- Slender, twining and hairless stems up to 30 m long are initially herbaceous and green/ pinkish/ red in colour.
- The flower cluster is fragrant, greenish-white to cream-white and resembles a 'lamb's tail'. with numerous small flowers.







How to identify Cat's Claw Creeper

- Large woody vine that climbs and creeps aggressively.
- Flowers are yellow, bell-shaped, 4-10cm long, up to 10cm wide.
- Leaves have 2 leaflets 5-25mm long with 3-clawed tendril (cat's claw) 3-17mm long growing between them.
- Pods are long, narrow, flat, contain many seeds.
- Fruit is elongated, glossy green when young, dark brown as it matures, 15-50cm long, 8-12mm wide.
- Each fruit contains numerous oblong seeds, 10-40mm long, 4-10mm wide.
- Plant has vigorous root and tuber system.

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
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
