THE LATE MR. SAMUEL R. ANDREWS

On 6th June, 1960, there passed away one of the four surviving members of the older generation of the highly respected pioneer Andrews family of the Hastings River, in the person of the late Samuel Robert Andrews, JP. His grandfather was James Andrews of Coleraine, Northern Island, who, accompanied by his sons, Joseph, Isaac and Samuel, settled on the Hastings River in 1859. The deceased was the son of Sannuel and Jane Andrews of "Lily Bank", where he was born on 2nd July, 1880, and where he spent the whole of his life and built up a reputation as a progressive and successful farmer.

In February, 1904, Mr. Andrews married Kate, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Campbell, of King Creek. Mrs. Campbell was one of the pioneer Bain family.

In his younger days, Sam Andrews took a keen interest in sporting activities taking his place as a footballer, cricketer and tennis player. He was an energetic worker in local organisations for the benefit of the farmer and the benefit of the community. He served on the Wauchope Show Committee for many years, including a term as President.

As a loyal and faithful member of the Presbyterian Church, he served in various offices; as a member of the Presbytery, as Session Clerk and as Treasurer. Christian principles ruled his life and he witnessed for those great doctrines of the Faith which centre in the Person and work of the Lord Jesus Christ, which were very dear to him and exercised a controlling influence over his thoughts and actions. A minister who visited him just prior to his death, wrote: "The composure and evident satisfaction with which he viewed his imminent departure from this life was a further confirmation of that faith which led him to put first the things of God. His faith was so real and his life so constant, that men did not question the genuineness of his profession as a practising Christian."

Being of an hospitable nature, and Mrs. Andrews being like-minded, "Lily Bank" was noted for its hospitality and there was always a gracious welcome to visiting ministers of various denominations and other Christian workers, besides the many friends who were privileged to rest and

enjoy Christian fellowship in this happy home.

The esteem with which Mr. Andrews was held throughout the district and beyond, could be gauged by the great crowds of relatives and friends who gathered from near and far to pay their last respects to an honoured Christian gentleman.

The service was held in St. Stephen's Presbyterian Church on 7th June, where the Session formed a guard of honour. The interment took place at the Cross Roads cemetery. The Rev. S. Eldred assisted by the Rev. A. D. McIntosh of Grafton (representing the Rev. J. A. Harman, who was absent in Victoria), conducted the service at the church and graveside.

The deceased is survived by his sorrowing wife and a family of six children, Colin and Robert of "Lily Bank", the Rev. Dr. Campbell (South Africa), Jennie (Mrs. T. Shearer), Christina (Mrs. V. Greig) and Heather (Mrs. E. Marshall). One son, Arthur died in childhood, aged 5 yrs. There are fifteen grandchildren and two great grandchildren. One sister, Sarah (Mrs. Coleman of Glen Inness) is the only survivor of a large family. Those deceased are James, Cordelia, Anne, Mary, Martha, Isabella, Grace, Rebecca, Lily, Maud and Samuel.

It is with deep gratitude to the God of all Grace that we remember Samuel Robert Andrews and we feel that we can endorse the words of Job: "The Lord gave, the Lord hath taken away; blessed be the name of the lord." —Shire Gazette.

The Late Mrs. Heather Andrews

The death on April 18 took from our midst a devoted wife, mother and daughter, whose sparkling personality and kindness won admiration and friendship wherever she mingled. Her untimely passing was a tragic loss not only to her immediate family but to the community in which she lived and to the country she served in time of war.

Heather McDonald Andrews was born on January 28, 1925, the younger daughter of Mr. R. K. Pountney and the late Mrs. Pountney.

She attended school at Port Macquarie, Wauchope and Abbotsleigh College (Sydney), and then, after completing a business course, accepted a position in the city.

But World War II came and teenage Heather enlisted with the WAAF and was stationed at Richmond (N.S.W.) and Parafield (S.A.).

Following the termination of hostilities, she returned to Wauchope to join her father in the conduct of the "Hastings Shire Gazette," giving scope for her undoubted ability as a shorthand writer and typist.

In August, 1946, at St. Matthew's, Wauchope, Heather married Joseph Robert Andrews (now President of Hastings Shire Council) who, 12 months previously, had returned from War Service, including 3½ years as a prisoner-of-war in the Japanese prison camp of Changi, Malaya. They settled in Wauchope and reared three children, Kay, John and Roslyn.

Despite her family ties, Mrs. Andrews made time to contribute to community interests, assisting her husband in his civic duties as well as in his parliamentary campaign, helping charitable organisations, and, in the sport-

ing field, holding executive positions in the Associates Golf Club.

When Wauchope High School had difficulty in securing a teacher for its Commercial Classes, Mrs. Andrews filled the breach, and girls under her care progressed rapidly in their chosen studies.

Having so many interests, she naturally became associated with many people, young and old, in varied walks of life, all of whom were shocked when it became known that she was suffering an incurable ailment, and all the more tragic as her mother, after much suffering, had passed away only last year.

In a desperate bid to save her life, neurosurgeons at Royal Prince Alfred Hospital, Sydney, spent seven hours removing a tumour from Mrs. Andrews' brain; she rallied temporarily following the operation, but the final call, at the age of 40 years, came in the early hours of Easter Sunday.

The funeral took place on Monday, 19th April, following a service in St. Matthew's Church of England conducted by the Rev. Peter Paine.

The cortege, possibly the longest ever seen in Wauchope, moved to the Wauchope Cemetery where guards of honour were formed by R.S.L. and Ex-Service interests and representatives of

the Shire Council, Urban Committee, Rotary Club, High School and Country Club.

The casket, covered with the Union Jack, was carried between long rows of floral tributes to its last resting place.

Besides her husband, children and father, Mrs. Andrews leave a sister, Peggy (Mrs. Cliffe Lyon, Ellenborough) and brother, (Sydney). — "H. S. Gazette"

THE ANDREWS FAMILY OF WAUCHOPE

An interesting new signature has been added to the pages of the Wauchope Chapter's Visitors' Book. It was signed by Mrs Daisy W. Wade (nee Andrews) and a number of her cousins. All were descendants of Mr and Mrs Joseph R Andrews, who were numbered among the early settlers of the Manning River District.

Members of the Wauchope Chapter of the Hastings District Historical Society who attended a social gathering at the home of Mrs Ninian Toms (nee Andrews) of Wauchope, were Mrs Hazel Suters (nee Bain) and Mrs Rae Young (nee Graham).

Daisy Wade's parents were Samuel Andrews and Ruth (nee Mansfield), Samuel being a son of Joseph Robert Andrews.

Daisy was the house-guest of her cousin (Mrs Ninian Toms) whose father was Ernest Dixon Andrews, of Wauchope.

Samuel and Ernest being two of the sons born to Joseph Robert Andrews, of Wauchope House.

Joseph Robert Andrews' twin brothers Samuel Andrews (1836-1911) and Isaac Andrews (1836-1909) married sisters - Jane Martin (1840-1910) and Sarah Martin (1837-1877).

Joseph R. Andrews and his family lived at "Wauchope House"; Samuel and his family at "Wilybank" and Isaac and his family at "Coleraine" Wauchope.

Daisy Wade married a man who came from Yorkshire to Australia to pursue his agricultural interests. They lived in Victoria.

After rearing five children Daisy returned to a secretarial career.

She recalled that as a schoolgirl she had visited her grandparents (Mr and Mrs Joseph R. Andrews) at Wauchope House.

She also remembered spending holidays with her "Uncle Josh" Andrews at "Lincoln Hall"...and at her aunt Edith's home "Bronte" at Rollands Plains. (Edith Andrews married Henry Warlters).

The following kinfolk spent a happy few hours renewing the bonds of family and enjoying the pleasurable experience of being together. Just as their forebears also enjoyed such family gatherings whenever they were together over a century ago.

Mrs Ninian Toms, hostessed the afternoon, gathering as a welcome to Daisy Wade. The guests included:

Jean Huxley (her sister) with her daughters, Helen Patterson and Sonya Hackett.

Elsa Toms, Robyn Toms, and Robyn's children, Gretta and Linda; Elva Andrews (nee Crozier) (widow of Joe - "Swampy Joe" - Andrews)...descendants of Joseph R. Andrews.

I (Rene) Andrews (nee Coleman)

Frances Coutts (nee Johnston)....a grand-daughter of Agnes Ann Andrews.

(nee Louis) descendants of Samuel Andrews of "Lilybank".

Bessie Andrews and Grace Chapman (nee Andrews)...daughters of W.J. Andrews of "Coleraine", and Rae Young (nee Graham) were descended from Isaac Andrews of "Coleraine".

Mrs I.A. Dyet ("Birdie" - nee Lyon) whose father, Ernest Lyon was the youngest member of the Lyon family. (Ann Andrews married Robert Lyon, 1887, Eliza Andrews married George Lyon, 1878, and John Andrews married Margaret Lyon, 1880.)

Unable to attend the Andrews gathering were Nancy Stoupe (nee White), also descendants of Samuel Andrews. Joseph Andrews was born on 10th January, 1814, at "Coleraine" in the County of Londonderry, North Ireland.

The Wingham Chronicle of December 3, 1937, carried the following information written by the late Gordon Dennes.

"Whilst attending the University of Glasgow and pursuing a theological course, Mr Joseph Andrews was selected as one of the schoolteachers for the Presbyterian denominational School in New South Wales.

His wife, whose maiden name was Miss Ann Dickson, was born on 2nd October 1819, at Paisley, Scotland. During January 1835, they were married at Glasgow. On the 7th December 1835, their eldest child Samuel, was born.

Among the 320 passengers who sailed from Greenock, Scotland, on 24th July, 1837, in the ship "Portland", 541 tons, in command of Captain James B. Conbro, were: Rev. John Dunmore Lang, M.A., who was returning from the fourth of his nine visits to Great Britain, and under whose superintendent these schoolteachers came out to New South Wales; nine other Presbyterian Clergymen; the schoolteachers (Thos. W. Robinson, Peter Steel, John Whitelaw, Joseph Andrews, James McEachern, George Walker, Malcolm Colquhoun, Robert MacEachern, James Henry, John Goodwin, Joseph Sproul, Alex Fraser, Robert Campbell and John Balmain).....another schoolteacher, Mr Mathew Adam; Mrs Joseph Andrews, her son Samuel, and her brother-in-law Mr Robert Andrews, a saddler & harnessmaker, who on arrival in Sydney set up a business at his trade in Hunter Street.

Five days after sailing, measles made their appearance. Out of the fifty cases which occurred 16 young children were carried off, and nine others from infantile diseases, whilst four adults died during the voyage. On 9th October 1837, the infant, Samuel Andrews, passed away, and his mortal remains were consigned reverently and solemnly, to the "swelling deep". Owing to the appearance of a few cases of scurvy, the "Portland" put into King George's Sound for fresh vegetables.

After a long passage of 132 days - and for many of them a sad journey - the "Portland" on 3rd December 1837, arrived at Sydney.

On disembarkation, Mr Joseph Andrews was appointed Schoolmaster to the Presbyterian Denominational School in the Parish of St. Philip's, Sydney.

Here he remained until about the end of the year 1840, when he was transferred to the Presbyterian Denominational School, Dunmore, Paterson River, which was

situated on the property of Mr Andrew Lang. The mode of instruction was chiefly based on the Juvenile and Infant Training System as taught in the Glasgow Training Schools.

About the end of the year 1844 Mr Andrews resigned from the teaching profession, and purchased from Captain George C. Watson, 705 acres of land, with a frontage to the left bank of the Manning River at what the aborigines called Yankangat, where he finally settled. Later in honor of his mother's maiden name, he renamed his property "Woodside".

About the year 1850, the following brothers and sister, James, John, William and Jane (who on August 17th, 1852 married Mr George McPherson of Yankangat), emigrated from Ireland to New South Wales.

One other brother, Samuel, remained in Londonderry.

Mrs Joseph Andrews passed away at Wauchope on 30th March, 1882, aged 68 years, whilst Mr Joseph Andrews died at Woodside on 9th January, 1901, aged 87 years. An inscribed tombstone marks their last resting place in the Woodside Cemetery.

The names of their daughters and sons, all of whom are deceased except two are:

Samuel, Agnes, Ann (Mrs John Burnett Cooper); Mary Jane (Mrs Samuel Andrews); Isabella Ninian Lang (Mrs Joseph Robert Andrews); John, Margaret; Eliza (Mrs George Lyon), Robert Ernest; Ann (Mrs Robert W. Lyon); Rachel, Joseph, residing at Haberfield; James, William; Alice Victoria died in infancy; and George Alexander, residing at "Coolangoola", Woodside.

As the activities of Mr Joseph Andrews were many and varied during his lifetime on the Manning River his name ranks as one of the district's most public-spirited pioneering men."

SEVERAL DAYS LATER

Following the gathering of Andrews descendants at Mrs N. Toms' home at Wauchope it was agreed that a visit should be made to Woodside.

So several days later, Mrs N. Toms and her sister Jean (Huxley) and Ninian's sons and daughters-in-law visited relatives in Wingham; paid a visit to the Museum there; and drove out to Mount George where they were entertained by Dorothy and Graham Allen at Woodside.

The Cemetery at Woodside holding many of the Andrews graves was also inspected before the party returned to Wauchope. Mrs Doug Lyon (nee Nellie Lyon) and her husband were our hosts for morning tea at their home at Wingham, and they later escorted the Wauchope visitors to the home of Miss Daisy Lyon, and Mr Edmund Andrews, and to Woodside the original home of Mr Joseph Andrews.

The children of ancestors Ann Andrews and Robert Lyon were: Lillian (married Donald Paterson of Kranbach), Roy (married Isobel Homewood, Manning River), Daisy (aged 87 years and living at Wingham), Nellie (married Francis (Doug) Lyon and living at Wingham).

A photograph on the wall at the home of Nellie and Doug Lyon attracted our attention. We learned it was a

photograph of Doug's father, Francis Henry Lyon, and Fanny, (who lived to the age of 104 years) and Edmund, a brother.

Doug spoke of how he had gone "prospecting for gold with Robert Andrews, of Woodside. On the way to Nambucca they called to see "Ernie" Andrews, at "Hillview". (Ernie was Ninian's father.)

They travelled by coach drawn by four horses.

Nellie and Doug "knew each other as children" they said. Nellie spoke of how she had gone back to Wauchope House at twenty-one years of age, and had then slept in the very same bedroom where she had been born".

Margaret Andrews went to live at Wauchope House later on with her sons, "Bobbie" and George (Cox).

Doug Lyon and his wife, Nellie, after their marriage lived on a farm called "Ellstree" - at Strath Cedar, until they retired - and "moved in to Wingham about thirteen years ago."

Nellie Lyon, young-at-heart and beautiful to see, is 85 years old now. She took us to visit her sister, Daisy, at the old home they call "The Den".....Miss Daisy said that as children they lived at "Tilboroo", at Ellenborough, from where - about five years later, they moved to Wherrol Flat (about 1903).....and then finally in 1919, the family (all except Lillian) came to live at "The Den", Wingham.

At "Tilboroo" they'd been educated by a Governess and a Tutor. A painting of the Lyon home at "Tilboroo" was hanging on the wall. It carried the signature of the Tutor: Charles Trelawney, who taught the family in the 1890's at "Tilboroo".

Miss Daisy said: "The girls, Daisy, Lilly, and Nellie, were taught to paint later on by the Governess.

The large dining room table held the family albums and the postcard album which had been placed there for us to see.

A postcard lettered "Nellie" in sparkling outline read:

"To Miss Nellie Lyon, Wherrol Flat, Manning River, 1907:
Nell my dear I love you so and trust you will return
my love from Charlie Johnstone."

We were assured that the postcard had been sent "dor fun" by Nellie's Uncle Charlie!

The lovely old home was built with high ceilings, and both walls and ceilings were of horizontal wood. Her parents' silver tea-service and other old silver pieces were on the sideboard in Miss Daisy Lyon's home.....and we were told that one member of the present generation of the family had been wed beneath the shade of a tree in the huge back garden. Miss Daisy's great-grand-neices, Rachel and Yvette, were presented to us there, too.

Our next call was to briefly see Mr Edmund ("Eddie") Andrews, who at 95 years of age, must have been a little overwhelmed at the invasion of his daughter's home by so many relatives.

Nellie explained that he was her cousin and was from "a different branch of the Andrews family."

Dorothy is Mrs Ron Harris - and she is caring for her father. (We had already seen a photograph of him in the family album taken at about four years of age.)

At the Manning District Historical Society's Museum the family portraits, photographs, manuscripts, and other items were doubly interesting because we were spending that day looking back into the past - just a little!

Andrews) met us at the museum (Warrigah) and Mrs Joan Gibson (on duty there) made a point of showing the visitors the copper-still which had been recovered from the ceiling above a room at "Woodside".

It was a long and beautiful drive through the valley and into the hills at Mt. George where we were met by our hosts, Dorothy and Graham Allen.

Since 1973 they have carefully restored the beautiful old homestead which had previously been neglected for a number of years.

The outside walls are of natural red cedar and from the cool, wide verandah we saw with pleasure the magnificent hills which rose from the rich river-bed flats below the old home.

The interior walls of the house (and the ceilings) were built of wide cedar planks, hand-adzed by the convicts who had been the members of a labour-force on loan to build the house at "Woodside" about 1839.

A room, once used as the Post Office at "Woodside" still stands at the end of the verandah.

The beauty of the old timber, and the general appearance of the house nestling into the hillside was something to be appreciated today.....one hundred and forty years later.

This was the home that was built by Mr and Mrs Joseph Andrews, and on this day (February 1979) into this had stepped some of their many descendants, some four generations later!

ELLIOTT - MACKAY and others.

Quite by chance my brother and I met Mr Noel Honess of Walgetthe married a grand-daughter of the late Mr A.C. Elliott, one of Port Macquarie's most active and best-known residents, who gave freely of his time and his talents to community affairs as well as maintaining a lively interest in his profession. Mrs Honess is a daughter of Mr A.C.Elliott's son, Mr W.A.Elliott.

It is interesting to note that her grandmother, Mrs E.Mackay (nee Drury) of Moorland was ninety-three years of age at the time of her death in February, 1978.

"The family have a photograph showing the representatives of five generations", Noel Honess said. "Grandmother Mackay had 109 direct descendants".

Both Narelle and Noel Honess are known to people in the Hastings and Camden Haven Districts because of the keen interest they have shown in the development of local pony clubs, especially the Camden Haven Pony Club.

Narelle is a pony-club instructress, and Noel is an ex-rider, well-known for his participation in the Royal Agricultural Show held at Sydney at Eastertime. His partner was John Kelly and they trained seven horses. The horse known as "Punch" at "Timbertown", Noel told us: "Was brought down in a float", after being donated to "Timbertown" by Narelle and Noel.

The latter attended Farrar Agricultural College. He was also a member of a private team of horsemen who went independently to Expo '69 at Montreal representing Australia.

The members of this group were: Sam Campbell, Maxie Gooch, (deceased) Roy Patterson and Noel Honess. Incidentally, the

From these people came our civic fathers, to whom we owe so much."

These same comments may be applied to the pioneers who settled in the Hastings District since the land was opened up to free settlers in 1830.

Many of the men and women actively engaged today in community affairs bear the well-known names of some of the pioneer families of this district.

ANDREWS - "WOODSIDE"

The whole of the Hastings District and beyond, has mourned the passing of "Joe" Andrews, a grandson of those well-known pioneers, Mr and Mrs Joseph Robert Andrews of "Wauchope House", Wauchope.

Members of the Wauchope Chapter of the Hastings District Historical Society join with many others in extending sincere sympathy to his loved ones.

Mr Joseph Robert Andrews of "Wauchope House", married Miss Isabella Ninian Lang for whom Mrs Ninian Toms (nee Andrews) was named. Isabella Ninian Lang Andrews was a daughter of Joseph and Ann Andrews.

It was in 1837 that a schoolteacher and his wife arrived in Sydney (Mr and Mrs Joseph Andrews), and later became early settlers in the Manning River District about 1845. Joseph Andrews was born on January 10, 1814, at "Coleraine" in the County of Londonderry, Northern Ireland.

He married Miss Ann Dickson in January 1835 in Glasgow. Their eldest son, Samuel, was born in December 1835 and died in 1837.

They travelled to Australia on the "Portland" with Rev. John Dunmore Lang who was returning from his fourth trip to Great Britain.

After teaching school for a number of years Mr Joseph Andrews resigned from the teaching profession and purchased land on the Manning River where he finally settled. Later, in honour of his mother's maiden name, (surname) he names the property "Woodside". The old home still stands there and is being carefully restored by the occupants (descendants of the first Joseph Andrews). Several descendants from the Hastings District visited "Woodside" in January of this year.

LAST TRIBUTES TO A MAN OF THE PEOPLE

One of the largest funerals ever witnessed in Wauchope took place on Thursday when the entire Hastings Valley mourned the passing of Joseph Robert Andrews who had spent his sixty years in the service of his family, fellow man, community and country.

A service preceded the funeral and was held in St. Stephen's Uniting Church (the foundation stone of which was laid in 1915 by the first Joseph Robert Andrews, Joe's grandfather), citizens from all classes, creeds and callings occupying the adjacent hall and church surrounds when the church quickly filled to capacity.

Within the church were the deceased's family together with relatives and dignitaries representing most organisations in the district and in particular Local Government, the R.S.L. and sporting bodies, while the Rev. Eric Main (Uniting Church) was joined in the service by the Rev. Fr. Bernard Kenny (Church of Our Lady of Lourdes) and Rev. Tim Gee (Uniting Church, Laurieton).

"We gather in the presence of God and as His congregation to acknowledge the passing of one of our community's greatest sons and, despite our sorrow, we come in faith to thank God for the life of a great man. One who served his nation and fellows well with never a thought of honour and reward — he was prepared to make the ultimate sacrifice, but was called to other things, for there was much more for him to do," Rev. Main said.

"I am humbled and privileged to have known Joe and to have shared just a little in how he lived his life.

"It has always struck me, in reading Australian history and knowing the achievements of some of her sons, that those who gave the most never lived to a great age, but made the most of every moment they had, and Joe was no exception to the rule."

At this stage, Rev. Main asked Mr. John Graham to pay a final tribute on behalf of the R.S.L. and citizens, many of whom had known Joe from childhood.

DEEP GRIEF

Mr. Graham said the passing of Joe Andrews had brought a deep feeling of grief for the loss of one who, throughout his lifetime, had contributed so much time and energy to the progress and development of the Hastings district and the Wauchope area in particular.

Another side of his existence was his ever-readiness, through his wonderful singing voice and personality, to bring joy and entertainment wherever needed — the senior citizens, civilian and Legacy widows would remember him as would Diggers who heard him lead the hymns on Anzac

Days, leading the singing at the luncheon afterwards, and singing Carols at parties for the aged at Christmas time.

Mr. Graham said that Joe spent his youth not far from his present home, and it was just six years ago that his great ambition was realised — when he and brother Alan once again secured ownership of the historic property known as "Wauchope House."

So, after fifty years this farm returned to the Andrews name, and it was on this property that he loved so much, he spent his last days. Although suffering great physical disability and pain, he worked beside his son John and brother Alan.

SERVED HIS COUNTRY

In earlier days his robust physique was obvious from an early age and prior to enlisting in World War II he won N.S.W. titles in weightlifting.

After joining the A.I.F. he saw service in Malaya as a Sergeant in the M.A.C. 2-3rd 8th Division, was captured near Singapore and spent 3½ years in Changi Prison Camp. Even there, his talents as a singer and entertainer in prison concert parties helped maintain morale among the soldiers.

It was also known of his volunteering on many occasions for work parties outside prison walls so he could acquire food and medical supplies for the sick and dying soldiers.

Mr. Graham said a tribute to the strength of Joe Andrews was the fact that in 1946, only some few months after his survival in Changi, he was selected and continued to play first grade and Cup football for Wauchope for several seasons.

CIVIC LEADER

In 1954 his talents were directed to Local Government administration. He was elected to the Wauchope Urban Committee, became Chairman during 1956-57 and, after six years, stood for and was elected to Hastings Shire Council in 1960.

He was Deputy President 1962-63-64, and President of the Shire from 1965 to 1970 when he relinquished that position because of the onslaught of illness that forced his retirement in 1971.

During his civic duties, Joe achieved much for the Shire and its people. His genial and sincere approach to Government Ministers invariably resulted favourably, and today the Shire Civic Centre, Library and C.W.A., the Tech. College, and, of course, Andrews Park so named in his honour.

At the time of his passing, Joe retained membership of the Land Board and on the Technical College Committee.

LIFE HONOURS

In 1977 he was presented with Life Membership of the Wauchope Country Club in recognition of his many years of voluntary service, both in administration and on golf course projects.

Life Membership of the RSL came in 1976, acknowledging his service to fellow diggers as Pensions Officer, spending each Saturday morning advising and assisting those in need.

"Joseph Robert Andrews," Mr. Graham said, was one who devoted his life, firstly to his family, his friends, and to the community in which he lived and loved so much.

"To his family, on behalf of the community, I assure them of our sincere thoughts and prayers in the days ahead, and commend each one to the care of our Heavenly Father.

"The following text — Timothy 4.7 — could be the words for Joseph:

"I have fought the good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the Faith"

GLORIOUS EXAMPLE

Continuing his address, Rev. Main said one thing held in common was the loss of a citizen who will be sadly missed and impossible to replace.

"Yet we each have a glorious example to follow. Mr. Bruce Cowan, M.L.A., referred to Joe as

a man of great substance and a good friend; to his beloved family he was the fondest brother, husband and father; to those who shared his life and friendship, each memory speaks louder than any words of mine, and they make their own silent tribute today. "In hope we make the declaration of our faith and take up the challenge of today and tomorrow in the strength that his life and witness has given us all —

"To be capable of steady friendship or lasting love are the two greatest proofs, not only of goodness of heart, but of strength of mind."

Rev. Main said that Joe was devoted to his wife and family, to the community and the nation, and served them well in every area of life.

MAN OF THE LAND

Despite his many achievements, he was first of all a man of the land with a great love for his home and family, and it is there he will be missed most. He leaves his family with "a good name" which is rather to be chosen "than great riches."

Parting is always difficult for the family, but Rev. Main knew they would not want to call Joe back to the suffering he had recently endured when they know in their hearts that he is now home with God, and they will wait in faith for that great reunion that is promised to all who die in the Lord.

Rev. Main concluded with the prayer of Francis of Assisi —

"O Divine Master, grant that I may not so much seek to be consoled, as to console; not so much to be understood, as to understand; not so much to be loved, as to love. For it is in giving that we receive, it is in pardoning that we are pardoned, it is in dying that we are born again to eternal life."

FLASHBACK

With war service over, Joe Andrews set to work with a truck, amongst other things contracting for the Department of Main Roads on badly needed maintenance of the Pacific Highway.

Later, he secured mobile cranes and set up the well-known Wauchope Crane & Carrying Company based at Wauchope Railway Yards, disposing of this business when six years ago he extended his farming interest.

Deeply appreciative of the needs of "the working man," Joe took a keen interest in politics as a sincere member of the Australian Labor Party and this, plus his Local Government activities, assured an open door to anyone he desired to communicate with in the N.S.W. Parliament within which, through his likeable personality and broadminded attitude, he won many lasting friends irrespective of party affiliations.

In 1962 he was endorsed as the A.L.P. candidate to contest the Electorate of Oxley — recognised as a "blue ribbon" Liberal-Country Party stronghold. At that poll he scored 7117 votes, being headed by the sitting Member the late Les Jordan with 8311, in third place the present Member Bruce Cowan with 4440.

Undeterred, Joe put up for the second time in May 1965, again polling well in second place to Mr. Jordan, who, however, died in September of that year.

For the third time, Joe contested Oxley in the by-election of November 1965 to set a record on Labor's behalf by topping the poll with 7052 to Bruce Cowan's (C.P.) 6235 and Alf Dennis's (Lib.) 5026, the latter's preferences favouring Cowan to give him the final victory.

Thus, Joe Andrews became known and respected not only within his own home town area but throughout the Mid-North Coast.

GUARD OF HONOUR

As the coffin, draped with the Union Jack, left the church associate members of Wauchope Country Club formed a guard of honour, then a lengthy guard of honour which stretched eastward in High Street, the cortege, under the direction of Mr. Don Potent, proceeding through the main business centre of the town (which, with the co-operation of Police, was kept void of all other traffic), into Cameron Street and past the Park that was named in Joe's honour in recognition of his services to Local Government, before moving westward to the R.S.L. section of Wauchope Cemetery.

At the graveside, the coffin was carried through a guard of honour formed by Returned Servicemen under the direction of R.S.L. President Toge Mudford.

As the plaintive notes of the "Last Post" and "Reveille" drifted into the still air from the bugler the final chapter closed in the life of one of Wauchope's best known and respected citizens, while the Poppies of Flanders mingled with the myriad floral tributes to perpetuate his memory as a soldier and loyal comrade.

Perhaps never before has the populace of the district been so collectively emotionally moved, with spontaneous sympathy for those left behind.

Joseph Robert Andrews was a son of the late Ernest Dixon and Florence Elizabeth Andrews. Joe married Heather Pountney who passed away in 1965 and he later married Mona Bird who survives together with children Kay, John and Roslyn, and step-daughters Jenny and Marcia. Sisters and brother are Ninian (Mrs. Toms, Wauchope), Inez (Mrs. Burdekin, Pendle Hills), Jean (Mrs. Huxley, Port Macquarie) and Alan (Wauchope). One sister, Ena (Mrs. Hall) predeceased her brother.
